CHARLES FULTZ SERVICES HELD AT MOBEETIE

Charles Elmer Fultz was born at Boliver in Polk County, Mo., May 16, 1891, and passed away Feb. 27, 1963 at 5:55 at the age of 71 years, 9 months, and 11 days.

Mr. Fultz had resided at Mobeetie for the past 20 years, coming to the community from Petrolia, Tex. He was a farmer during his active life. He resided with sister, Mrs. Nora Trusty, at Mobeetie. He never married.

He was a member of Worlington, Red American Legion Post No. 509 at Mobeetie, having served his country during World War I as a Wagoner of Supply Co. 131st Field Artillery. He entered service at Gainesville, Oct. 8, 1917 and was discharged by reason of demobilization on March 29, 1919.

Mr. Fultz had been in bad health for the past several years and seriously ill for the past several months.

Funeral services were held at the First Baptist Church in Mobeetie March 1, 1963 at 2 p.m. with the pastor, Rev. Charles Uzzle officiating and assisted by Rev. D. C. Read, pastor of the First Methodist Church.

Survivors are one brother, Ernest Fultz of Marietta, Okla.; two sisters, Mrs. Nora Trusty of Mobeetie and Mrs. Kate Gibbs of Vernon, Tex.

Three brothers and one sister preceded him in death.

ing done to change delinquent boys into useful citizens. It is thrilling to hear of the changes some of the boys have made.

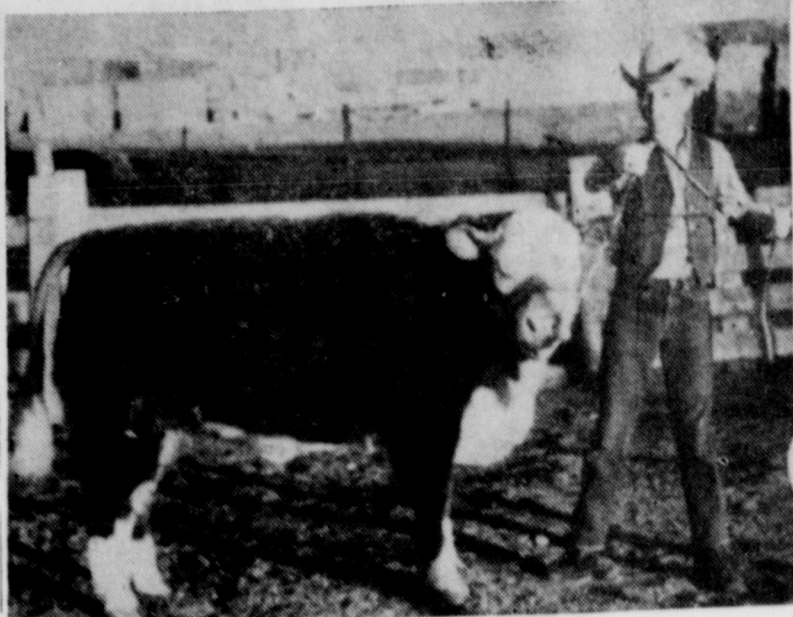

The group also agreed to co-operate with the other 4-H clubs in the county to broadcast five minute programs each day from Station KEVA in Shamrock.

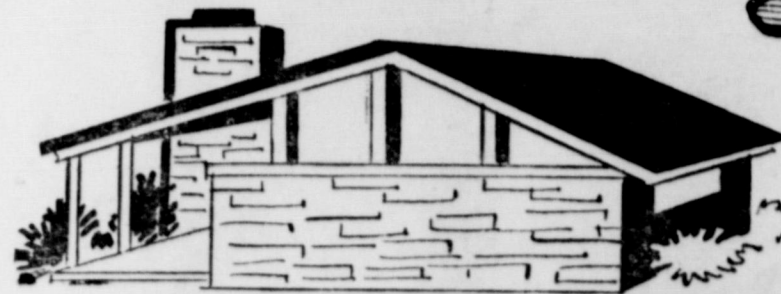

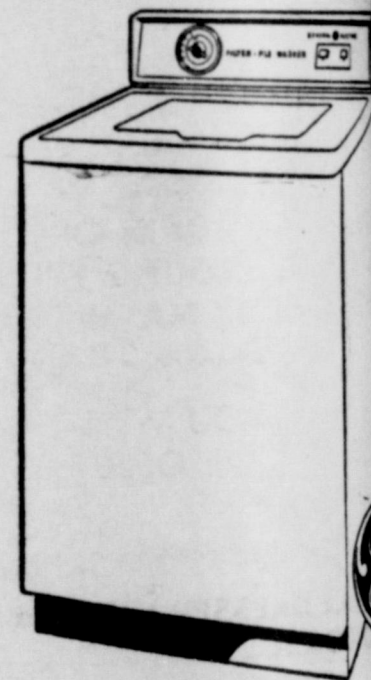

TIME TO SIGN UP FOR FEED, GRAIN PROGRAM NOW

Wheeler County farmers are now nearing the midway point in the February 1-March 22 sign-up dates for the 1963 Feed Grain program. Though it is very similar to the 1962 program several changes have been made which could affect a farmer's decision on whether or not to participate.

Listed are these significant changes. A direct price support payment of 18 cents per bushel on corn, 14 cents or barley and 29 cents per hundred weight on grain sorghum has been added. This amount to be paid particularly farmers on the normal yield of their seeded acreage. For the first time, a farmer receives this payment even if he feeds his grain. Secondly, rates of payment on diverted acres have been reduced to 20 percent of the value of a normal crop on the first 20 percent diverted and to 50 percent of the value on all or any part of the second 20 percent diverted.

Thirdly, price support loans will be available to participating farmers on total yield this year instead of only normal yield as in the past.

Fourthly, the grazing period for diverted acres has been set in advance. Diverted acres may be grazed until May 1 and again after November 1.

Fifthly, after the sign-up period has ended on March 22, there can be no reduction in diversion without losing all price support benefits.

The change in compliance regulations makes it all the more important for a feed grain producer to make his decision before March 22 since he can change his intentions until that date.

mately 25 bushels per acre. At the average price of \$2.50 per bushel, this would represent an income of \$62.50 per acre.

This income does not approach that which might be obtained from cotton. Those producing yields of 40 bushels or more can realize gross income comparable to those obtained from grain.

The extension service cannot recommend the planting of soy beans in non-irrigated areas. Yields are dependent upon adequate moisture levels from blooming until maturity.

The soil-improving effect of a soybean crop harvested for seed is of questionable value from the standpoint of adding nutrients. The total amount of nitrogen might be increased slightly, if the plants were well nodulated. Soybeans will reduce other mineral elements of the soil. Soybean production will improve the tilth of the soil. Experimental results have shown that yields of crops in rotation with soy beans will increase and evidently this increase is associated with greater water intake and better weed control following soybean production.

Lee and Hill are the parities that are recommended for this area. Hill has an earlier maturing date on October 1 and Lee on October 26.

One bushel of soybeans contains approximately 3 pounds of nitrogen, 1/2 pounds of phosphorus and 1 1/2 pounds of K(2) O.

Acres of soybeans has increased in the US from an average of 20,229,000 acres for the years 1951-1960 to 28,703,000 acres for the year 1962. Most observers predict that there will be 3 to 5 percent increase in acreage in 1963.

Even though there has been a government support market continues to be good this program will probably continue.

TO THE RESIDENTS OF WHEELER COUNTY, TEXAS, AND ANY OTHER INTERESTED PARTIES:

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that after publication hereof, the undersigned intend to apply to the Texas Legislature at its regular session in 1963 for the passage of Act Creating a Hospital District over a part of Wheeler County under the authority granted by Section 9 of Article IX of the Texas Constitution, the general purposes and nature of such act being expressed as follows:

"AN ACT providing for the creation of a hospital district with boundaries coterminous with those of Commissioners' Precincts Numbered 1 and 2 of Wheeler County, Texas, pursuant to authority granted by Section 9 of Article IX of the Texas Constitution; providing for elections on the questions of the creation of such District and the levy of a tax not to exceed Seventy-five Cents (75c) for its maintenance support and the providing of bonds issued by it; providing the District with power to issue bonds, and methods for authorizing same, for the purpose of the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of buildings and improvements and equipping same for hospital purposes, and for any and all such purposes, and for refunding of such bonds; providing that bonds issued by the District shall be lawful investments and security for certain funds; providing a governing body for such District, its powers and duties and the tenure of its members providing that no other municipality or political subdivisions shall have the power to levy taxes or issue bonds or other obligations for hospital purposes or for providing medical care within the boundaries of said District; enacting other provisions incident and germane to the subject and purpose of this Act; providing a severance clause and declaring an emergency."

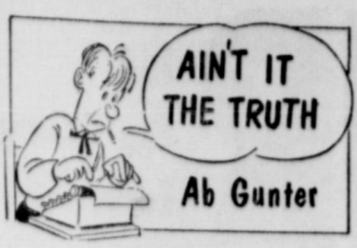

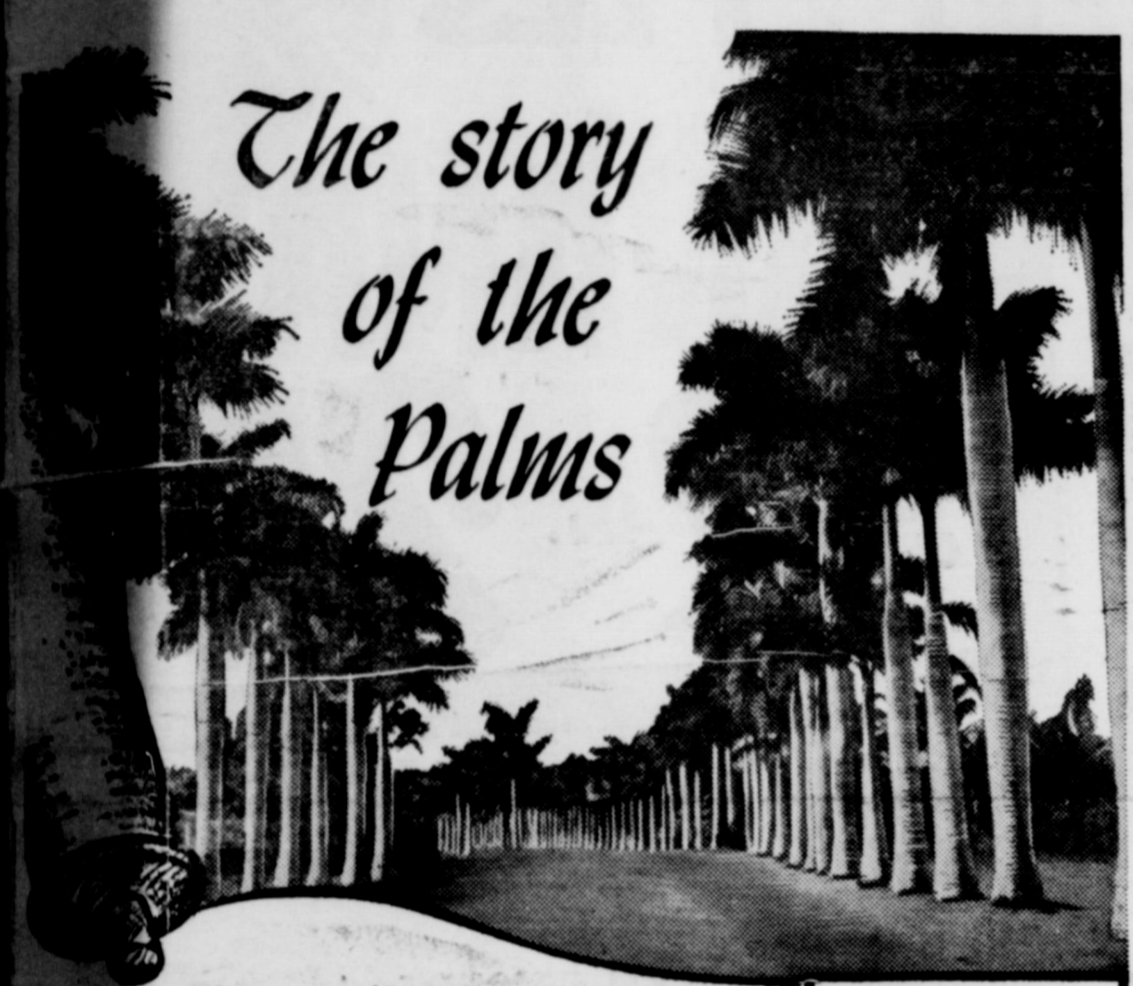
