FAIR TO BE HELD FRIDAY and SATURDAY

All of the plans are complete for the Fifth Annual Free Fair to be held in Wheeler this weekend, Friday and Saturday, August 25 and 26.

Carnival rides have already been set up behind the Legion Building and have been in operation all week. The rides will open at 1:00 P.M. Friday and Saturday.

The band boosters have set up concession stands at the rides and they plan to operate all during the fair.

Cora Hyatt has been doing a tremendous job with the Flower Show each year, and this will be no exception. You have probably noticed some of the many signs she has distributed throughout the city. Put the Flower show

down as a must on your visit to the fair.

Judging of the exhibits will be held Thursday night, so all exhibits should be in place by 6:00 P.M. Thursday afternoon. They will remain on display Friday and Saturday.

Rules for the fair will be as follows:

1. Only entries from those living and attending school in Wheeler County will be eligible.
2. Individual farm products must have been grown by members of the community represented during 1961 Open Division for displaying all products.
3. All products will be judged prior to 12 A.M. Saturday, August 26th. All entries must comply with

the Department rules.

4. Entries must comply with the Department rules as set out. All entries will be classified and put in the proper class by the director or assistant of each Department and should there be any questions, the director and judge will determine what class is correct.
5. The Fair will not be responsible for any loss, damage, or injury of exhibitor, but will try to take all precautions possible.
6. All entries must comply with the Department rules as to entry date and must remain until released by the director of each department and in no case will the release time be later than 6 P.M. Saturday, the 26th of August.

7. If any class is not filled, ribbons will be awarded according to Judge placing.

Some of the different divisions of the fair include: The Flower Show, Women's and Girl's Division of Educational Exhibits, Junior Livestock, Products, Community Booths, Creative Arts, Pet Show, Entertainment and Commercial Booths.

Everyone in the surrounding area is invited to come to Wheeler on these days and enter any kind of hobbies, foods, arts and crafts, flowers, clothing or anything else of interest, in the fair. The purpose of the fair is to reflect the agriculture and industrial development of the county and the Wheeler Fair Association asks each of

you to help make this fair the best in the Panhandle.

The Catalogue chairman, James Varden, has completed a very attractive fair catalogue. The Catalogue can be secured from James Varden at the Canadian Production Credit Association.

Fair booths and concessions both will be in the American Legion Building.

Not in favor of war, in fact a natural born coward, but I have let the commies take enough. I for one am ready to take one of those so-called Ted-Rosevelt stands.

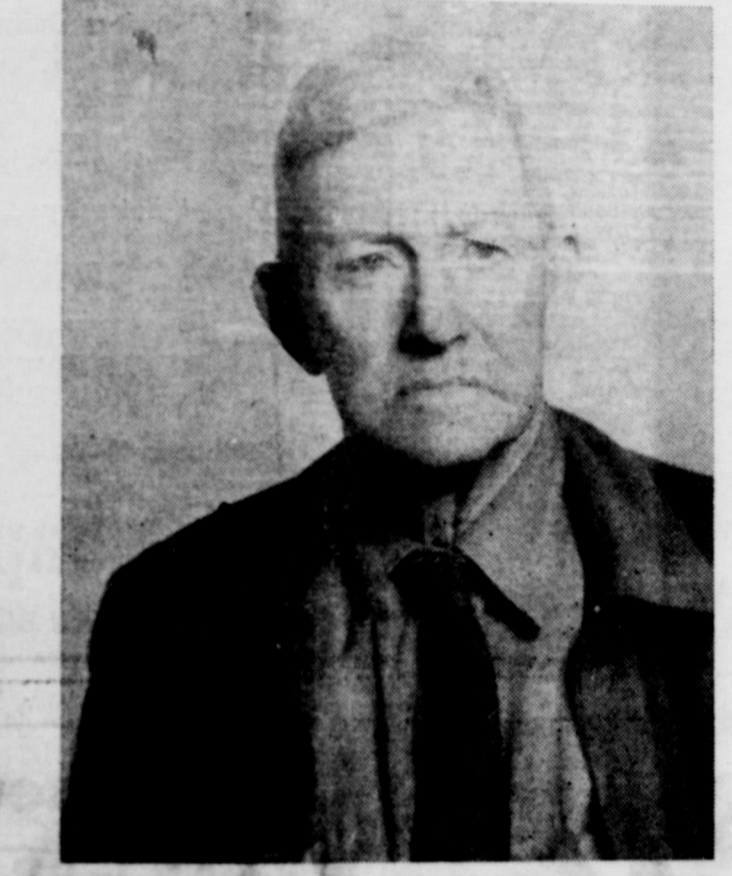

AND NOW HE IS GONE: One of the greatest men to ever live in Wheeler Co. was J. C. Moore. He probably helped more people both financially and spiritually than any other person who ever lived in these parts. Mr. Moore had a homespun philosophy that was known to all. He will be remembered forever as one of the real pioneers of Wheeler County.

Funeral Services Are Held For Mr. Moore

Funeral services for J. C. Moore, retired prominent area farmer, were conducted Monday afternoon at 3:00 p.m. in the First Baptist Church here. Rev. M. B. Smith of Big Springs officiated, assisted by Rev. Frank Ross, pastor. Interment was in Wheeler Cemetery under the direction of Kirk Funeral Home.

James Carson Moore was born August 14, 1874 in Mesquite, Tex., and died at his home in Wheeler at 10:30 a.m. August 19 at the age of 87 years, 5 days. He was married to Alice Addie Thomas at Cresson, Tex., on January 1, 1900 and lived there until he moved to Wheeler County in 1918.

Early in life, J. C., as he was known by young and old alike, was left an orphan and while still in his teens he began to work on the Ft. Worth and Denver Railroad at 50c a day to help support his younger brothers and sisters. Later he punched cattle for some of the ranchers in the Ft. Worth area.

From his very first earnings and throughout his life, he believed in and practiced hard work and thriftiness and had acquired a comfortable estate. "Use it up, make it last, wear it out, was his life long motto.

Mr. Moore was a straight forward and unpretentious, yet he was proud of his accomplishments. Strongly self-disciplined, he supplied a bountiful living, yet he ate sparingly and dressed modestly, at times almost shabbily.

He had very little schooling, yet he had gleaned a better than average education from many, many hours of reading and a wide business experience. Though he always considered himself a farmer, he engaged in a number of enterprises, and he took pride in the fact that he had helped many people to own a home.

During middle age, many people saw in Mr. Moore a striking resemblance to the late Will Rogers, and his ready wit and keen mind seemed to enhance that likeness. He also possessed that same homespun philosophy, genuine interest and faith in his fellow man, that characterized the famous Cowboy Humorist.

VOTE ON 1962 WHEAT QUOTA SET FOR AUG. 24

Wheat producers will determine whether or not wheat market quotas will be in effect on the 1962 wheat crop on August 24.

Polling Places:

- Communities A & B — Commissioner's Courtroom — Courthouse, Wheeler, Texas
- Community C — Elevator—Mob beetle, Texas
- Communities D & E—City Hall — Shamrock, Texas

Owners, operators, and their wives who share in the wheat crop on those farms for which Form MQ-24, Notice of 1962 Farm Wheat Acreage Allotment, Marketing Quota and Marketing Quota Exemption, shows 13.6 or more in the allotment acreage space and those that have an entry of 13.5 in the Marketing Quota Exemption space will be eligible to vote in the 1962 Wheat Referendum.

The decision farmers make is extremely important to them and to the rest of the Nation not only for 1962, but for many years to come," said Secretary of Agriculture, Orville L. Freeman when he announced the referendum date. "The program available with quotas in effect would be far different from that which could be operated without quotas," he added.

If two-thirds of the referendum voters favor quotas, cooperators will be eligible for full 1962 wheat price support. Although the level of support has not definitely been determined, it will be higher than the present level of \$1.79 per bu. if proposed legislation now before Congress becomes law. At a recent press conference, Secretary Freeman said that the national average support for wheat would likely be in the neighborhood of \$2.00 per bushel.

If farmers decide in the referendum against quotas, there will be no limit on marketing, price support.

THE GRACE OF GOD

In the Bible, the grace of God is His loving favor toward fallen man. St. Paul has more to say about grace than any other Bible writer, opening every one of his epistles with the declaration: "Grace be unto you and peace."

Little wonder, for he himself was God's greatest demonstration of salvation by grace. In Tim. 1:13, 14, he says: "(I) was before a blasphemer and persecutor, and injurious; but I obtained mercy . . . and the grace of our Lord was exceeding abundant . . ."

After years of service and suffering for Christ, he decided: "But none of these things move me, neither count I my life dear unto myself, so that I might finish my course with joy, and the ministry which I have received of the Lord Jesus, to testify the Gospel (Good News) of the grace of God" (Acts 20:24).

Salvation is wholly by God's grace, not partly by man's works, for in Rom. 11:6 we read: ". . . If it be by grace, then it is no more of works; otherwise grace is more grace." And in Rom. 4:4,5: ". . . to him that worketh is the reward not reckoned of grace, but of debt, but to him that worketh not, but believeth on him that justifieth the ungodly, his faith is counted for righteousness." Thus salvation is "not of works" but "unto good works" (Eph. 2:8-10). Good works is the fruit, not the root.

"All have sinned" (Rom. 3:23) but, thank God, all may be "Justified freely by His grace, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus" (Rom. 3:24).

Thus it is God's purpose "that in the ages to come He might show the exceeding riches of His grace in kindness toward us through Christ Jesus" (Eph. 2:7).

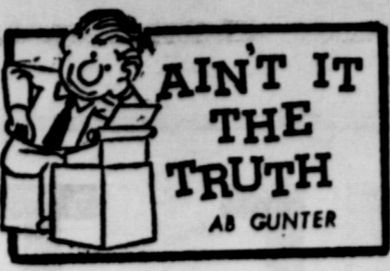

The rodeo's two performances, Sunday and Monday, will be held at 2:30 P.M.

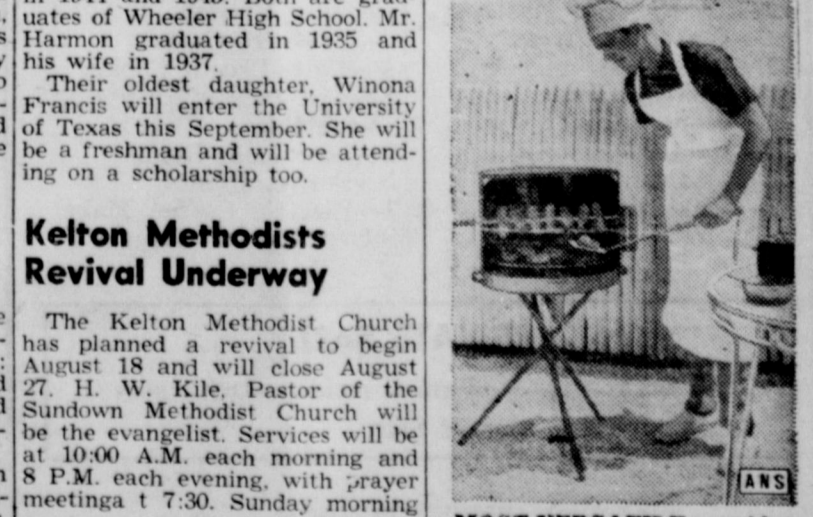
HARMONS MOVING TO AUSTIN, TEXAS

port would be at 50 per cent of parity (wheat parity is \$2.37 per bushel) and would be available to those farmers within their acreage allotments.

On May 12, Secretary Freeman proclaimed marketing quotas and a national acreage allotment of 55 million acres for the 1962 wheat crop on the basis of estimated supplies and utilization of wheat. At that time he deferred setting the date for the referendum pending action to provide an improved wheat program for next year's crop.

"Though action has not been completed on a new program," the Secretary explained, "it seems desirable to now set a date for the referendum on 1962 marketing quotas in order that all producers may be appraised of the voting time. Under legislation now being considered, stocks of wheat would probably be reduced by 100 million bushels rather than increased by that amount of changes are not made. This would result in savings to the government on this one crop of \$50 million in the first year, and in the period before new stocks could be disposed of at present rates the savings on this one crop would amount to \$258 million."

City Council Changes Rates On Water, Sewer

The City Council met in a regular session Thursday, August 3, and discussed a survey which disclosed irregularities in charges for water, sewer and sanitation fees in the city.

The following regulations were passed and put into effect as of August 1, 1961. The changes will appear on your next bill.

1. Charge \$2.50 per sewer rates on all service stations, hotels and cafes.
 2. Charge \$3.50 sewer rates on all trailer parks, motels, laundries, Court House and Hospital.
 3. Charge every business in town \$1.50 sanitation fee.
 4. Charge each business and residence the minimum water, sewer, and sanitation rate on each business and or residence when occupied where they are on the same meter.
- If you have a question, the council asks that you appear in person September 7 at 7:00 p.m. at the city office.

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LICENSE LAWS ARE EXPLAINED

Several times in the last two years applicants for marriage licenses have had to postpone weddings, in some instances where invitations had been mailed out, because they failed to make application for their marriage license in time to satisfy the law, Harry Wofford, County Clerk, said.

The law provides that if the male is 21 or above, the marriage license may be issued immediately upon application to the County Clerk, provided each party can present documentary proof of age and has obtained a blood test from an approved state laboratory. The blood test is good for only 15 days — which means that only 15 days may elapse from the date the blood is taken until the marriage is performed.

If one or both of the parties are under age when application is made, they must meet specifications above and in addition each minor must be accompanied by a parent or a legal guardian when application is made. The parent or guardian must appear before the County Clerk in person. After application is made there is what is known as a three-day waiting period for minors, but in compliance with the waiting period the date application is made may not be counted and the date the license is issued cannot be counted, making in reality a FIVE-DAY WAITING PERIOD.

If you are planning a wedding, please allow time to conform to the law in making application for your license in order that you may not be disappointed, Wofford concluded.

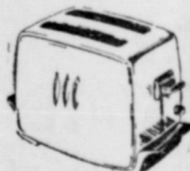

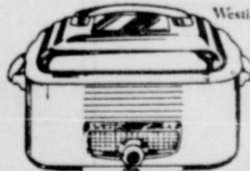
