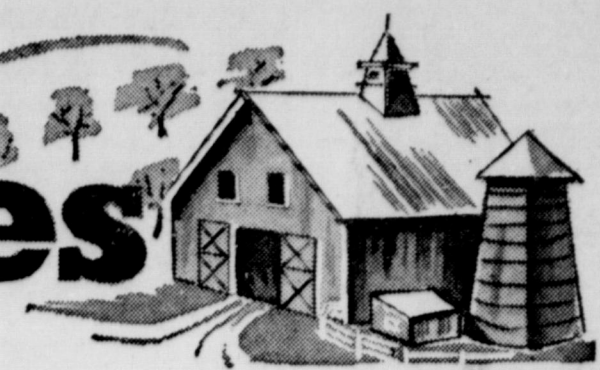

SWAHRF MEETING TO BE HELD
A screwworm Eradication Meeting for interested farmers and ranchers has been set for 7:30 p.m. Monday at the District Courtroom in Wheeler.

Tom Puryear, Wheeler County screwworm control chairman, urges everyone who possibly can, to attend this meeting. Puryear stated that Wheeler County has promoted the eradication program in a splendid manner... but there is still more to be done.

An informative program will be presented on the work being done at the Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program plant at Mission. A series of slides will be shown to explain the five phases of the program as follows: (1) the impact of the screwworm problem, (2) production, irradiation and release of flies, (3) control of animal movement, (4) the need for full rancher and cooperation and (5) financing the program.

The slides will show what has already been spent and what it is anticipated that will be needed to complete the program.

Wheeler Public Library Acquires World Atlas; Populations Are Listed

On the shelves at the Wheeler Library, is a new edition, "School and Library Atlas of the World". The statistical tables are based on the 1960 census of United States and as late as mid-way census in 1962 for some parts of the world.

This book was edited by Fred W. Foster, Ph.D., who is associated with the Department of Geography, Univer. of Ill. Contributions from ten other universities make up the volume.

Some of the information included in this atlas includes maps of the world; population of world cities and cities in the United States; geographic and climatic conditions about the United States by states and by cities; principal mountains, rivers, lakes, islands, oceans and seas; airline distances between selected world cities and American cities.

This is a large attractive book and one which will prove most valuable not only to adults but students as well.

TAXPAYERS ARE URGED TO GET S.S. NUMBER NOW

Taxpayers are reminded today by Dallas District Internal Revenue Director Ellis Campbell that under a recent law they are required to enter their identifying "tax account" numbers on 1962 income tax returns filed in 1963.

For the individual, this is his social security number, or similar number issued for tax reporting purposes if he has never had employment under social security coverage.

Use of identifying numbers is essential to electronic processing returns, now being installed nationwide by Internal Revenue, Mr. Campbell said. He added that failure to show account number may delay any refund due.

Taxpayers still needing an account number should apply at once to the District Director's office, or to the District Office at the Social Security Administration, or by writing to Internal Revenue Service, Post Office Box 211, Baltimore, Maryland.

Director Campbell pointed out also that payers of dividends and interest are required to obtain the account numbers of share-holders and depositors and to use them on information documents submitted to Internal Revenue.

He said receivers of income from these sources should comply promptly when they get requests for their account numbers from the paying organization. This also is required by law, he added.

NINE-BANDED ARMADILLO

This unusual mammal originated in South and Central America and only recently invaded North America. In Texas the northern limits of its range is latitude 32 degrees N. This would be a line approximately from Abilene to Shreveport, La.; however they are found northeast as far as Missouri.

The armadillo is built for digging. Its livelihood depends on its digging ability. A description of this bizarre creature is as follows: about the size of a terrier dog, with upper parts encased in a bony shell with large shields on shoulder and rump and nine bands in between; front feet with four toes, middle two longest, hind foot five toed, the middle three longest. All provided with large, strong claws; tail long, tapering, and completely covered by bony rings; brownish, the scattered hairs yellowish white. There are 30 or 32 peg-like teeth. Adult males weigh 12-17 pounds and females 8-13 pounds.

Few animals of comparable size have so many dens per individual as the armadillo. The length, depth and frequency of occurrence of their burrows depend somewhat on soil conditions. In sandy areas the animals are extremely active diggers. The dimensions of the den vary from 2 to 15 feet in length and from a few inches below surface to a depth of four feet. The burrows are seven to eight inches in diameter.

The young, born in dens, are usually four in number and always the same sex. They are fully formed miniatures of their parents at birth, with their eyes open. They are able to walk in a more or less uncertain fashion within a few hours.

Their food is primarily animal matter, with insects making up the bulk of their diet.

Next week is the week for six weeks tests. These tests will be given on Thursday and Friday. Now is the proper time to begin preparations for these tests.

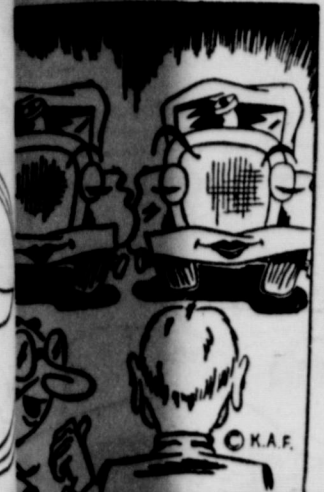

HOSS NAMED TEXAN OF THE YEAR

AUSTIN, Tex.—Dan Blocker, a really "big" man, will be the recipient of the Texas Press Association's 1963 "Texan-of-the-Year" award.

Announcement of his selection has been made by George Baker, president of the newspaper association and publisher of the Fort Stockton Pioneer.

The presentation to Dan Blocker, 300-pound co-star of the NBC-TV show Bonanza, will be made at TPA's Mid-Winter Meeting at the El Tropicano Hotel in San Antonio on Saturday evening, January 25.

Blocker, known on TV as Hoss Cartwright, was born in Bowie County, Texas, on December 10, 1929. He grew up in the Texas Panhandle and received his education in Texas.

Weighing 14 pounds at birth, he pulled the scales to 105 pounds by the time he entered grade school. He became known among his friends as "The Big'n". At age 10 he worked alongside grown men at grain elevators and could whip any of the local toughs, regardless of their age.

Despite his extraordinary strength, Dan Blocker had other ideas than pushing his weight around as a strong man. When 12 years old he enrolled in the Texas Military Institute at San Antonio. At that time he weighed 200 pounds and stood six feet tall.

From the military institute he went to Hardin-Simmons University at Abilene for a semester, then to Sul Ross State College at Alpine, on a football scholarship, to major in physical education.

He changed his major to drama before he was graduated in 1950. From Alpine he went to Boston for summer stock. Then, as did most young men of his time, Dan Blocker received greetings from The President and went overseas for a whirl at Korea.

When he finished his army hitch, he came home with the stripes of a first sergeant, to further impress Dolphia Parker, his college sweetheart. They were married on August 25, 1952. They now have four children, twin girls and two boys.

Blocker returned to Sul Ross shortly after his marriage to work on his master's degree. He left classes for one year to teach in the high school at Sonora. Upon receiving his Master's degree in drama and English, he taught school at Carlsbad, N.M.

In 1956, he went to Los Angeles for graduate work at UCLA. Almost immediately he was chosen for a feature role in a Gunsmoke episode, where he made more money in four days than in a month of teaching.

Since that time his rise to stardom has been rapid. He has played in many significant TV roles and today has top billing with Bonanza.

The Texas Press Association, on behalf of its 76 member dailies and 432 weeklies, has presented "Top Texan" awards on two previous occasions. In 1961 the honor went to Paul Richards of baseball fame, a native of Waxahachie, who at the time was manager of the top-ranking Baltimore Orioles. Last year the "Texan of the Year" award went to Van Cliburn, world renowned pianist from Kilgore, Tex.

LIVESTOCK MEN MET TO DISCUSS SCREW-WORMS

As you may have heard by now, several hundred livestock producers from 175 counties met in Austin on January 28 and decided to make an all out final effort to raise the \$1 million so vitally needed to complete the screwworm control program. The representatives, which were the county chairmen and the committeemen agreed to go back to the individual farmers and ranchers who help start the program less than a year ago and ask them to raise the balance of their \$3 million goal.

The eradication program is in danger of being terminated because funds from livestock men are nearly exhausted and at least 50% of the programs cost must come from non-federal funds.

Program officials told the group that the eradication effort has been enhanced by the recent cold weather which has reduced the number of screwworm infestations. Officials said that a good opportunity now exists to overwhelm screwworm flies that survived the cold weather by continued release of sexually sterile flies.

Tom Puryear, the Wheeler County screwworm control chairman, was unable to attend the meeting, but he sent a telegram to Mr. Scruggs, the SWAHRF chairman, assuring them that Wheeler County is one hundred percent behind the program.

Wheeler County has been behind the program from the start and it has contributed more toward the program than many of the Panhandle counties. A county wide meeting is planned this week to show slides of the screwworm control plant in Mission and the work that is being carried on to eradicate this pest in the state of Texas.

It has been estimated by men that are working on the program that more than 6,000 meetings have been held raising \$2 million and county committeemen have spent many thousands of hours talking to farmers and ranchers. The results of the program have been very good so far in reducing screwworm infestation, but there is still a lot of work to be done in completing the program.

The two billionth sterile screwworm fly to be reared for the Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program came off the production line this week, just 15 weeks after the one billionth fly. To commemorate this milestone, Governor John Connally was presented with a fly embedded in a plastic mount.

SWAHRF President C. G. Scruggs made the presentation in the Governor's office when the State Chief Executive met with key persons from the livestock industry. Governor Connally assured the industry that he was completely behind the program and he felt sure that the state would appropriate its share of the money as soon as the livestock producers met this goal.

Tom Puryear, Wheeler County screwworm control chairman, would like to remind producers that they can turn in their contributions to committee members, Farmers and Merchants State Bank of Shamrock or the First State Bank of Mobeetie.

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that after publication hereof, the undersigned intend to apply to the Texas Legislature at its regular session in 1963 for the passage of Act Creating a Hospital District over a part of Wheeler County under the authority granted by Section 9 of Article IX of the Texas Constitution, the general purposes and nature of such act being expressed as follows:

"AN ACT providing for the creation of a hospital district with boundaries coterminous with those of Commissioners' Precincts Numbered 1 and 2 of Wheeler County, Texas, pursuant to authority granted by Section 9 of Article IX of the Texas Constitution; providing for elections on the questions of the creation of such District and the levy of a tax not to exceed Seventy-five Cents (75c) for its maintenance support and the payment of bonds issued by it; providing the District with power to issue bonds, and methods for authorizing same, for the purpose of the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of buildings and improvements and equipping same for hospital purposes, and for any and all such purposes, and for refunding of such bonds; providing that bonds issued by the District shall be lawful investments and security for certain funds; providing a governing body for such District, its powers and duties and the tenure of its members providing that no other municipality or political subdivisions shall have the power to levy taxes or issue bonds or other obligations for hospital purposes or for providing medical care within the boundaries of said District; enacting other provisions incident and germane to the subject and purpose of this Act; providing a severance clause and declaring an emergency."
