Diversion Terraces

Tired of plowing in those little gullies in your field after every rain? Why not do something about it? What you probably need is a diversion terrace.

A diversion is an individually designed terrace. It is constructed for the purpose of intercepting surface runoff and conducting it at a safe velocity to a protected outlet.

Diversions have a number of uses. The most common being the protection of cropland from adjoining land; to divert water into or away from pond; protect active gullies from excess water; and break up the concentration of water on long, gentle slopes, the slope being too flat for standard terracing.

A certain amount of planning should be done before constructing diversion terraces. The outlet of the diversion should be protected by a good grass sod. The outlet should also be capable of carrying the additional water brought in by the diversion without damage.

In many instances, outlets may not be available to take care of the excess water. They may first need to be established by shaping and planting to permanent grass. The diversion should not be constructed until the outlets are well established.

When diversions are put in to protect cropland from runoff from adjoining grassland, they should be constructed in the grassland. This will help eliminate the sediment from collecting in the channel. It will also allow the diversion to be utilized for grazing.

When laying out a diversion, consideration should be given to the location and the grade of the diversion. The diversion should be constructed from the terrace.

Sharon Stiles To Wed Lt. Swindler

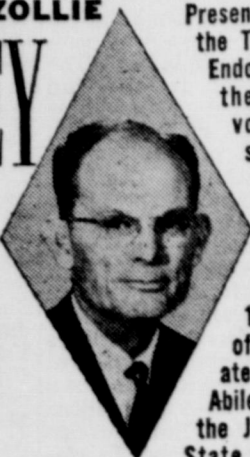
