The eradication program is in ianger of being terminated because funds from livestock men are nearly exhausted and at least 50% of the programs cost must ome from non-federal funds.

Program officials told the group hat the eradication effort has een enhanced by the recent cold veather which has reduced the number of screwworm infestations. Officials said that a good opporunity now exists to overwhelm old weather by continued release f sexually sterile flies.
