COMMITTEE TO MEET AUG. 29; GUEST WILL BE INVITED





"Kelton's Korner"

The light of learning burned brightly Monday afternoon and on into the wee hours of Tuesday morning as Shamrock firemen, School Supt. Whistler, and on-lookers pondered and worked to extinguish the fire and subdue the danger of butane fumes.
 The cause of the excitement was the pop-off valve of the vaporizer for the schools fuel supply located east of the school building. Mr. Whistler, the school superintendent indicated that the valve blew off and ignited about 5:00 p.m. Monday. He postponed calling the firemen thinking that the fire would consume the remaining gallons of butane from the tank and extinguish itself in a short time. After carefully watching the fire for some time, Mr. Whistler checked the amount of butane used up and found it to be only slight. He then decided there might be danger if the fire were left for a long period of time. About 9:00 P.M. he called the Fire Department at Shamrock which quickly sent two trucks to the scene of the blaze.
 Men from the F.&M. Butane Co. were also summoned in hopes the line could be shut off and the supply of butane to the vaporizer closed. Upon arrival, it was discovered that there was no way to close off the liquid line going to the vaporizer.
 The firemen cooled the valve and extinguished the fire hoping that it would seal itself again and the butane would be contained. This too proved useless so the next plan was set in motion. Members of the department clamped the liquid line between the tank and the vaporizer which shut down the amount of pressure going through the line. They then disconnected the vapor line and capped the connection. Then under a spray of water, they disconnected the liquid line from the vaporizer and connected it to a line in which there was a cut off valve.


