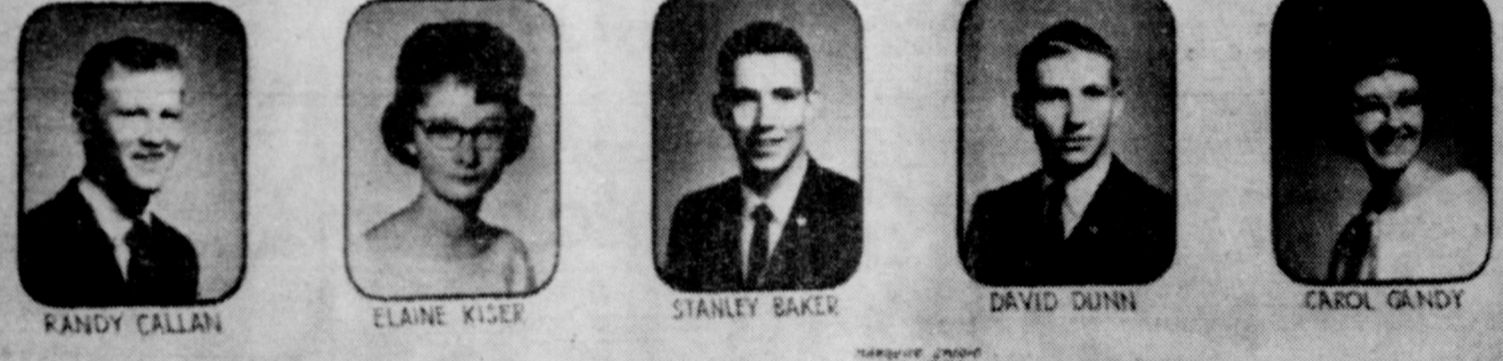
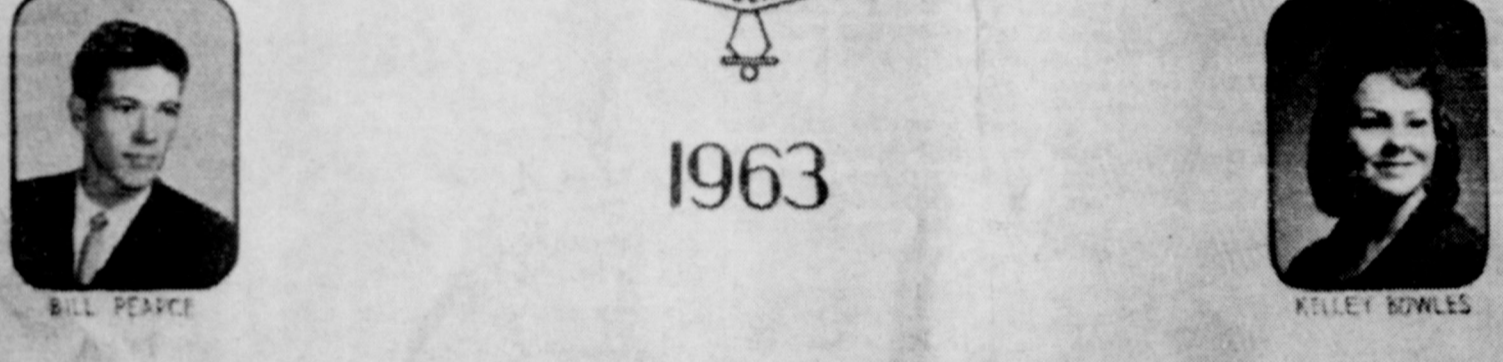
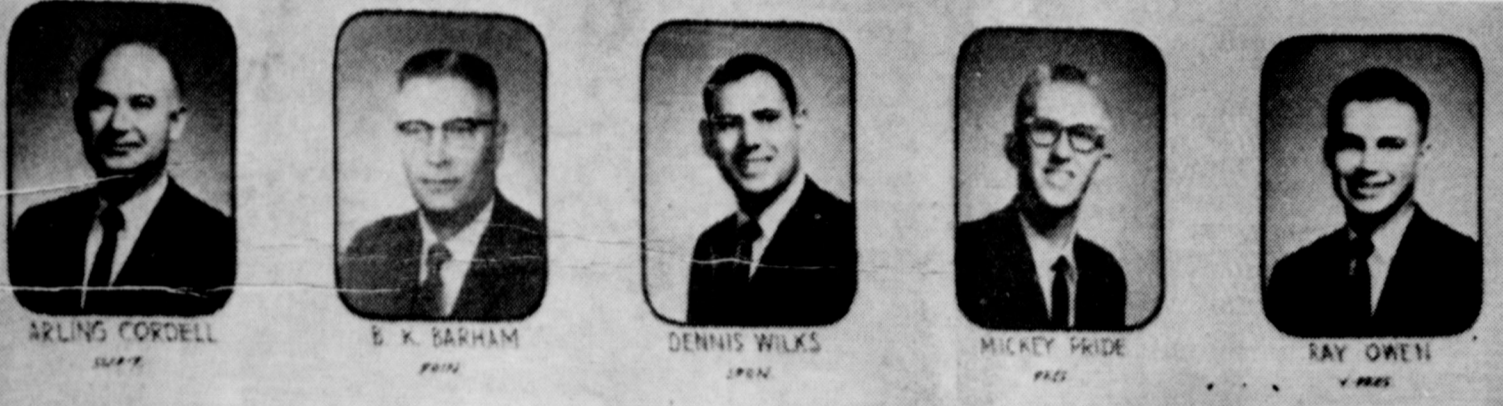

Top Ropers Contest Sunday At Grounds

Wheeler County residents will have an opportunity to see the top ropers in the nation perform Sunday afternoon at the Wheeler Rodeo Arena. A big-time roping like the one that is planned for here Sunday, is a rarity in these parts since larger towns in other parts of the county usually sponsor the larger ropings. The event is being sponsored by the local Wheeler Roping and Roping Club in cooperation with J. T. Johnson of Wheeler who is furnishing the stock.

A. MC CRAY DIES; SERVICES HELD

A. L. McCray, 74, who farmed five miles east of Twitty, died Saturday at Shamrock.

Funeral services were conducted at 4 p.m. Monday in the First Baptist Church of Shamrock, with the Rev. A. G. Roberts of Lefors officiating, assisted by the Rev. M. E. Wyatt, pastor.

Burial was in the Shamrock Cemetery under the direction of Richerson Funeral Home.

Mr. McCray was born March 14, 1889, in Kauffman, Tex. He had been a resident of Wheeler County since 1919, moving here from Vernon.

He was a member of the Methodist Church.

Survivors include his wife, Crestia, of the home; three daughters, Mrs. A. C. Braxton of Pampa, Mrs. Baird of Dewfield, S.D., and Mrs. George Beaty of Shamrock; a son, Wylie McCray of Briscoe; two sisters, Mrs. Kibbler Richerson of Seattle, Wash., and Mrs. Mary Higgenbotham of Henderson, Tex.; six grandchildren and one great grandchild.

Around twenty ropers are entered in this event. Spectators will have an opportunity to see a relatively new event in rodeo which is called "Head and Heeling of Steers." This event is a precision timed event that is gaining in popularity throughout the Southwest. Of course, calf roping still attracts the greatest number of ropers and the best in the nation will be entered in both events Sunday.

An effort is being made by J. T. Johnson to obtain the top ropers and so far many big name ropers are entered such as Ronnie Sewalt of Chico Texas whose father was World's Champion in this event. Ronnie is now standing twelfth in the nation in calf roping. Eldon Dudley, of Perryton, is also one of the entries and he is eighth in the nation at the present time. In 1960 this cowboy competed in the National Finals Rodeo, Clifton Smith of Tell, Texas will be entered and he has been in the national finals twice. He is one of the few that dismounts from the right side. This method saves valuable seconds since most ropers dismount from the left side and cross over under the rope to tie their calf. Lee Cockrell and Buddy Cockrell are both entered and Lee tied the fastest calf at the 1961 National Finals Rodeo. Buddy Cockrell is a professional football player with the New York Titans. He rodeos during his off season to stay in top physical condition.

Many top ropers from New Mexico and Texas as well as from other states are expected to start arriving here around noon Sunday.

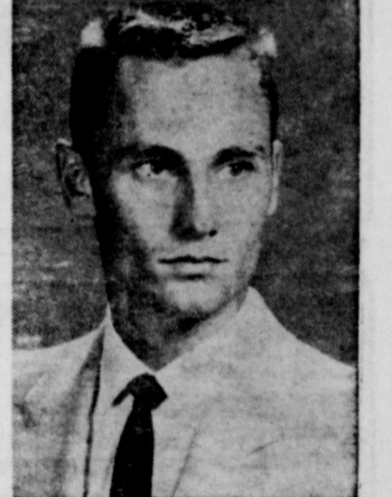
Several persons have not paid their membership dues and everyone is urged to take care of this matter immediately.

COTTON FARMER URGED TO BE AT INSECT MEETING

A meeting of interest to Wheeler County cotton farmers has been set for Friday, May 24, at 9:30 a.m. in the district courtroom. Points of interest will be discussed on the ever increasing problem of cotton insects in this area. The meeting will provide valuable information on control of these pests.

John G. Thomas, Extension Service entomologist, will be the guest speaker.

Mr. Thomas is a native of Gray County; a graduate of Wellington High School and holds bachelor degrees from Texas A&M College in entomology and agricultural economics and also an M.S. degree in entomology. He has completed one semester of work on a doctoral degree in entomology at Kansas State University.

Thomas was an outstanding 4-H member in Collingsworth county. He was a state winner in 4-H entomology and holds the Lone Star Farmer degree in FFA work. His work with bees started his interest in entomology.

A Texas A&M he was a distinguished student and won many scholastic honors including three scholarships.

Thomas was first employed by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service on June 1, 1960 as assistant entomologist with headquarters at Lubbock. A month later his title was changed to area entomologist. In this position, he works closely with the county agricultural agents of the Plains area and coordinates his work with the headquarters staff entomologists. His work covers the broad field of entomology.

Wheeler County Voters followed the general trend in casting their ballots in the wheat referendum Tuesday as 225 votes were tallied "Against" the proposed 1964 Wheat Program.

105 votes were cast "In Favor" of the proposition making a total of only 31.7 percent of a needed two-thirds favorable votes to carry. Only 331 voters from a total of 495 eligible voters cast ballots in Tuesday's referendum.

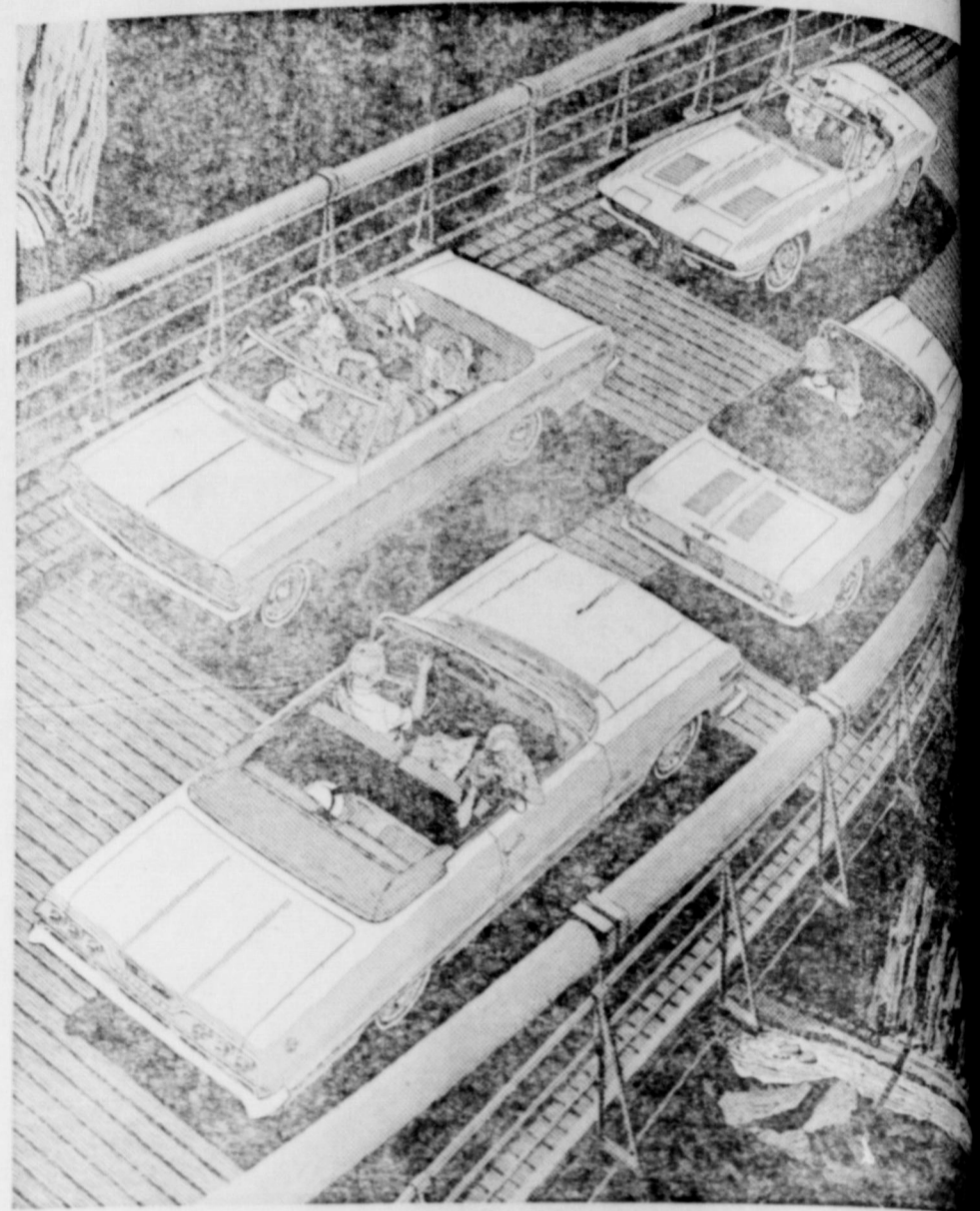

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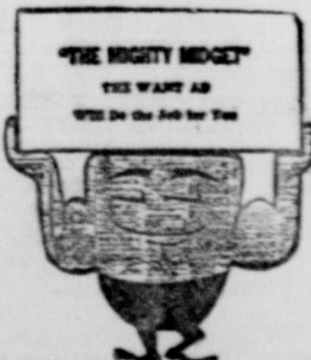



Wheeler County is in the process of obtaining its tuberculosis re-creditation. Many livestock producers are not familiar with the regulations that the state and federal governments have concerning T.B. as it concerns animal health.

For a number of years the state and federal government required that ten percent of the range herds in each county must be tested every six years for a county to maintain its accreditation. It also required dairy herds to be tested every three years in order to sell milk to milk sheds and consumers.

The range herd test requirement was changed several years ago to just include registered herds of ten or more animals in a herd that are at least two years of age. The regulations on dairy animals has remained the same and they still test every three years.

Accreditation of Wheeler County is due by July 1. If the county lost its accreditation for T.B. then every animal that crosses the county line would have to be tested for T.B. before it could be shipped.

These regulations that each county has concerning T.B. doesn't mean that we are infected, but it is set up for prevention of spreading the disease.

Surveys have shown that T.B. increases considerably in states that did not conduct regular testing. Actually at the present time, authorities believe more humans are infected with the disease than livestock.

Shows and sales require that animals must be tested within thirty days of the show and sale. Another requirement of these shows and sales is that the animals must be from an accredited county. This is a requirement that a lot of people didn't know existed since there is so much time between testings, but this also has been a requirement.

Dr. T. B. Lennerts, Area Veterinarian, for the U.S.D.A. Animal Disease Eradication Division is conducting the testing in the county at the present time. Over ten herds have been tested, but no reactors have been found thus far. We hope that the remaining herds are found as clean as the first ten tested.

If anyone in the county has a milk cow that they would like to have tested, then feel free to contact the County Agent's office and I'm sure that arrangements can be made for Dr. Lennerts to test her while he is in the County.

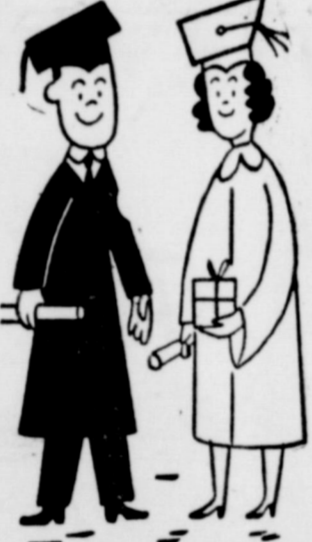

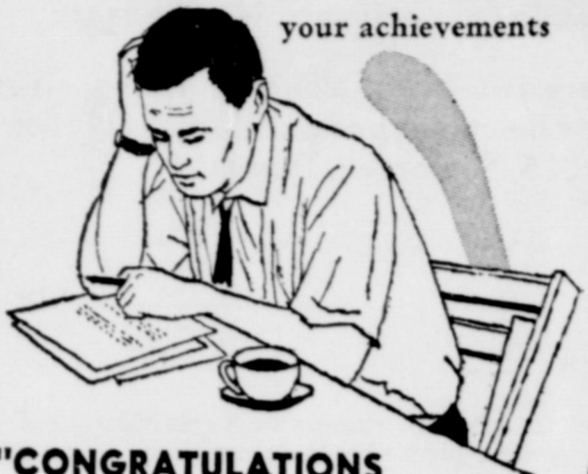

BANQUET IS HELD**

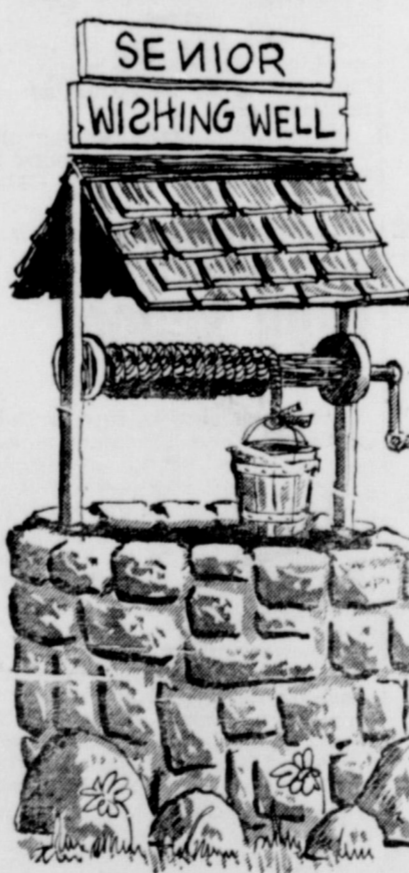

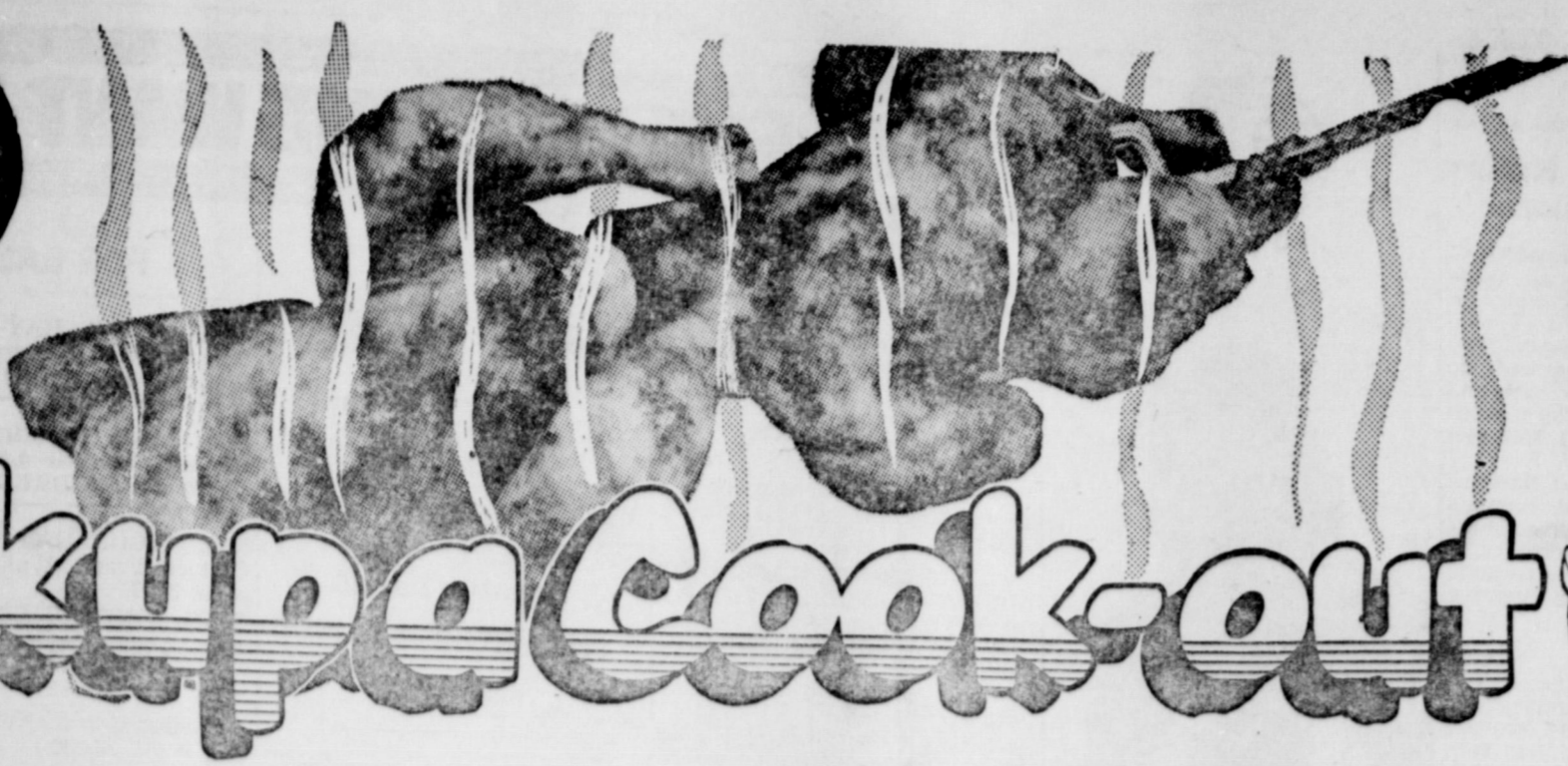

Apply Now For Notary Public Commissions

Secretary of State Crawford C. Martin announced that all qualified Notaries Public desiring re-appointment for the new term ending June 1, 1965 must request by the payment of the required fee and the filing of a new oath and bond with the County Clerk of his residence between June 1, 1963 and June 30, 1963.

Martin emphasized that Notaries Public should not send requests for re-appointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State. The law specifically requires that the County Clerks approve notary bonds.

Any person not now a Notary Public who desires appointment should apply to his County Clerk between April 1, 1963 and May 20, 1963. Application during this period will assure prompt attention before the rush procedure of re-appointing present Notaries.

The Secretary of State further pointed out that each person applying for a commission as a Notary Public must be at least 21 years of age and a resident of the county for which he is appointed. The exact name and permanent address of the applicant must be furnished the County Clerk.

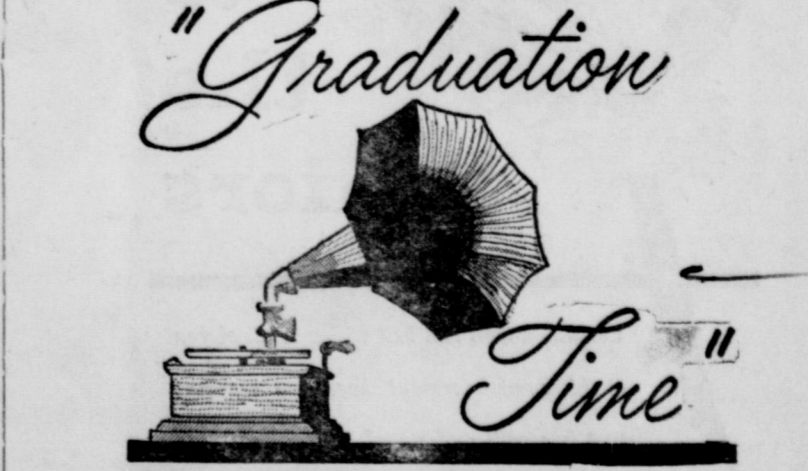
**Wheeler County Saving

Larry Wheeler had been a member of this class until moving to Missouri. At that time Patty Ann Hall joined the eighth grade.

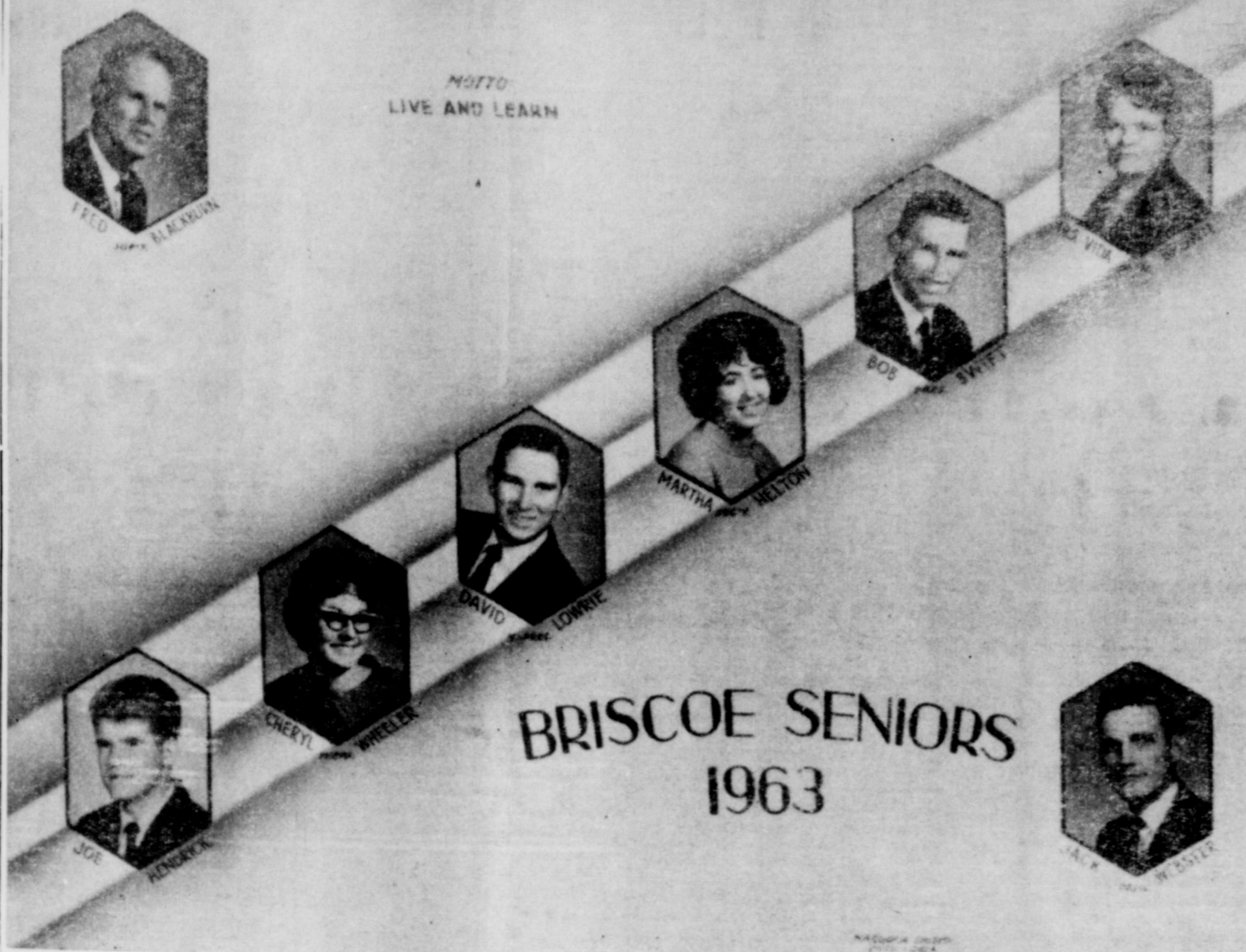
At the interscholastic League, Ida Lou Helton and Diane Dodd won third in the Spelling contest while Lynda Blackburn won third in Declamation.
