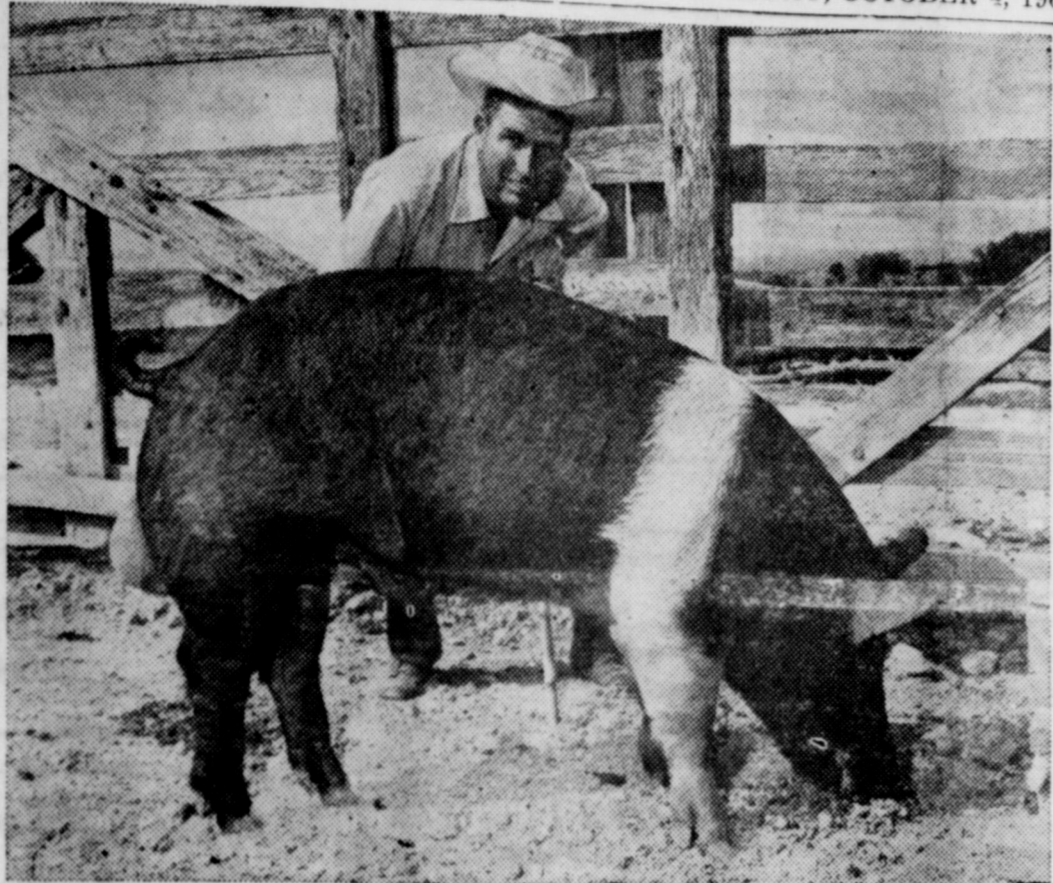

Mustangs Fall 60-0 To Strong Sunray Bobcats

ESTELLINE IS NEXT FOE FOR WHEELER

The Nicholson Field scoreboard lights flashed for the last time Friday night with only 19 seconds of time remaining in the game and when it was all over, the Sunray Bobcats had dealt the home standing Mustangs a 60-0 pasting. The defeat evened the Mustangs season record at two wins and two defeats.

Only in the third period were the hard hitting Bobcats held to less than two touchdowns, but the issue was settled before that time. The Mustangs were able to hold

the Bobcats on their first two possessions but they were not to be denied on the third. A short punt gave the Bobcats the ball on the Wheeler 20 and four plays later, Worst, Sunray quarterback, passed 11 yards to Johnson for the TD. With 22 seconds remaining in the initial quarter, Hayes blocked a Hunter punt and a quick 22 yard drive netted the second touchdown and the quarter ended with the Mustangs trailing 12-0.

The visiting Bobcats wasted little time in the second quarter in putting the rest any ideas of a Mustang upset of the top ranked Class A team in the Panhandle. A completed pass from Wallace to Hunter put the ball on the Mustang 44 and on the next play, Johnson intercepted a pass thrown by Porter and fled 62 yards down the east sideline for the score.

Johnson also ran the two pointer home and the score rose to 20-0. The Mustangs cranked up their best drive of the night with the following kickoff. Four first downs later the Mustangs were on the Sunray 7. Two passes from Wallace to Hunter and 21 yards by Burks in a couple of carries put the ball in scoring position.

Misfortune again struck as Sunray intercepted their second pass and ran it out to the 14. Behind good blocking, Worst circled the left side of the Mustang defense and 86 yards later was in the Wheeler end zone. Morgan ran his right guard for the two pointer and Sunray now had 28 points on their side of the board.

Unable to gain, Wheeler was forced to punt and it went out of bounds on the Sunray 47. The Bobcats took longer on this drive goalward and used seven plays with the last 13 yards covered by a pass from Worst to Stump. A pass was no good on the try for extra points and the teams took the halftime break with the Bobcats holding a commanding 34-0 lead.

The third period was a tame one in comparison but Sunray added to their lead—2-59 left to play when 108 lb. Bobcat halfback, Hernandez, made a fine 15 yard run around his left side.

Sale of The Wheeler Times to Victor Porter and Louis Stas was announced this week by Jack Shelton, owner and publisher for the past six months.

The sale was effective on Oct. 1.

Both Porter and Stas were employed by the Times before purchasing the newspaper, and both are well known in Wheeler.

Porter moved to Wheeler in January, 1960, from Thomas, Okla., where he had been employed by The Thomas Tribune.

He was born in Watonga, Okla., and graduated from Thomas High School. He also attended Southwestern State College in Weatherford, Okla.

Porter is married to the former JoAnn Chapman of Wheeler.

Stas also was born in Watonga

and was graduated from Hinton, Okla., High School in 1957. He is married to the former Barbara Porter of Hinton, who is now employed by the Wheeler Abstract Co.

Mr. and Mrs. Stas moved to Wheeler in February, 1960. They have two children—Ronald Wayne, 2, and Cathi Rayne, eight months. Stas was employed at The Hinton Record while attending high school and attended Oklahoma State University at Stillwater for 2 1/2 years.

While in College, he was employed by the Oklahoma State College newspaper.

Shelton had published The Wheeler Times since April 1 of this year. He resides in McLean where he publishes The McLean News and The Lefors Progress.

MC CASLAND TO SERVE ON BOARD

Mr. Lindsey McCasland of Wheeler, Tex., has been appointed as a member of the three-man Wheeler, Hemphill and Roberts Counties, Area 21, Farmers Home Administration committee, the agency's County Supervisor, John L. Manning, announced this week. The appointment is for three years and began on July 1.

Mr. McCasland succeeds Mr. John Archer, whose 3-year term expired this year. The other two members serving with Mr. McCasland are Vaughn Lister of Kelton and Pyrron Martin of Gageby.

The local Farmers Home Administration county committee reviews applications for farmers and other rural families for six different types of agricultural, housing and water loans made in Wheeler, Hemphill and Roberts Counties. In addition, the committee advises with the county supervisor regarding the adapting of national loan policies to local conditions.

During the past fiscal year ended June 30, a total of \$623,750.00 Farmers Home Administration loans are made through the agency's local county office. Each loan is accompanied to the extent necessary by technical farm and financial management assistance.

Mr. McCasland has spent his lifetime in farming and is currently operating a family type farm. He has what is called a general farming operation of cotton, grain sorghum, wheat and cattle and is considered one of our better farmers in the community. He is very active in civic organization and 4-H work and is a leader in this community.

County Supervisor, John Manning says that Mr. McCasland's practical farming experience will enable him to make a real contribution to the county committee's actions when they review loan applications.

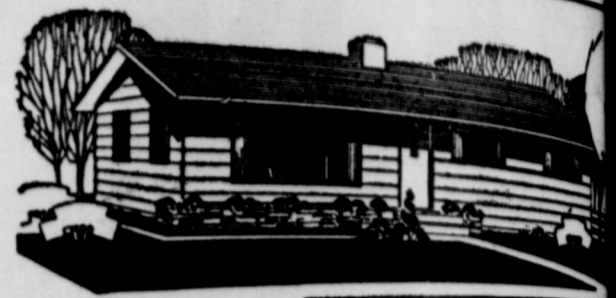

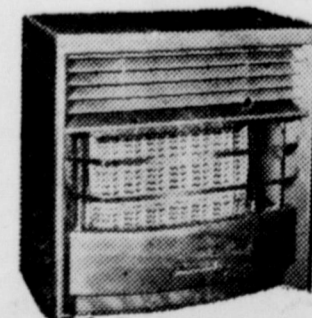

The study has not been officially summarized. Brooks said, "We have recognized several variables controlling the degree of kill for some years. These have been the weather, condition of brush when sprayed, types of chemical used and rate, and so on."

"The study the other day pointed out two others to me that may be important. They are the variety of shinnery and the type of soil they grow on."

In all instances the ranchers were well pleased with the results they had and said they thought their money was well spent. Most said they expected to spray again in three to five years to control re-growth.
