Expects to Present Plans for the New Annex on Return From a Trip of Inspection

Its good news indeed for Big Spring that A. J. Crawford has practically agreed to build an annex to the Crawford Hotel. It means another big boost for our city because we are losing money and new citizens because of the lack of hotel accommodations.

We need the proposed annex now to aid in taking care of the visitors flocking to our city just as much as we needed the Crawford hotel at the time of its erection.

That's a remark you hear quite often now, no rooms available at the hotels in Big Spring, we have to drive on to the next town.

When that news spreads up and down the line it hurts, for soon people make it a point to pass us up in the future for they fear they cannot secure accommodations here.

The assurance was given the directors of the Chamber of Commerce Monday night that he would take up the proposition of building an annex and present his plans as soon as he returned from a tour of inspection.

The Crawford Hotel has certainly enjoyed a full house program practically ever since it has opened for business and the annex will enjoy a similar patronage for the future growth of Big Spring is now an assured fact.

### 3 Trainmen Dead 8 Are Injured In Head-on Collision

### Street Work That Should Be Undertaken Now

The City Should Start Improving Howard Street Immediately and Have It In Good Shape

#### When Viaduct Starts

It Will Be Necessary to Close Gregg Street During Progress of Work On Viaduct

Most of us realize that while it is going to work a great hardship on citizens here in Big Spring, on every citizen in the county engaged in cotton raising particularly and for tourists from and to the North it is going to be necessary to close Gregg Street while work is underway on the viaduct across the railway tracks. And it will be necessary to divert travel over the railroad crossing in the east part of the city and Howard street will have to carry the traffic.

This street was never in extra good repair and considerable work is going to be necessary to get it in shape to handle the immense amount of traffic that will be diverted over it.

It will be just a little more than a month before work can be started on the viaduct so if the city starts right now on the work of repairing Howard street they will not have any time to waste. It will be a mistake to wait until Gregg Street is closed before the City makes a move to see that diverted traffic has a good thoroughfare over which to make the detour to reach the cotton gins and compress as well as the business section.

We merely point these things out because our City Commissioners are busy with their own affairs and may not realize the condition of Howard Street as it would not be a very good street to handle the big traffic it is going to be compelled to carry.

### Testing Wells Under Proration Plan Continues

With About Twenty-five Wells to Test it Will Take Until First of Next Week to Complete Task

#### Lease Sales \$237,000

In the McGinley Gusher Area, 3 New Tests Drilling Near the McGinley Well

New Drumright, Glasscock County Texas, Aug. 18.—The tests being made under the direction of the umpire, E. E. Andrews, completed today, were Marland's No. 1 Clay, from the 2500 foot pay 167 1-2 barrels and the F. H. E. Oil Company's No. 3-D Roberts from the 2500 foot pay 638 barrels. The F. H. E. has two wells from the deep pay and one from the 2500 foot pay yet to test. Those scheduled to begin on the 24 hour test Monday are: Schermerhorn Oil Co and the deep producer of Merrick and Bristow in the southwest corner of section 137.

The center of attraction during the week in the Howard Glasscock field was around the Henshaw area where a number of new tests are starting and several important leased deals were made. The testing of producing wells effected by the proration order of the Railroad Commission in order to establish the daily potential production of the various properties, began promptly on the 15th, Wednesday. The first property ready for the test was that of the Magnolia Petroleum Co. which showed a total of 7026 1-2 barrels daily from four wells of which three were from the deep pay horizon. Practically all of the field storage on the various properties are full of oil so that additional storage had to be built before the properties could be put on test.

The Roxana should be ready to begin running oil about Tuesday through the Shell line which will be the first relief for the field, with the exception of the Magnolia, who have a line to their tank farm near Istan, but who up to date, are only running their own oil. After the Magnolia completed their test they shut their wells all in until after the umpire has established the proration for the field.

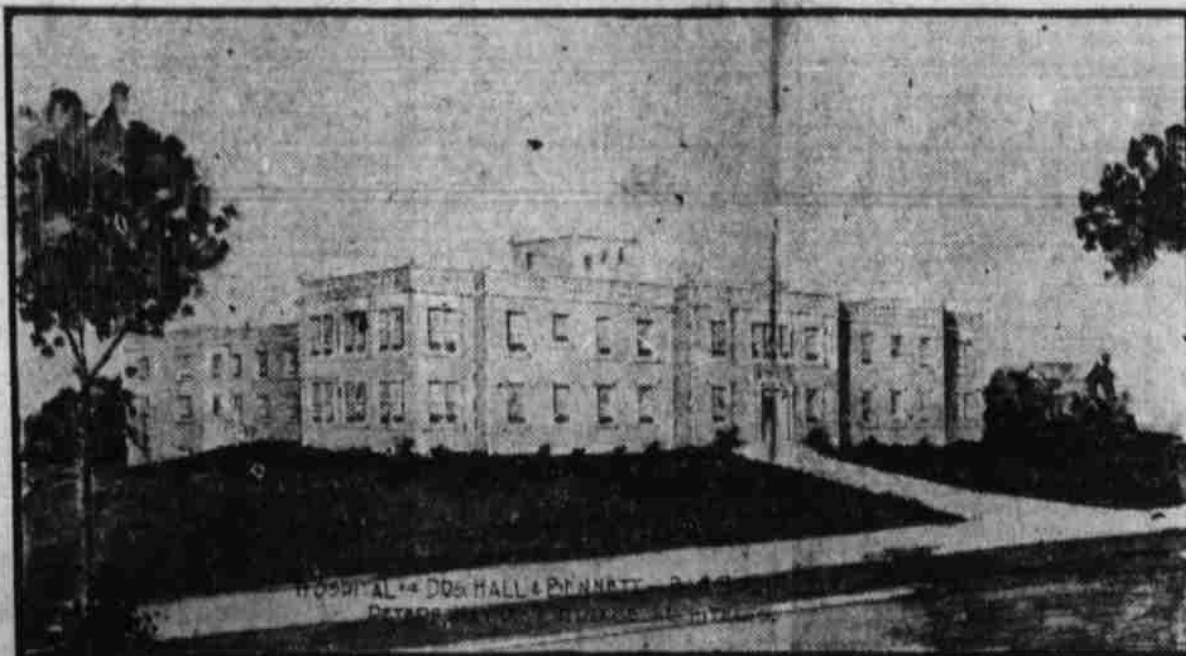
Sale Totals \$237,000

Three important lease transactions took place during the week. The largest made being that of the sale by Glasscock Brothers which totaled \$237,000, of which half was reported as cash and half from oil payments, for the north half of section 3, block 32 2 South. Lonnie Glasscock reports that the northwest quarter of this section, 160 acres, was sold to the California Company for a consideration of \$800, an acre while the northeast quarter, 137 acres, was sold to the Louisiana Oil and Refining Company, Standard subsidiary, and J. M. Edmondson of San Antonio at a price of \$800 an acre. In both transactions half of the purchase price was cash and half in oil payments. The northeast quarter carried a drilling obligation and the well is starting at once. The Louisiana Oil and Refining Company have the operating end. The other important lease deal was that made by the Roxana when they bought a lease on 160 acres from Hart Phillips out of section 23 block 33 2 South for \$28,000 or \$175 an acre. This property is located two miles west of Drumright and about two and a half miles southwest of the Henshaw et al producer in section 6. It is reported that the Roxana will begin a test on this property with in a short time.

The new producers during the week was one from the deep pay by Laurel and Cosden in the southeast corner of section 136, which produced 145 barrels an hour flowing for six hours before it was

The local building and loan association is a new thing in Big Spring, comparatively speaking—and it has been enjoying a good business since its organization about three months ago. The perfection of this organization has tended to boost the building program and will continue to be a big help in the erection of new buildings and new homes.

The building program is sure to increase as it seems every new home is rented before it is completed. Every home, rooming house, apartment, yes, even the tourist camps, are filled to overflowing. New people continue to pour into Big Spring, and we are going to have to provide some place for them to live. There is only one thing to be done, and that is to erect more houses. We are going to note a big increase in the building program between now and the first of the year. One like Big Spring has never experienced before. It will be difficult for the homefolks to recognize their old home town, when hundreds of more new homes are lined up in our fast growing city.

### Convicts Again Make Escape From Officers

Desperate Criminals Who Killed Prison Sergeant in Making Escape, Again at Large

#### Break Jail Richmond

A Statewide Search Will Be Made To Round Up These Dangerous Law Breakers

Richmond, Texas, Aug. 18 AP.—Five convicts who are charged with the murder of dog-sergeant, Henry Ward, in their break for liberty from the Imperial State prison farm number 2 at Sugarland two weeks ago, escaped from the Fort Bend county jail here Friday night.

The four succeeded in picking the lock on their cell and then worked the combination on the cell in which the fifth convict was locked. They climbed to the roof and slid down a rope made of blankets.

Sheriff Collins did not organize a posse to round up the convicts when he discovered they had escaped because of the long start the convicts had.

Those who escaped were: Alvin Ireland, serving one hundred and eleven years for bank robbery from Archer County; Irvin Davis serving two years for burglary from Callahan county; Bill Thompson serving thirteen years for burglary from Comanche county; Fred Burkett serving ten years for theft from Dallas county; John Collins serving two years for burglary from Bexar county.

### An Improvement Or Civic League For Service

A Number of Citizens Should Form Company to Build Rent Houses For Working People

#### More Homes Needed

We Can't Increase our Population Unless We Provide Adequate Accommodations

A number of our citizens joined together to erect a needed office building for Big Spring, and the move was a most commendable one. A similar organization should be formed to build a number of small rent houses which could be rented at reasonable rates to the vast number of new citizens now arriving and the many more yet to come. The need for rent houses is so great that the newcomers have been bidding against each other until they have rents rather high in our city. So high, in fact, that most working men find it a burden to pay the same.

The object of the company suggested would be to make a fair return on their investment but to keep the rents down as low as possible to enable workmen to secure accommodations at about the same price they would have to pay under normal conditions.

With refineries, factories, supply houses, tank farms, etc., locating here, and a big increase due in the number of railway employees due, the city and citizens are going to be expected to supply accommodations for the men who will man our industrial plants, railway, etc.

The manner in which we meet this emergency will in a measure forecast our future. If we are not big enough to take care of the citizens who want to locate in Big Spring they will go where they can secure accommodations.

If one hundred citizens would put \$1,000 each into a company to build small rent houses we could handle this problem. It would not be necessary to pay the money in except as needed.

We can't think of anything which would prove of greater benefit to the future of our city right now than a company such as is here suggested.

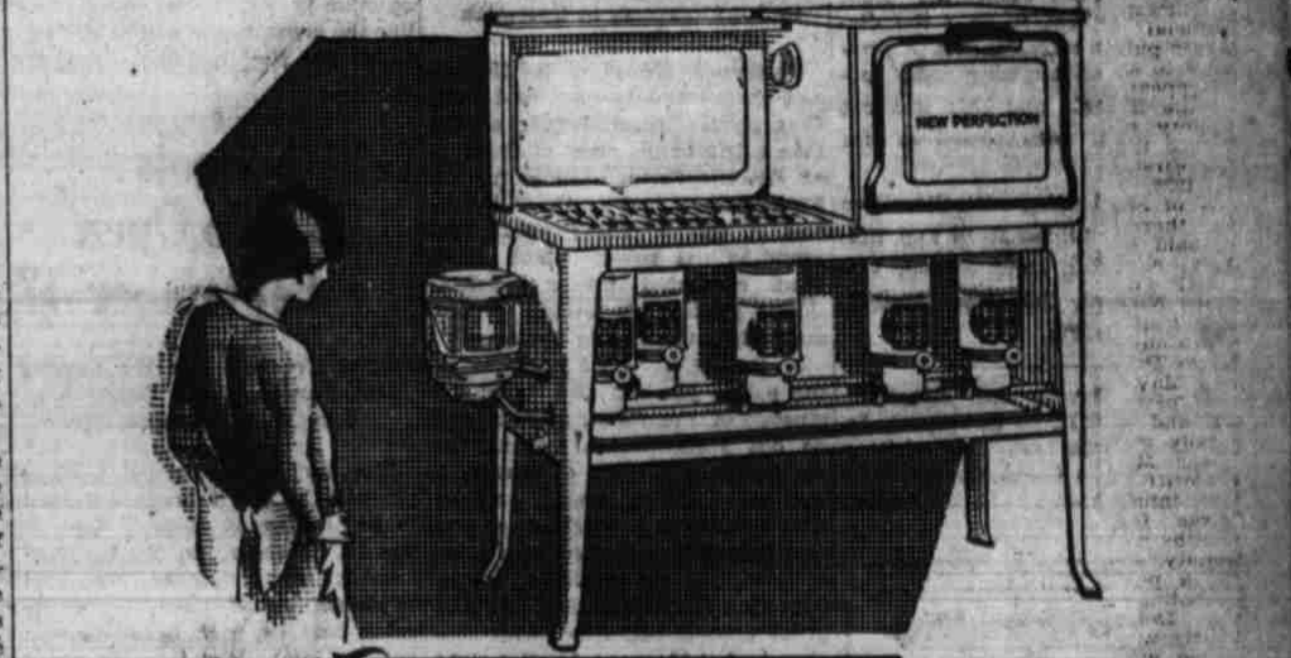

**Attractive Grounds At Power Plant**  
**Grass, Flowers, Trees and Shrubs Beautify Grounds of Texas Electric Service Co. Plant**  
**Proud Of Grounds**  
**Tour of Inspection Through Plant to See Machinery in Operation**

Those who love grass and flowers and shrubs and love to feast their eyes upon nature's beauty should take a trip to the plant of the Texas Electric Service Company, on Front Street, just north of the T. and P. tracks. The grounds surrounding the power plant have been converted into a beautiful flower garden as lovely as the most attractive in Big Spring.

J. B. Dalton, chief engineer at the power plant is also "chief engineer" of the flower garden and he has succeeded in making the surroundings a thing of beauty. A well kept, grassy lawn, outlined with a hedge of firebush, green and well trimmed, is spotted with flower beds, that are a riot of colors. Centering the grassy lawn is a diamond shaped bed filled with zinnias, in full bloom. A lovelier sight you could not wish for. The grounds are also bordered with zinnias that are lovely and form a mass of beautiful colorings.

Shrubs, trees and vines also dot the premises and give the plant a pretty background.

**Pride In His Plant**  
 Only a year ago this garden spot was a barren rocky place. Mr. Dalton, who takes pride in his plant, and has a desire to keep his company's plant in the lead, decided to beautify the grounds. In spare moments he together with some of the other men at the plant, set out trees, shrubs and prepared the flower beds for the seed. They have given the premises much care and attention and as a result, these surroundings are the most attractive that can be found surrounding any business house in Big Spring.

It is difficult for us to describe the loveliness of the spot and it will do you good to drive by the plant and feast your eyes on the scene of beauty.

**\$150,000 Power Plant**  
 While visiting the grounds we were invited to take a trip of inspection through the power plant, where electricity for all of Big Spring and many other towns is manufactured. The magnitude of the plant and the machinery therein is difficult to describe, and its workings are even more difficult for one, not familiar with the industry, to understand. The plant, valued at approximately \$150,000, is one of the finest and most modern in the southwest and one of Big Spring's biggest assets.

**Oil Development Now Busy On Interesting Tests**

**Proration Completed On Ten Wells Show a Daily Production of 15,944 Barrels**

**New Wells Planned**

**Meriwether Donnelly and Louisiana Oil Companies' Tests Are Interesting Tests of Territory**

By S. F. BALENTINE

New Drumright, Glasscock County, Aug. 23.—The production test to establish the daily potential for the field, for the 24 hour period ending yesterday gave the F. H. E. Oil Company's No. 6-E Roberts 2856 barrels daily or 119 barrels an hour.

This completes the production test from six producers from the deep lime pay from the 2500 foot horizon. The total potential production for the ten wells tested to date is 15,944 barrels or a per well average of 1597 barrels daily. The No. 1 Roberts on the Owen and Sleas lease is on the 24 hour production test today.

Yesterday two locations were made in the field, both however, are offsets and will not mean anything in field extension. One by the F. H. E. Oil company, and known as No. 5-B Roberts located 1650 feet from north line and 2310 feet from west line of section 137, block 29. One by Marland recorded as No. 2-F, Clay 1070 feet from the East line and 250 feet from North line of section 138, block 29.

Donnelly's test located in the Southwest corner of the northeast quarter of section 127, block 29, is a key well on the northeast trend and the information from the drilling will record more history for the field, that is important to the fraternity.

The surface elevation at this location is given as 2674 feet; the lime was topped according to the horizon recorded by the writer at 2095 feet; a number of the geologists are running the lime top here at 2175 feet. The writer's tabulation shows the lime 579 feet above sea level compared with 575 feet at Cosden and Company's No. 1 Roberts in section 129. Should the penetration of the lime run the same as at the Cosden No. 1 then the Donnelly should top the deep pay at 2986 feet with the water level showing at 3014 feet.

With the lime penetration considered the Donally should make a producer on a par with Cosden's No. 1. The southeast quarter of section 127 should run high enough for the structure so that it will be in the horizon of good production from the deep lime pay. Frank M. Green is preparing to drill a deep test in the center of the south line of the east half of this quarter.

The next important test in the field from the standpoint of information is that of the Louisiana Oil and Refining Company located in the southwest corner of the northeast quarter of section 3, blk. 32 2-South. This test is a half mile and 1725 feet north of the Henshaw et al, which extended the field three miles west. The hole has been spudded and drilling will start about Sept. 1 according to Lonnie Glasscock.

The Meriwether Oil Company's test on the McDowell ranch is attracting considerable attention at this time. This test will have the water shut off at a depth of 3738 feet and should be able to make a good test of the pay horizon found in the top of the lime by the General Oil Company in their No. 4 McDowell, which they are offsetting northeast. The five inch will be cemented in the Meriwether Friday, it is reported.

None of the occupants were injured. The Stanton car left their hub cap behind, and were trailed by the Big Springers as soon as they reached Stanton. The father of the driver of the new Ford settled with them for the damage. (Reported).
