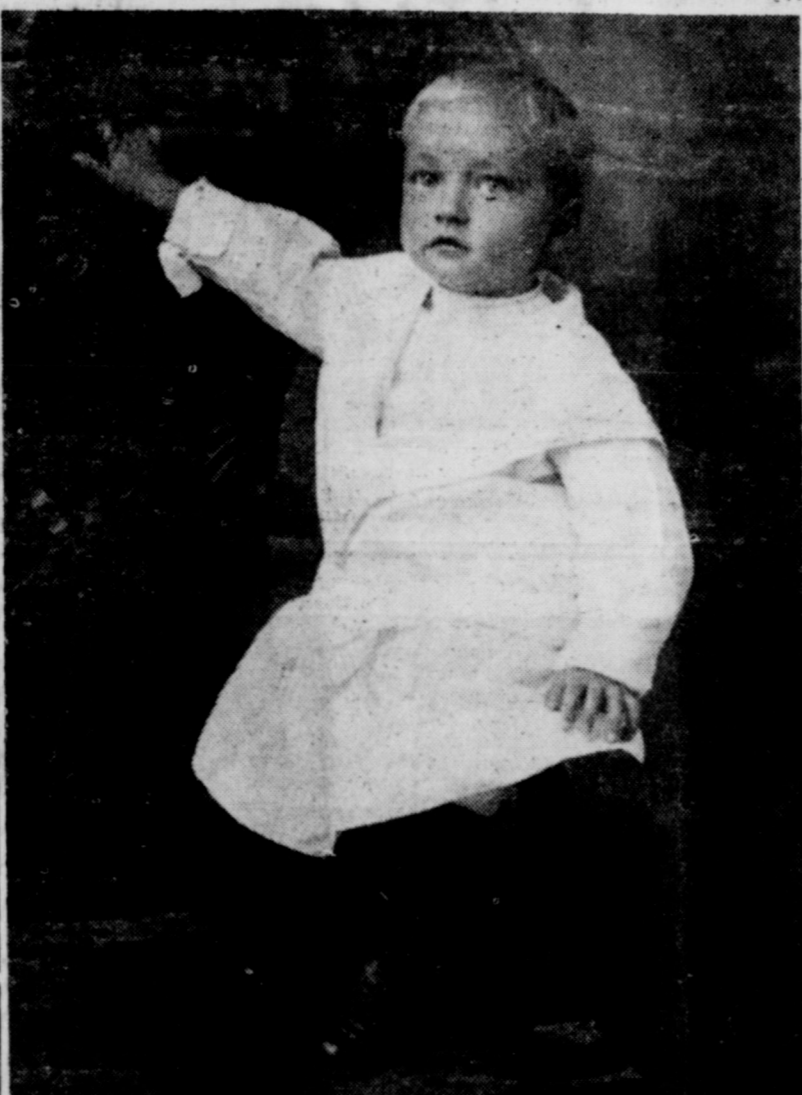

## DABERRY WAS WHO-ZIT IN LAST ISSUE

John Daberry, 55, farmer in the Kelton community, was the person pictured as last week's WHO-ZIT. John and his wife, Ella Mae (known to many as Susie), moved to their present location in 1939. He attended high school in Montague County.

On his 640 acre farm 2 1/2 miles southeast of Kelton, John raises cotton, wheat, cattle and hogs.

John is a very cooperative hard-working, civic minded man who is too modest to admit what he has really done for his community and county. ## CAR TAGS GO ON SALE FEB. 1

New license plates for 1962 will go on sale in Wheeler County February 1. County Tax Assessor Thurman Rives announced today. The plates have white letters and numerals on a black background. Wheeler County plates begin with AT 2900.

Rives stated that four and one-half million motor vehicle registrations were bought by Texans in 1961.

Don't be at the end of the line. Get your vehicle registered early. Rives urged. "The registration deadline is April 1, but we hope car and truck owners will put on the new plates as soon as possible."

"Bring your certificate of title and your last year's registration receipt. Penalty for improper registration of a vehicle can be as much as \$200. Don't risk an illegal registration. Remember, too, that a portion of all registration fees stay in your home county to benefit your local community."

The first election to be held in Wheeler will be the city election, under the direction of Election Judge A. B. Crump. Mr. Crump

has stated that the filing deadline in the city election is March 2 and the election will be held Tuesday, April 3.

It was revealed today that T. J. Daughtry, who has done an outstanding job as Mayor of Wheeler for the past four years, has agreed to run for the same position in the City Government. Although Mayor Daughtry has previously announced that he would not be a candidate for re-election he states that in the past weeks a large number of people have prevailed upon him to again offer himself as a candidate for the office. In conversation with Mayor Daughtry, it was noted that he needs his time in the operation of his business but as a result of pressure being brought by numerous citizens of Wheeler urging him to run and his feelings toward his town, he has agreed.

The general opinion, being expressed by many people around town is that this is good news for the town of Wheeler. Mr. Daughtry has made us a good mayor and it is a good feeling to realize that in this case the situation is as it should be, the office seeking the man instead of the man seeking the office. Wheeler is on the move and we need good men in leadership. The record indicates that Mayor Daughtry has been just that and his announcement to run for re-election is to be appreciated by all because it is out of a sense of duty, and only that, that he made the decision.

Luther Parks has announced his decision to run for city councilman. The term of James Verden is expiring and Mr. Verden has indicated that he doesn't intend to run for re-election. W. D. Mitchell's term is also expiring and he has indicated that he will be seeking his second term as councilman.

Since the deadline for announcing for County Office, subject to the action of the voters in the democratic primary of May 5th is at hand and no definite word is available as to whether Wheeler County will have a county and district Clerk's office or just one office to be known as County-District Clerk Office, Mrs. Rena Sivage (Harold) announces her candidacy for the office. Mrs. Sivage has served in the capacity of the District Clerk's office for the past six years.

Rena was born in the Kelton community and is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. C. Johnson of the Kelton community. She married Harold Sivage in 1957. He is the son of Mrs. Irene Sivage and the late W. C. Sivage and moved to Wheeler and has since made her home. The mighty Briscoe Broncos took two conference victories from the Wheeler teams as the girls trampled Wheeler 65-52 and the boys outscored the Mustangs 62-51.

Ruby Barton maintained her thirty-plus scoring average for the season as she hit 38 points. Lucille Bradshaw chipped in eight while Annie Riley and Wanda Pierce and Estelle Fillingim had two each. Charlene Fulks led Briscoe with 33 followed by Sheryl Wheeler's 25.

Wheeler's Bill Green flipped the net for 18 counters to lead the boys scoring and Mendall Hunter hit 15, but the Mustangs still fell to the well-balanced scoring machine of Coach Jack Webster, 62-51. Bobby Swift hit ten points for the Broncos, Jerry Keelin had nine, while Ray Hendricks and J. Michael Meek had eight each.

In Friday's action, Ruby Barton scored 35 points as the Mustangs ettes edged by Miami 53-51. Jaque Gill hit 28 for the losers. Miami boys led by Scotty Daughtry's 25 points, downed the Mustangs 61-51. Bill Green had 19 points followed by Mendall Hunter and Bobby Treadwell with ten each.

In the "B" boys contest Daryl Snellgroves scored 16 points to lead Wheeler to a convincing 46-19 win over the young warriors. Jim Flowers had eight tallies for the losers.

Friday night, February 2, the Wheeler teams will travel to Mobeetie for their final Conference game of the season.

## Democratic Executive Committee To Meet

County Democratic Chairman, A. B. Crump, announced today that a meeting of the Wheeler County Democratic Executive Committee will be held in the District Courtroom in Wheeler February 8 at 10:00 a.m. provided by the state election code.

The purpose of the meeting will be to estimate the cost of the first and second primaries and assess District, County and Precinct offices the amount to pay for the expense of holding such elections. And to draw for places in which names will appear on the ballot in the first primary to be held May 5th.

Judges must be appointed and places must be selected to hold the primaries. A decision will also be reached on the pay for judges and clerks. The time and place for the precinct and county conventions will also be determined during the Thursday meeting.

County Chairman Crump also indicated that any and all business pertaining to the primaries or conventions will be discussed. Crump urged all committeemen to attend the meeting and said he would be glad for as many candidates and voters as possible to attend the meeting.

Final date for candidates to pay their filing fee is Monday, February 5.

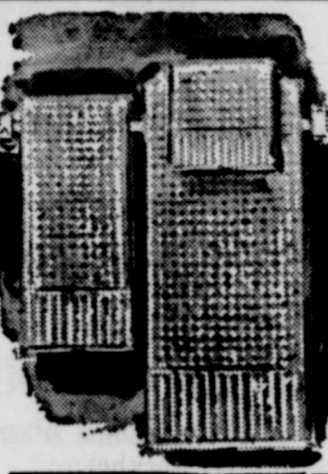
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## TWITTY NEWS

Jesus tells me much about religion, yet he not once mentions or uses the term in his public or personal communication. Is not this strange?

This does not seem so strange when I pause to consider that the burden of our Master's message was not built around outward or external manifestations of one's thoughts. Rather, He has been most interested in communicating with the heart (mind) of men... you give a tenth of your mint, and dill, and cummin, and have neglected and omitted the weightier matters of the Law, right and justice and mercy and fidelity.
