

Parade Thursday At 4:00 . . .

Wheeler's Rodeo Festivities Begin

Wheeler takes on its annual festive appearance next Thursday afternoon, when the local Riding Club kicks off the Eighth Annual Rodeo Celebration with a parade through town. The wagon train from Canadian will participate in the parade Thursday.

Following the traditional event at 4 p.m. which will feature riders from here as well as other Panhandle cities and towns, all roads will lead east to the rodeo grounds where serving of the big free barbecue begins at 6 P.M. John Barr of Wheeler, "Barbecue King of the Panhandle", will prepare the barbecue, which is being sponsored by the Riding Club and Chamber of Commerce. Wheeler business people will serve the meal. Hundreds are expected here for the rodeo and related activities.

Rodeo performances will be held at 8 p.m. on July 11, 12 and 13, and a Kid Pony Show is scheduled for 7 p.m. on the final day of the celebration.

Producer of the rodeo will be Charley Plummer of Elk City, Okla.

Six Events

Included in the rodeo events will be bareback bronc riding, saddle bronc riding, calf roping, bull dogging, bull riding and ladies barrel race.

Contestants will compete in these events each night during the three-day rodeo. Admission will be \$1.25 for adults and 50c for children.

Wheeler Gin is rodeo headquarters. Entries close at 3:00 p.m. next Thursday and persons interested in competing should contact Fat Jones at the gin. The address is Box 296, and the telephone is 4441.

Entry fee for each event is \$15. Added prize money will be offered in bareback bronc riding, saddle bronc riding, bulldogging and bull riding.

During the three day rodeo celebration, the Wheeler American Legion Post and Riding Club will hold a dance from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m. nightly at the Legion Hall.

Playing for the dance will be Art Orth and his Country Gentlemen.



WAGON TRAIN IS COMING: A wagon Train from Canadian is scheduled to arrive here Thursday at 12:00. The train consists of 8 wagons and 75 to 100 riders. The group started on their 34 mile journey at 5:30 Wednesday morning and spent Wednesday night camped near Finsterwald Lake 14 miles West of Wheeler. Over 100 visitors to the train were served barbecue and participated in a square dance sponsored by the Wheeler Whirlers. Visitors came from Miami, Pampa, Canadian, Shamrock, Mobeetie and Wheeler and observed some afternoon parade and grand entry of the first night's performance of Wheeler's 8th Annual Riding Club Rodeo. After the show, the wagons will be loaded onto truck and the wagons hitched to trucks for the trip back to Canadian.

account before the tax rate for each year is set. Thus any profits accrued by the Hospital will serve to reduce the rate for the following year. Since the Tax rate cannot be above the allowed 75c by the law then they cannot go above this but they can be reduced in proportion to any profits made that are not needed elsewhere consistent with the Law.

Another question being asked is: Just Who Can Vote. This can be answered by application of the Law also. The election or states that to vote a person must be qualified in three ways. First they must be a resident of the concerned area. This of course means legal residence and is easily understood.

Paving Contract Let

A contract for 11.26 miles of construction on US 83 in Wheeler County has been awarded to an Amarillo firm. It was announced in Austin this week by the State Highway Commission.

Subject to the concurrence of the Bureau of Public Roads, Cooper and Woodruff, Inc., submitted the lowbid of \$550,785.00 on the project. Grading, structures, flexible base and asphalt concrete pavement from 4.7 miles of US 66 to SH 152 in Wheeler is expected to take 175 working days according to Palmer Massey District Highway Engineer at Childress.

L. Clyde Drake, Resident Engineer at Wellington will be in active charge of the project while it is under construction.

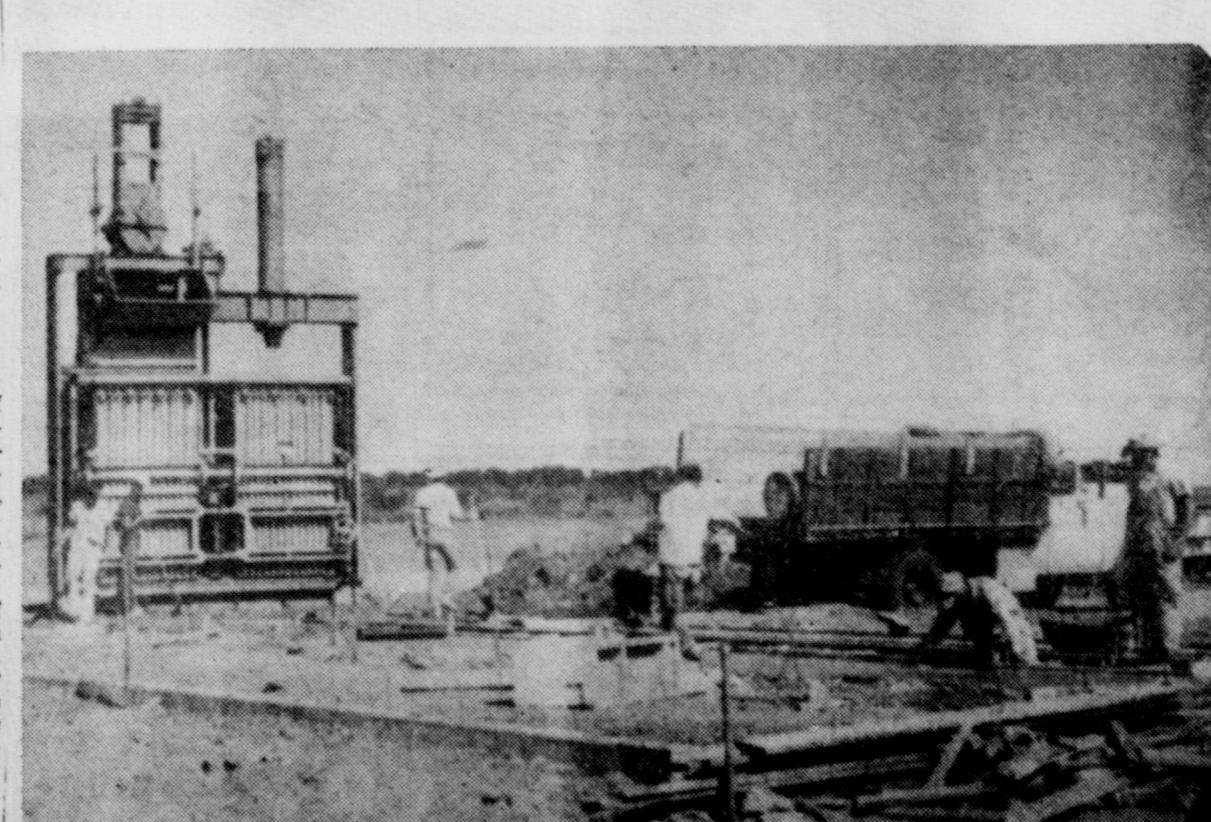

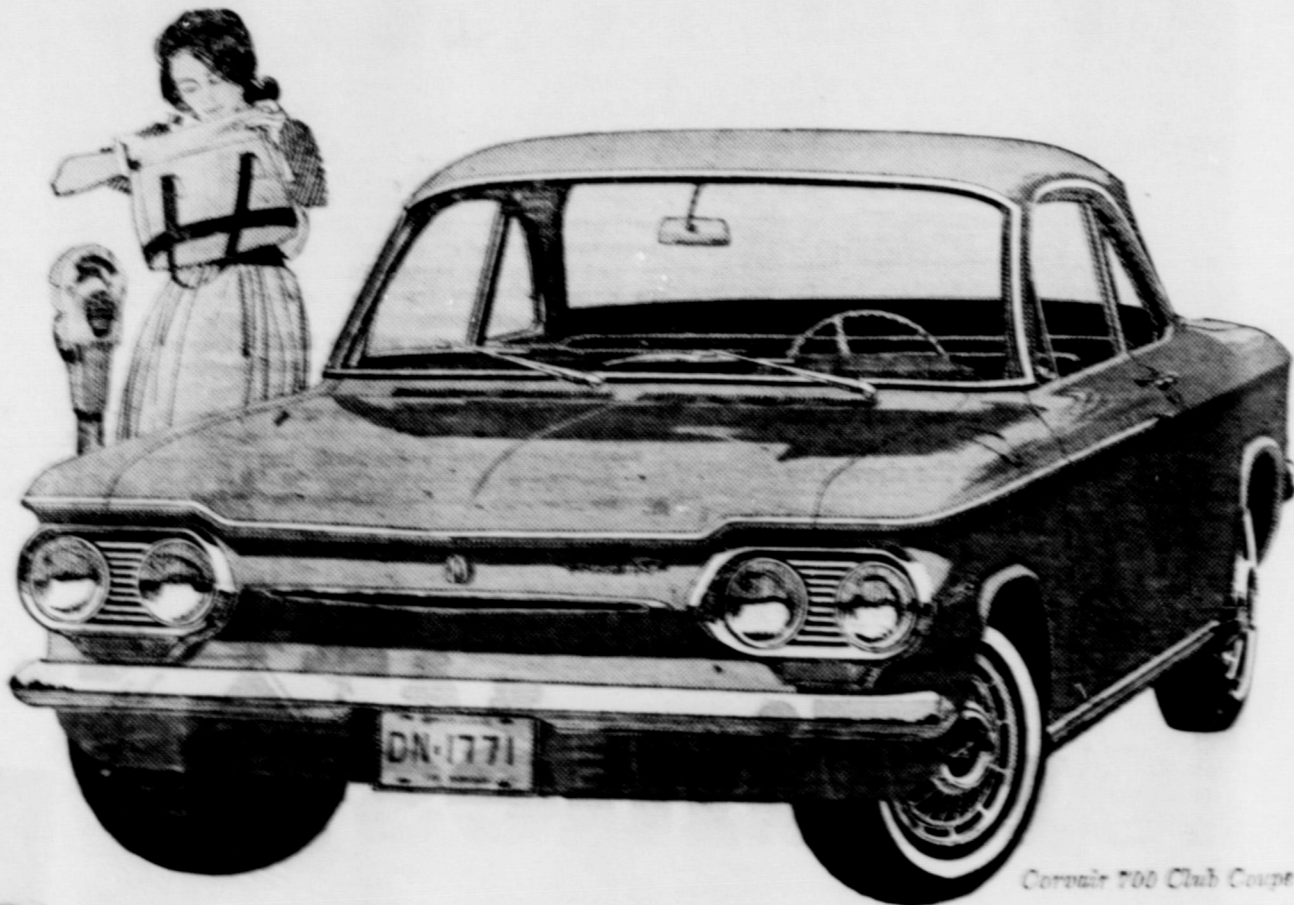

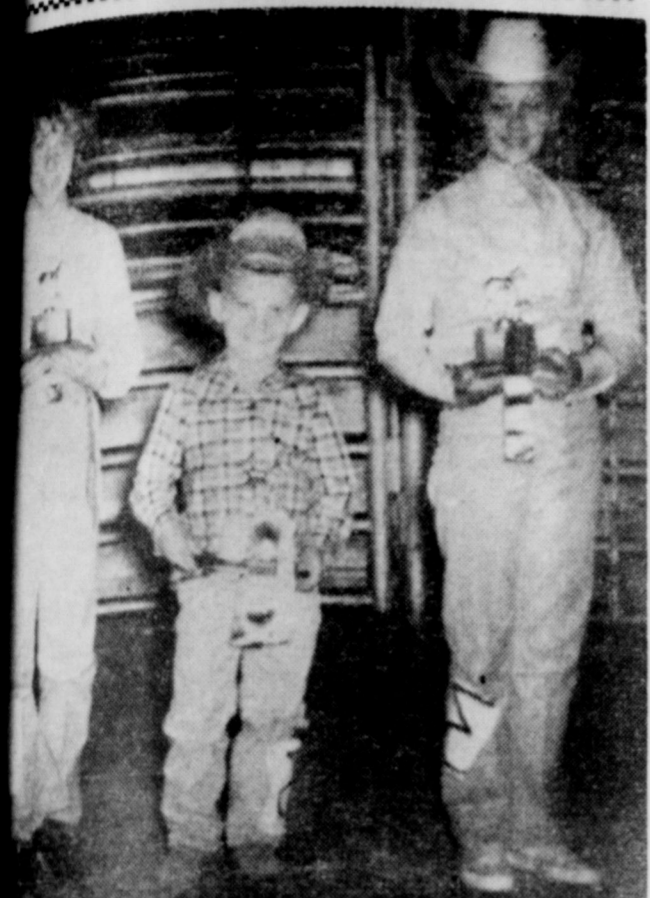

Much has been said and written about the voting in the May 21 Wheat Referendum in Texas. Some think that the small farmers were the ones who voted "no". Others think that the larger farmers were the stronger "no" voters. One group advances the opinion that voting followed area lines.

A thorough study of county allotments, eligible voters number of farmers voting and percentage of "yes" votes indicates that: (1) There was virtually no correlation between the average size of the allotments in a county and the percentage of "yes" vote. (2) There was little correlation between the size of the average allotment in a county and the percentage of the eligible who voted. (3) There were only slight indications of any area voting as a unit.

Of the counties having an average allotment of 15 acres or over the percentage of "yes" votes ranged from a low of 5 percent to a high of 87 1/2 percent. Most of the counties in this classification had "yes" votes of from 30 to 66 1/2 percent.

The spread of "yes" votes in counties with average allotments of less than 15 acres, ran all the way from 0 percent to 100 percent with 8 counties, not having any "yes" votes and 5 having 100 percent "yes". These extreme ranges are to be expected since many of the counties with small average allotments had only a very few voters—some as far as one.

The distribution of counties whose average allotment was over 15 acres was much nearer so-called "bell-shaped" or normal distribution since they were clustered around the 50 percent line and trailed off toward both ends. In contrast the distribution of counties which had average allotments of less than 15 acres did not follow the normal distribution. Part of this may be explained by the fact that some counties with very few voters either voted 100 percent "yes" or 100 percent "no".

The most amazing facet of the whole analysis is the closeness of the percentage of counties in both

groups voted "no" in sufficient numbers to reject the proposal. Of the counties whose average allotment was over 15 acres, 84.2 percent rejected the plan and of the counties having average allotments of less than 15 acres 83.6 percent voted the plan down. The nearness of these percentages indicates that very little could be said whether the large wheat producing counties or the small allotment counties were responsible for the defeat of the program.

Texas had about 31,500 allotments over 15 acres and about 36,000 allotments less than 15 acres. Of the 36,000 small allotments, 27,100 of 75 percent signed up in advance in order to be eligible to vote. Assuming that those who took the trouble to register also voted, this left 22,511 votes cast by growers with over 15 acres allotments or 73 percent to non-voters in both large and small allotment classification indicates that there was little difference in participation by the two groups.

The only areas of more than two

counties which voted "yes" by 66.7 percent or more were one group composed of Hall, Cottle, Board, King, Dickens and Crosby counties and another made up of Burnett, Williamson and Milam counties.

The largest areas of heavy "no" votes were in Reagan, Irion, Tom Green, Runnels and Coleman counties and in Mason, Gillespie, Kerr, Kendall, and Bandera counties.

Hutchison county with the largest average allotment in the State voted only 37.4 percent "yes". Carson county with an average allotment of over 200 acres voted 67.1 percent "yes". As indicated earlier, many of the small allotment counties voted either 100 percent for or 100 percent against the program.

The only conclusion which can be drawn from an analysis of the votes in Texas is neither the small farmers nor the large farmers favored the proposal as advanced for their consideration.
