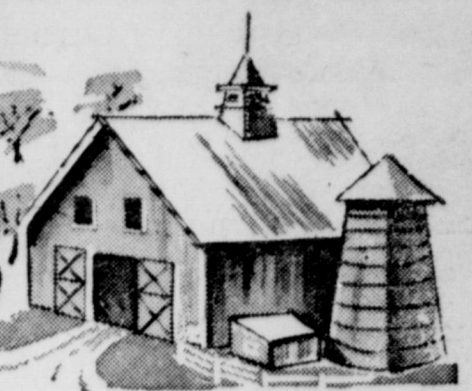

McLEAN EDGES PAST MUSTANGS 20-14

Game Time 7:30

Wheeler Meets Follett For First District Game

McLean's Tigers were down by 14 points in the second quarter but clawed back to take a 20-14 win over the Wheeler Mustangs last Friday night in McLean. Neither ball club could get much offense going in the early stages of the game but the Mustangs capitalized on a recovered fumble and scored their first touchdown of the game with 4:56 remaining in the quarter.

Mendall Hunter had set the Tigers back to their 29 with a beautiful 59 yard punt and four plays later the Tigers fumbled and Wheeler recovered on the McLean 36. One running play and two passes still left the Mustangs needing ten for the first down when Wallace passed to Bandy Callan for the TD. Wallace passed to Hunter for the two pointer and the Mustangs led 8-0. The first quarter ended without finding either team making a threat.

On the first play of the second quarter, McLean was forced to punt and the ball went out on the Tiger 48. After a loss of a yard on a running play, the Mustangs were penalized back to their 34. Porter took a pitechout from Wallace and found Hunter on the right sideline with a pass that carried for the Mustangs second score of the night and after the try for point failed, the Mustangs led 14-0. This two touchdown de-

icit proved to be no obstacle to the Tigers as they roared back with the kickoff to the Wheeler 49 and 12 plays later, Crockett went over his right guard for the score. Patton kicked the extra point and the Tigers trailed by only seven.

Swift of McLean recovered a Mustang fumble on the Wheeler 42 late in the half and drove to the Mustang one yard line where 4th down faced them from that point. Woods fumbled the snap from center and the Mustangs recovered and the half ended three plays later. The third quarter was scoreless but the Mustangs were unable to get any kind of offense started and did not make a first down during the entire quarter.

The final period of play started with Hunter punting to Hunt who returned 15 to the midfield stripe. Driving to the 39 from which point they had a first down, the Tigers scored on the next play with Crockett going around the Mustang right side and behind fine blocking, scored standing up.

Crockett was stopped short on the attempted run for two points and the Mustangs held a slim 1 point margin with 8:49 to play. Wheeler was unable to pick up a first and had to punt and McLean took over on their 29. Staying on the ground until the Mustang 30 was reached, Woods passed to Window on the 23. Graham cut over his left guard on a cross buck and went untouched into the end zone. Patton kicked the extra point and the final score read 20-14 in favor of the Tigers.

The Mustangs tried vainly to score as the game came to a close. They moved to the Tiger 10 for a first down but three passes by Porter were incomplete and the Mustangs season record stood at three wins and three losses.

RICHARD GAINES WILL BE JUDGE OF LOCAL EVENT

Assistant Coach and Jr. High Coach Richard Gaines, has been named Competition Director for the Wheeler Punt, Pass and Kick Program, it has been announced by Pete Burton of Vanpool-Burton sponsor of the program in Wheeler.

As competition Director, Mr. Gaines, will be responsible for all arrangements for the contest which puts boys seven through 11 against others in the age groups in tests of their abilities to punt, pass and kick (using a kicking tee) footballs for distance and accuracy. The Wheeler competition will held Saturday, November 10 at Wheeler Football Field.

"It is a great honor and pleasure to be asked to help make the Punt, Pass & Kick Program a success," Mr. Gaines said. Registration for the program, which features expense-paid trips to National Football games for area winners culminating with trips to Washington and a White House reception and a "play-off" at the National Football League Championship game for ten finalists, will be open throughout Oct. at Vanpool-Burton Motor Co.

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

The American Medical Association, the Texas Medical Association, the U.S. Public Health Service, the Texas State Department of Health and our local medical association all heartily endorse the Sabin oral vaccine immunization program.

Since polio occurs most often in the younger age groups we especially recommend that they receive the vaccine. All ages, however are susceptible to polio. We feel that every person above the age of six weeks should take the oral vaccine.

We also recommend that those who have taken the Salk series of injections in the past now take the Sabin oral vaccine. An individual who has undergone the Salk series may be immunized to polio himself but could still possibly be a carrier or "host" to the disease. The oral vaccine is believed by most medical authorities to remove that possibility.

We do not recommend that anyone with a high fever, diarrhea, or upset stomach take the oral vaccine while in that condition. The vaccine would not aggravate the condition but immunization might not be achieved. In a few instances minor, flu-like symptoms might appear in some who have taken the oral vaccine but most persons experience no after effects at all.

We feel that the Sabin oral vaccine is our best weapon in the fight against polio: It gives more permanent immunity, it prevents the individual from being an unsuspected polio carrier it normally has no harmful side effects, and it is easy to take.

Therefore—we, the undersigned, do strongly urge and recommend that every person above the age of six weeks avail themselves of the opportunity to take the Type 1 vaccine on November 4th. We congratulate the Shamrock Chamber of Commerce for making this possible.

ANOTHER FRUIT PRODUCED HERE

If anyone thinks that oranges cannot be grown in Wheeler, he should take a look in Mrs. Lillian Lee's yard.

According to Mrs. Lee the tree was growing when they purchased the place in 1949. It is believed that R. H. Forrester, former owner, planted it but he isn't sure just when he started this experiment.

For the past three years the trifoliolate plant has produced a bountiful crop of small fruit. However the acid content of the fruit is too high to be edible.

The hardy Thorny tree is of the type from which the best grade of orange is produced when properly grafted. It loses its leaves in the winter but the thorns remain green.

At the present time both green and ripe fruit are on the tree as is customary of commercial orange trees.

Several of the oranges have been in display at the Times this week. Johnnie Reed also left a sample of his native pecans.

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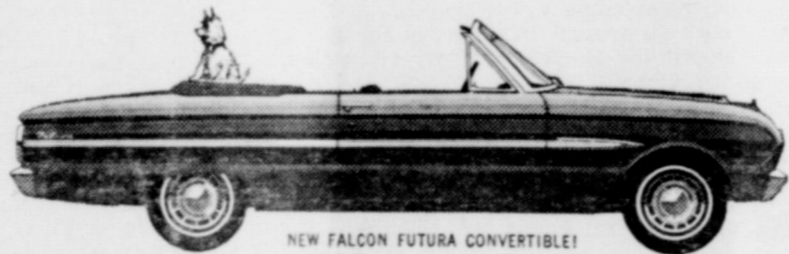
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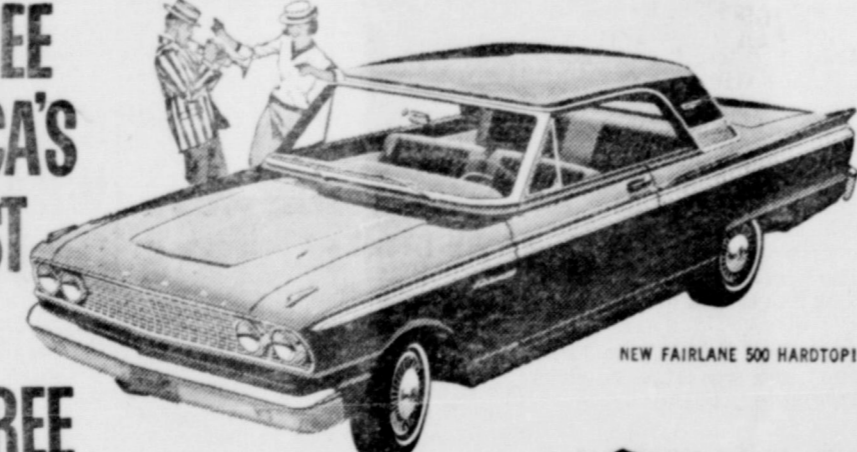

AGRICULTURAL AGENT'S NOTES

The manner in which seed is handled during harvesting, processing and storage can have a marked effect on the condition of the seed and the resulting performance of the variety when planted.

Harvesting of the seed when they are too wet or too dry or with a combine operating too fast or with one that is incorrectly adjusted can literally beat the life out of the seed.

Seed are less easily damaged during harvesting, cleaning, and grading if these operations are done when the moisture content is higher than desirable for safe storage. However, artificial drying is necessary if high moisture seed are harvested.

Fumigation is another process that may lower the seed's performance. If seed are too wet or the temperature is too high the germination of the seed will be affected if they are fumigated too long in fumigant of too high a concentration.

Hydrogen cyanide or carbon tetrachloride are less detrimental to germination than others but methyl bromide usually decreases germination.

The speed of combine should not be any faster than needed to thrash or shell the seed. Conveyors should be installed to reduce the impact of the seed falling into the bins and hoppers.

Seed keep best in a cool, dry atmosphere and the dry seed should be treated with a fungicide before storing. This will prevent the entrance of disease through

cracks in the seed coat. An unbroken seed coat is still the best protection for seed and careful harvesting will mean fewer damaged seeds.

Eight Rural Accidents Investigated in Sept., Increases Is Predicted

The Highway Patrol investigated 8 rural accidents in Wheeler County during the month according to Sergeant J. W. Wilson. Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for four persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$3,900.00.

The rural accident summary for Wheeler County from January through September of 1962 shows a total of 59 crashes. As a result of these crashes there was one person killed and 34 persons injured. The estimated property damage amounted to \$33,985.00.

"Accidents Go Up When the Sun Goes Down," is a slogan so true. Darkness hides danger, giving the driver a false sense of security. That is the reason traffic accidents increase during October's shorter days and longer nights.

National Statistics show that the traffic death rate at night is three times the daylight rate, and more than half of all accidents occur after sundown, despite reduction in the volume of traffic.

At sundown, long shadows and fading light makes it increasingly difficult for drivers to spot traffic hazards and stop in time. The veteran patrol supervisor said, "make it a habit to turn on your lights at the first hint of dusk and always use them properly."

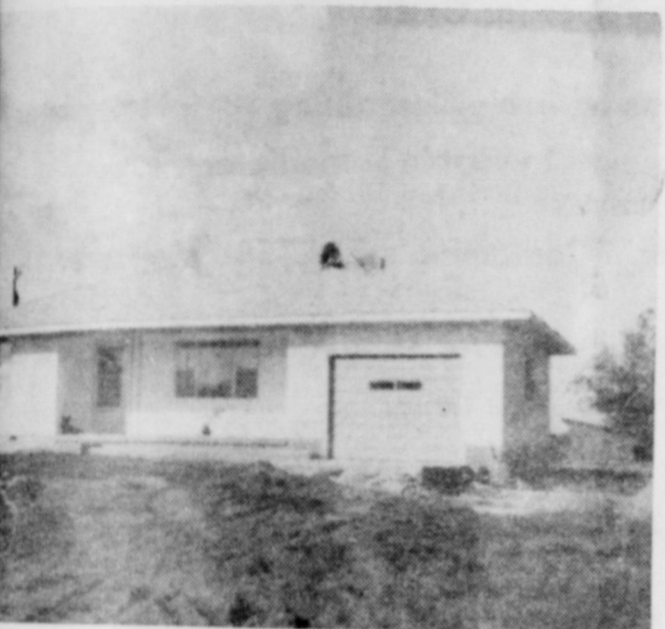

FISHING LINES

By DICK WOLFF

Do you realize that everytime you've fished through a thunderstorm, lightning has struck once or twice within a half mile of you? Most of us know enough to get out of the water during a thunderstorm, but few of us know what other safety precautions to take.

Since more than 70 per cent of the strikes occur during the popular fishing months of July, August, and September, fishermen might well take note of the tips offered by the Lightning Protection Institute of Chicago. Knowing what to do can save your life.

1. Get out of the water. Stay away from open fields, a hill, or other exposed place.
 2. Don't get under a lone tree, or seek protection by a wire fence, or under an overhead tower.
 3. Look for shelter in a low building protected by lightning rods, or in a steel frame house.
 4. If your car is nearby, get in it, close the windows and wait out the storm.
 5. If shelter isn't nearby, seek protection in a ravine, under a cliff, in a ditch or cave, or lie flat on the ground.
 6. In a wooded area, choose a grove of low shrubs for protection — stay away from tall, isolated trees.
 7. If you're in an unprotected building, don't stand in a doorway, or near open windows. Keep away from metal objects — the fireplace, the sink, the telephone and TV set.
 8. If you're in a boat, be sure that it is grounded with conductors running from the mast, or highest point, under the waterline. If not — get ashore.
 9. Remember, the highest object in the area is the one most likely to be struck by lightning. Make sure that you're not the highest object.
 10. The greatest danger occurs just before the storm when the air feels "heavy" or "charged". Don't delay in seeking shelter. Lightning does strike — and often. You can compute the number of strikes expected in your area by estimating one or two strikes for each of the thunderstorms normally experienced. Nearly 40 per cent of all rural fires are attributed to lightning.
- To play it safe, keep your rod and reel a few feet away and in a low spot, or lean the rod against low shrubs. Reels are metal and therefore conductors — don't be foolish and stand in mid-stream casting away while the lightning crackles in the heavens above you.

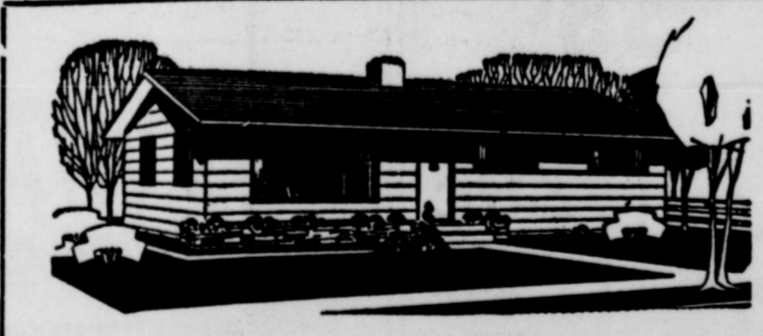

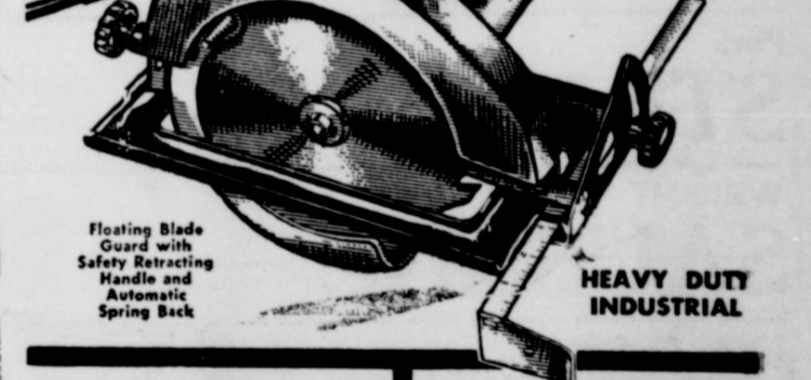

What manner of Love the Father bestowed upon us, that we should be called the Sons of God. You will lead; I will follow, on for the Gory of the Lord.

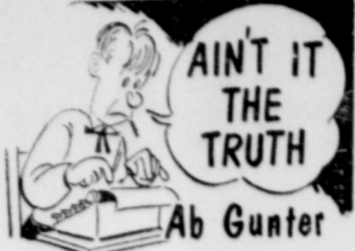

Screwworm Eradication Week Is Set By Daniel

The Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program has been given increased impetus with the announcement that Texas Governor Price Daniel has designated next week as Screwworm Eradication Week in Texas.

The Governor signed the official proclamation in his office recently with Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation and Texas Animal Health Commission officials in attendance. Present were C. C. Scruggs of Dallas, president of the Foundation; Dolph Briscoe of Uvalde, SWAHRF trustee; Pearce Johnson, SWAHRF general counsel; and Dr. R. G. Garrett, executive director of the TAHC.

Governor Daniel gave special recognition to the program which is designated to eradicate the screwworm menace and to prevent great game animal losses and an estimated \$100 million annual loss to the livestock industry in the Southwest.

In his proclamation, the Governor said: "Southwestern livestock producers and the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation are due special praise for initiating the program and raising funds for its financing. The Texas Animal Health Commission and comparable agencies in Louisiana, Arkansas, Oklahoma and New Mexico, the United States Department of Agriculture and the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation share the responsibility for the administration and financing of this all-out campaign to eradicate the screwworm menace in the Southwest."

To continue the vital program, a fund raising drive will be conducted during coming weeks, aimed at meeting the financial obligations of Southwestern livestock producers and sportsmen in this program. Therefore, I, as Governor of Texas, do hereby designate the period October 14-19, 1962, as Screwworm Eradication Week in Texas, and urge full cooperation in this important campaign."

The Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation is making an intensive effort this month to inform all livestock producers and sportsmen of the status of the eradication program which got underway last spring. Officials also plan to raise the remaining \$1.2 million toward a goal of \$3 million. The Foundation has pledged to keep the program going. A similar drive last fall and spring, livestock producers and sportsmen invested nearly \$1.8 million—a feat termed unprecedented by most observers.

STUDY CLUB HAS TOUR OF AREA

Members of the Wednesday Study Club met at the Frank Walker Ranch where they started on a tour to historical points of interest of area Indians.

Frank Walker acted as guide and historian for the trip to the Buffalo Wallow Battleground located on the Clifford Hefley Ranch in Hemphill County. A monument has been erected at this historical place.

Enroute the group stopped at places of interest while Mr. Walker related interesting events leading up to the battle.

After returning to the Walker Ranch home the program for the day was continued with Mrs. M. McIlhany leading the salute to the Texas Flag.

Mrs. D. O. Beene gave "Panhandle Indian Wars". In beginning Mrs. Beene gave a brief biographical sketch of Billy Dixon who played a leading part in the wars.

She then related events of The Indian Treaty of Medicine Lodge in Kansas where N. G. Taylor, U. S. Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and others met with Chiefs Santana, Kicking Bird, Black Kettle, Medicine Arrow and Lone Wolf.

This treaty made the Arkansas River the boundary between the Indian and American territory. The Indians were to live, hunt and fish below or south of the river and the Whites to keep to the north.

This treaty was promptly broken by both sides and this led to more strife and finally the Adobe Walls Battle. Adobe Walls was a settlement established to furnish supplies to the buffalo hunters and to buy their hides.

Near the site of this battle ground is the Adobe Walls Monument which was erected in 1924 by the Plains Historical Society in honor of the brave men who fought there.

The Indians also erected a monument there honoring their dead. Mrs. Harry Wofford read a newspaper article published Dec. 10 in Cheyenne, Okla., concerning Wm. J. Miller, a rancher who lived on Sweetwater Creek in Wheeler County, Uncle Billy Miller, as he was familiarly known in western Oklahoma had lived for years with an iron arrowhead in one of his lungs.

This newspaper is now a treasured possession of Tom Puryear, grandson of Mr. Miller.

Frank Walker and Nelson Porter had an interesting display of Wheeler County Indian artifacts, cake, coffee and punch were served by the hostess, Mrs. Frank Walker, to one guest, Mrs. Frank Walker, Jr., and the following members: Mmes.
