

AGRICULTURAL AGENT'S NOTES

Two developments are underway which could materially affect the marketing of Texas grain sorghum, since Wheeler County raises 43,000 acres yearly it is a matter that materially affects farmers in this area as much as any other place in the state.

One of these is the recent reduction on rail rates from the Lubbock-Amarillo area to California. As of February 15, these rates

were reduced to 60.5 cents per cwt with transit privileges. This contrasts with old rate of 80.5 cents. The reduction should place our grain sorghum in a much better competitive position to service the developing cattle feeding market of California.

It is especially fortunate that this rate reduction was obtained at this particular time because recently some barley has moved into the California feeding area by barge from Portland, Ore. Without the reduction and transit privileges, we would find this competition very hard to meet.

The other development which should aid in the orderly marketing of our grain sorghum is the announced efforts of the Chicago Board of Trade to reactivate trading in grain sorghum futures and to designate Amarillo and Lubbock as well as Fort Worth as delivery points.

All of the details have not been worked out yet but according to Jim McAnsh, chairman of the Grain Sorghum Committee of the Chicago Board of Trade, work is progressing and the membership of the Board should be in a position to vote on the issue probably this month.

Round lots will consist of 150 tons with job lots of 50 tons of sorghum being traded as well.

In addition to the reactivation of the futures market itself being a help in orderly marketing of our sorghum, the addition of Lubbock and Amarillo as delivery points will increase the benefits to the area.

There should be some interest among Texas cattle feeders in using the market as a hedge against changing grain sorghum price levels. Also some producers of sorghum may be interested in hedging their crop before harvest or for sale after storage.

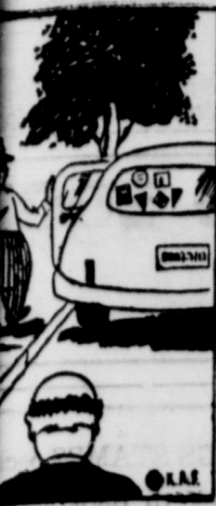

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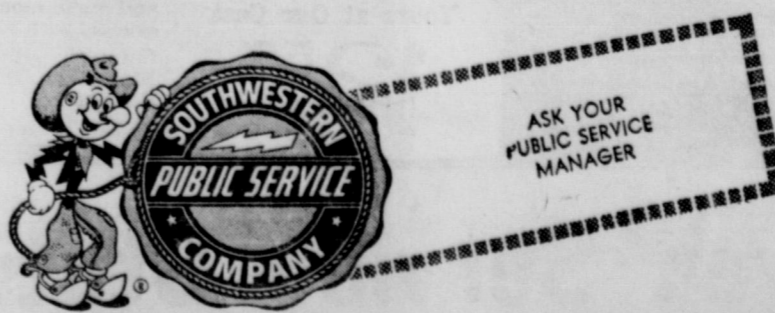
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**Laundry Clinic Held For
Area Ladies Education**

The Laundry Clinic sponsored by the Wheeler County Clothing Committee was held last Thursday with Mary Behrens, Home Economist with the Maytag Company of Newton, Iowa, presenting four models wearing garments of white, colored, wash and wear, delicate, bright colors and woolen fabrics.

Each fabric was shown by a garment laundered correctly and then in one showing what could happen if not handled properly in the process of laundering.

Mrs. Tom Bryant, Kelton; Mrs. Earl Barnes and Mrs. Harold Lee, Wheeler; and Mrs. Bill Topper, Twitty, modeled the 36 garments.

Miss Behrens emphasized the need for reading the hang tag on ready made garments and following the laundry instructions given. Know the fabric content of each garment you make and laundry according to directions for that fabric.

Sorting of clothes according to color and fabric are most important for a successful laundry day. Also proper loading of the machine with different size pieces. Don't overload. Use the right amount of detergent according to the soil of the clothing and the hardness of your water.

Seven women from various sections of the county gave an eye opening demonstration on testing hardness of water from their local water system, these were: Mrs. J. P. Hall, Shamrock; Mrs. J. E. Throckmorton, three miles east of Shamrock; Mrs. Grover Copeland, six miles east of Shamrock; Mrs. Grady Dold, Mobeetie; Mrs. Olen Davis, Liberty; Mrs. Bill Topper, Twitty; and Mrs. John Daberry, Kelton.

Mrs. Nowlin gave the following recipe for testing your own water for hardness: You can find out about grains of hardness in the water supply by testing it yourself in this manner: Place 5 ounces of water in an 8 ounce bottle. Add tincture of green soap with a dropper—two drops at a time. Shake the bottle after each drop. Continue to add the count drops (by two's) of tincture of green soap until a firm head of suds will stand for five minutes. The number of times you added two droops represents the number of grains hardness of your water supply.
