ing experience. has taken 18 hours of work by correpondence, nine of which were in her special field of teaching. She had two summers of advanced work in the University of Texas in Primary Education. She has also 12 hours of Extension work in advanced courses from West Texas College, Canyon,

As a primary teacher, she has genuine love for children and seeing them develop. Mrs. Weems points out, "I believe that each child is an individual who must be studied and worked with accordingly. "It is my responsibility to bring out the most I possibly can in that child-to stimulate an interest in learning, and to give him the skills he needs and the tools he needs to work with, in order that he may develop properly.
