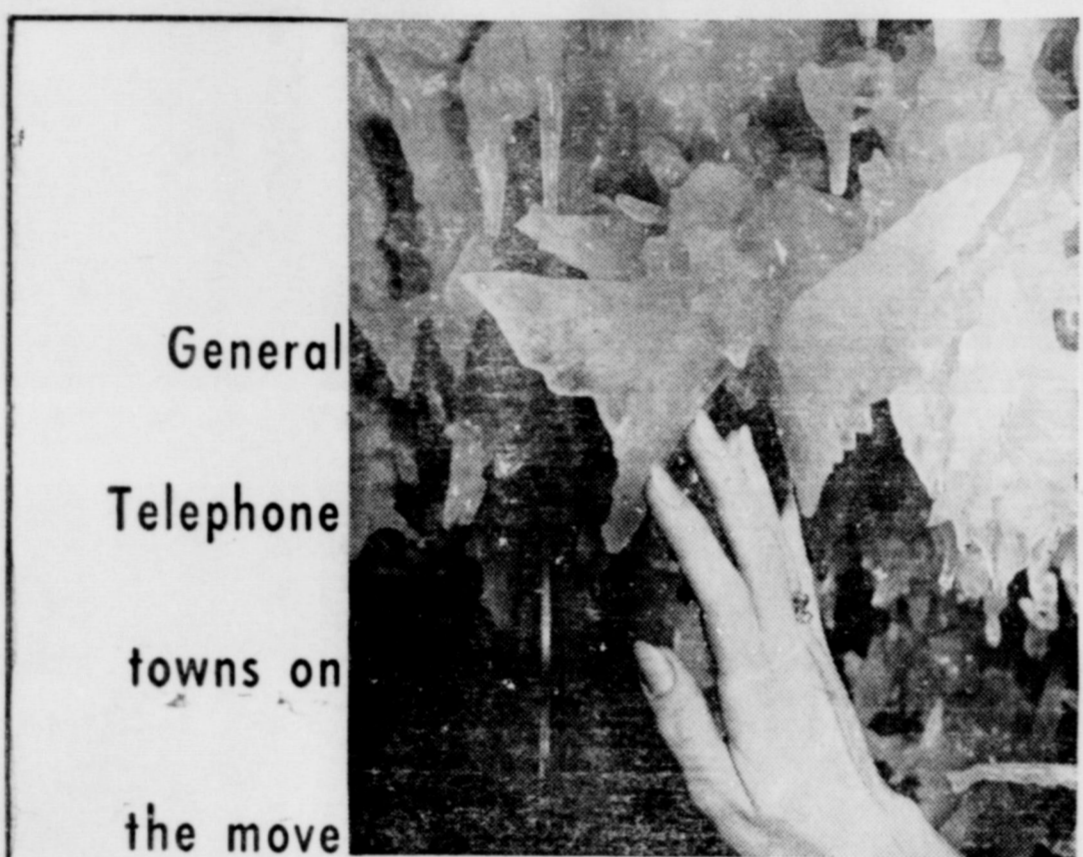

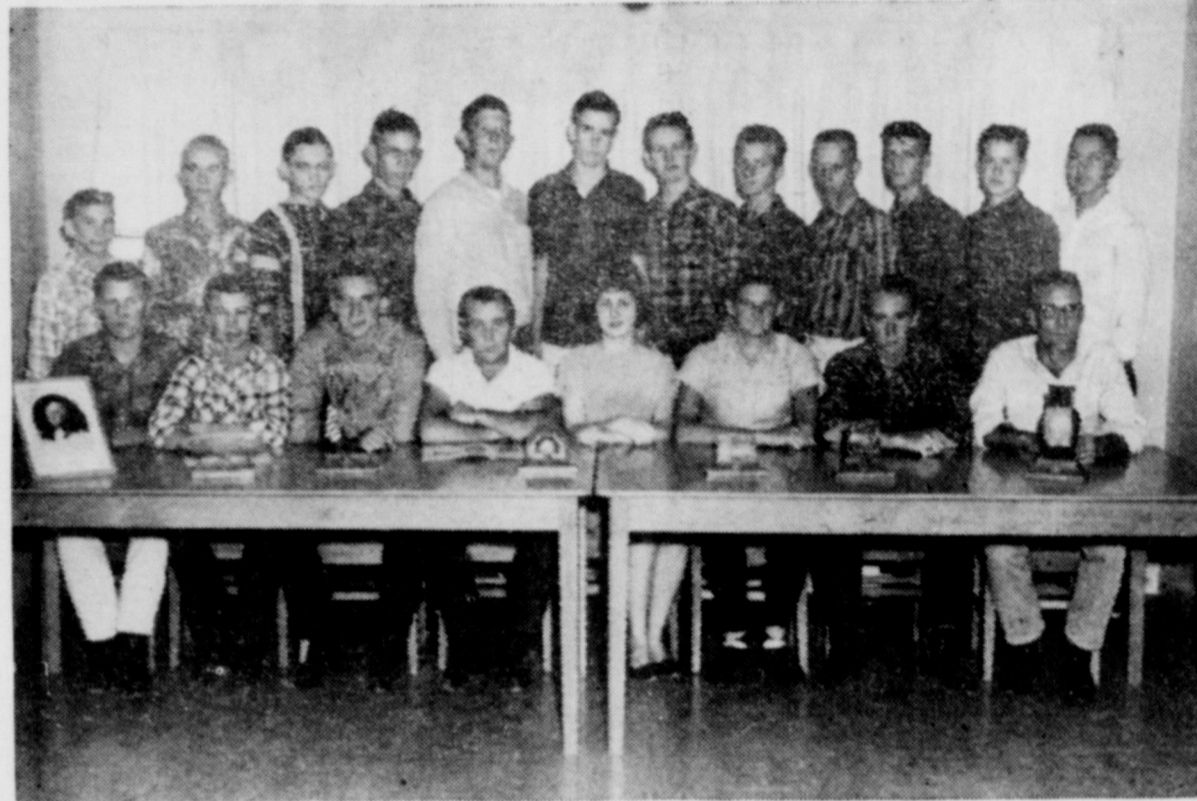

Pete Mayfield was in the Wheeler Times this week to renew his subscription. Uncle Pete will be celebrating his 93rd Birthday Friday.

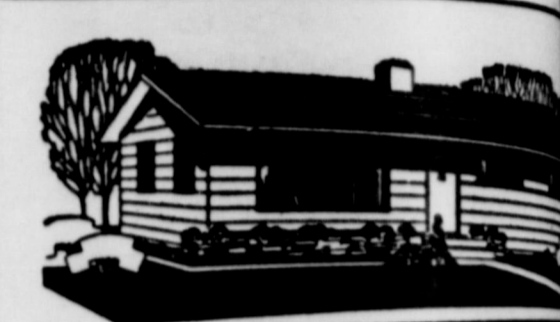

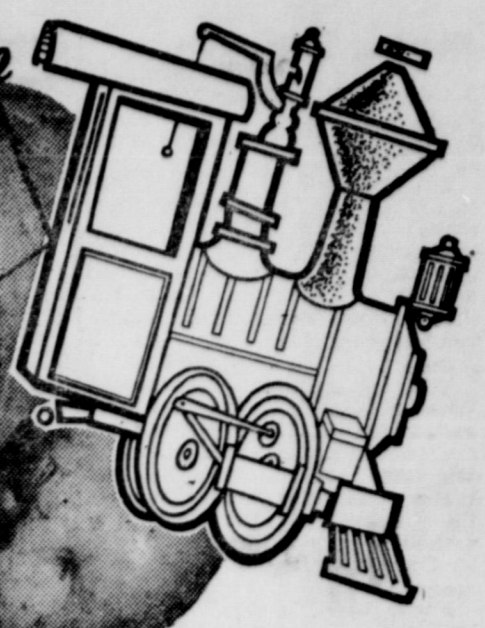
