WALTER ROGERS SPEAKS IN SHAMROCK

"In dealing with the crushing problems of government today, we should look upon our Constitution and Bill of Rights as our home and never stray so far away from these great documents that we can't find our way back," Congressman Walter Rogers told a joint luncheon meeting of the Rotary, Lions and Boosters Clubs and their guests at the National Guard Armory here Monday.

In a wide-ranging discussion of the complex problems that beset modern man, the 18th District Representative said that he was confident that the people always would make the right decisions if given the complete facts.

"People need facts to make intelligent decisions and as long as I can I am going to bring them to you," he said.

Emphasizing the number and complexity of problems which our leaders must face and try to correct, Congressman Rogers pointed out that about the time one problem is straightened out something else happens to take its place.

Chamber Members Discuss The Future Of Sweetwater

One of the largest crowds of the year attended the Chamber of Commerce meeting Tuesday night at Nora's Cafe and everyone enjoyed a very informative program.

Raymond Moore, Wheeler County chairman of the National Farm-City Week, spoke to the group concerning farm-city relations.

Tom Daughtry, mayor of Wheeler, also made a few remarks concerning the value of good farm-city relations.

The rest of the program was devoted primarily to discussion on Sweetwater Creek, its watershed tributaries and its economic value to Wheeler and Wheeler County.

A. B. Crump, an outstanding resident of Wheeler, told of the early day Sweetwater Creek; Eli Baker, Wheeler work unit conservationist, told of the condition of the creek now; and Chick Lowrey, Sayre, Okla., told of the future of the creek should a planned conservation program be put into effect.

O. W. Pendleton, County Commissioner, was also on hand to explain the problems created by flooding, he gave examples of recent floods and the cost to the county.

Dick DeArment, who was responsible for the program, showed several slides showing the damage resulting from floods and showing the proper way to control the creek.

Visitors for the meeting were Duain Barte, district soil conservation engineer from Pampa; Johnnie Burrell, Kelton; Ty Mills, Kelton; Bill Lakey, Cal Pierce, J. M. Burden and Jay French, all of Sayre; Clarence Zybach, Briscoe and Herbert Finsterwald of Mobeetie.

Following the program, committees were appointed to work on the Christmas activities planned for Wheeler, and Arling Cordell, James Verden and Henry Risner were appointed as a nominating committee to select nominees for new Chamber of Commerce officials.

CANADIAN PCA REDUCES INTEREST RATE, DECLARES STOCK DIVIDEND

A reduction of the interest rate and payment of a dividend on Class A stock has been announced by the Canadian Production Credit Association, agricultural credit organization serving a six county area of the Panhandle.

Orbin L. Crowsell, general manager of the association, announced that the interest rate, effective November 1, was reduced from seven to six and one half percent. The reduction will not effect loans already on the books on that date, he said.

"The rate reduction is in keeping with our policy to furnish credit at the lowest possible cost and still maintain a sound capital position," Crowsell said.

The reduction of the interest rate was approved by the association's board of directors at its October meeting.

At the same time, the board authorized the payment of a three percent dividend on all class A stock on record at the close of business, September 31, 1961. The dividend will be paid in stock and cash, Crowsell said.

"We appreciate the loyal support of stockholders who have purchased and kept additional stock to help capitalize their association," Crowsell said. "Without their investment we could not handle the fine volume of loans that we have enjoyed."

The Canadian Production Credit Association, owned and operated in its entirety by nearly 500 farmers and rancher stock holder-borrowers, loans more than \$3.5 million in short and intermediate term agricultural credit each year.

The association serves Oehltree, Lipscomb, Roberts, Hemphill, Gray and Wheeler counties. Offices are operated in Canadian, Wheeler, Pampa and Perryton.

Serving on the board of directors are President H. H. Keahy of White Deer, Vice President Wallace N. Hamker of Booker, C. B. Henderson of Wheeler, M. Lawrence Ellzey of Perryton and Hugh F. Parsell and Dale Nix of Canadian.

THE LIVING GOD

"My Soul thirsteth for God, for the living God." —Psa 42:2.

The phrase: "The living God," is often found in the Psalms, and is generally supposed to represent God in His omnipotence—His power to help. A more careful examination, however, will reveal that it has rather to do with His ability to respond. The gods of the heathen are, by contrast, like children's dolls, "the work of men's hands." They can give no intelligent response. "They have mouths, but they speak not; eyes have they, but they see not; they have ears but they hear not, neither is there any breath in their mouths" (Psa. 135:15-7).

The true God is a living God. He does see, hear and respond. Thus the Psalmist, in Psalm 42, compares himself to a stag, not seeking for help, but thirsting for refreshment. Read the Psalm and see how the writer longs for fellowship with the living God in His appointed place for worship.

The writer of Psalm 42 was evidently David, who had so earnestly longed to build a house for God whose splendor would far exceed that of his own palace. His son Solomon finally built this house and here God met, as it were, with His people.

Today the believer in Christ is brought closer to God than the Old Testament saints ever were. By faith in Christ, who died for our sins, the believer is "made accepted in the Beloved One" (Eph. 1:6) "justified freely by God's grace, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus" (Rom. 3:24) and "blessed with all spiritual blessings in heavenly places in Christ Jesus" (Eph. 1:3).

Therefore "we have access by faith into this grace wherein we stand" (Rom. 5:2) and are invited to "come boldly before the throne of grace that we may obtain mercy and find grace to help in time of need" (Heb. 4:16).

How wonderful to know "the living God," who understands and loves and cares and has provided eternal salvation for us in Christ!

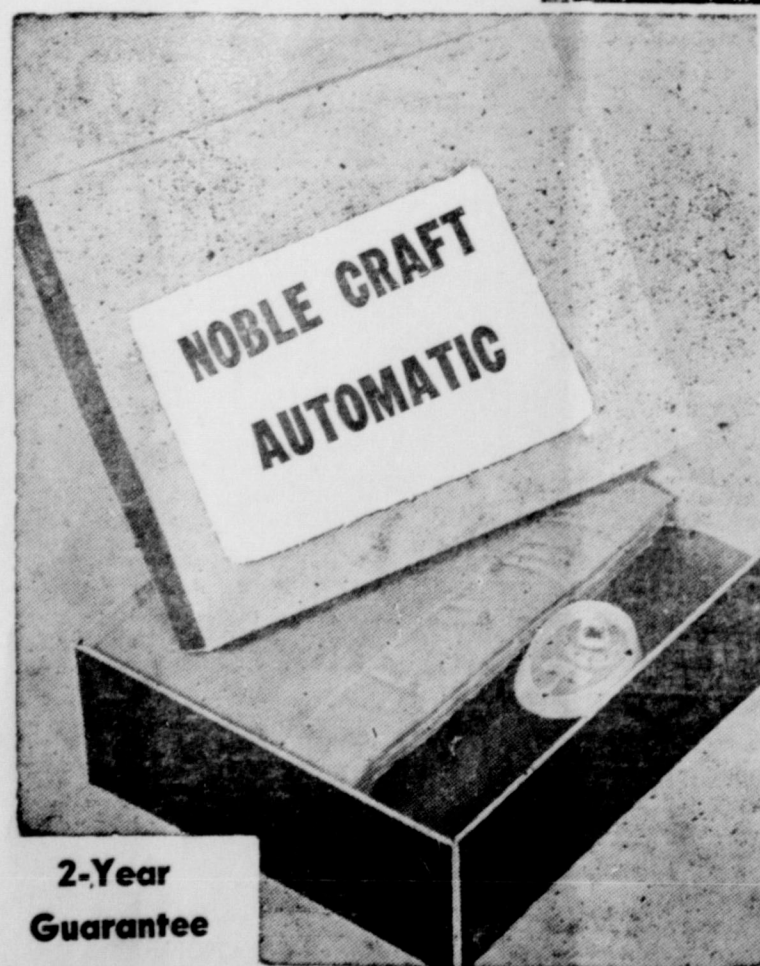

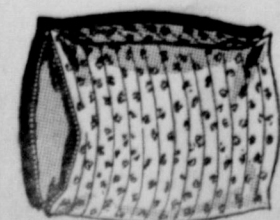

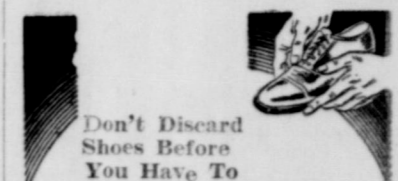

brought up again in the next session of Congress.

"There are those who say we don't want Federal Aid to Education because of Federal Control," the speaker said. "I say if the Federal Government is going to spend tax money by passing it out to school districts all over the country, it better have control!"

"I am opposed to Federal Aid to Education, but am more opposed to it without control," he added.

Turning to the problem of government spending, Mr. Rogers suggested that every member of his audience write the Government Printing Office for a copy of the U.S. Budget in Brief at 25c per copy.

"It is interesting reading and items are broken down so you can see where your money goes," he said.

Pointing out that 70c of every tax dollar goes for defense, the speaker said that "people are willing to pay taxes for defense but not for waste."

"A thousand dollars could be saved for every dollar spent," Mr. Rogers believes, "if a committee could be established and properly staffed to carefully study the budgets presented by the various boards, bureaus and departments and make their reports available to congressmen for use in making their decisions."

"As it is now, those people spend 18 months carefully building their budgets and the congressmen have to vote on them within three months, which places them at a definite disadvantage," Mr. Rogers pointed out.

In closing, the speaker touched on the comparative military strength of the United States and Russia.

"I am not afraid of Russia," he said. If Khrushchev ever drops a bomb, it will be the biggest mistake he ever made. We have a striking force with a second strike
