# GO OUT TO THE FAIR

## First HAY DAY In County

The Wheeler County Free Fair will have an added attraction this year when Farmers and Ranchers from over the area bring their bales of hay to the big barn Thursday and Friday for the first Hay Show known to be held in the Panhandle of Texas. Wheeler and Vernon will share the honors of holding the first Hay Show in the Golden Spread area.

This type of contest has been featured in some of the eastern states for some time and judging is done on much the same basis that beef judging is done in the Texas area. The Hay Day this year will be a classification show with entries being classified as Blue Ribbon, Red Ribbon and White Ribbon.

The hay show is set up to focus attention at one time on all the important factors involved in the production of high quality forage. A Hay Day provides the means for teaching the things which may be done to produce high quality forage. It points out the characteristics of high quality hay and the values of this forage. The event will also offer an opportunity to bring the hay buyer and the hay seller together and

could lead to the buying and selling of hay.

Entries will be accepted all day Thursday and until 8:30 Friday morning. The judging of the hay will begin at 8:30 in the Highway Barn. Mr. Albert C. Novosad, a member of the Texas Agriculture Experiment Station's Foundation Seed Division will judge the hay and he will join Mr. James H. Valentine, a soil chemist with the Texas Agriculture Extension Service in conducting an educational program at 1:30 Friday afternoon. The fruitbasket Queen will be on hand for the program to greet the people who attend.

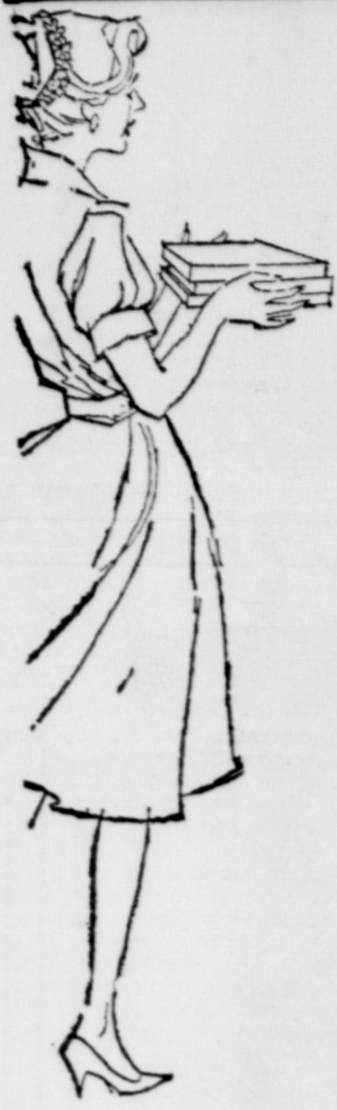

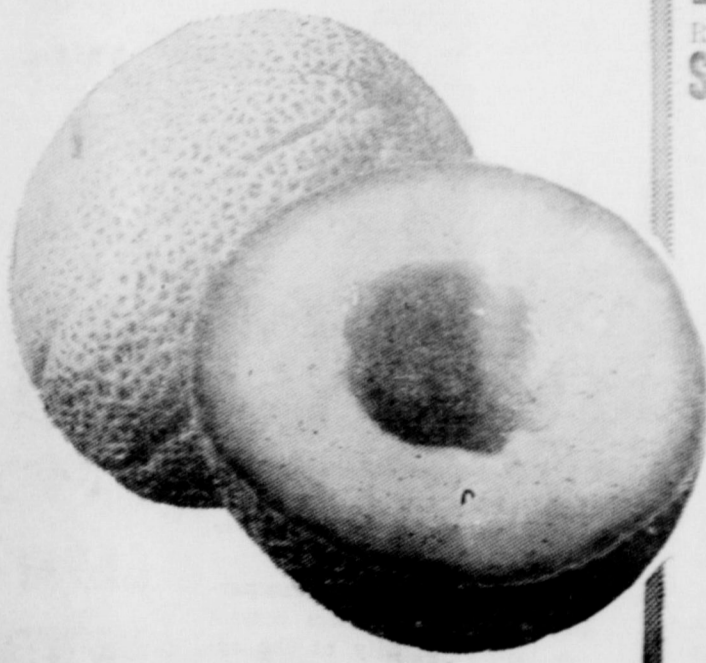

## WHEELER COUNTY Soil Conservation News

This summer has been a busy one for the staff at the Soil Conservation Service office. Usually this type of work is a little slack this time of year because farmers are busy with their crops. The summer is almost gone now, and it is time to make plans for the conservation work to be done this fall and winter. If you have a conservation problem, contact the personnel of the Soil Conservation Service and they will be glad to assist you in any way they can. Some of the jobs that have been done recently in the Wheeler Soil Conservation District are as follows: A seep type pond has been staked and is now under construction for Grady Harris on his place near Mobeetie. A farm pond has just been completed on the Truman Brubaker place near Wheeler and one has been staked on the Jones Farm near Mobeetie. Two diversion terraces and a terrace system have been laid out on the Jones Williams farm near Twitty. A terrace system was completed and checked out on the Jack Y. ... Farm at Kelton. Two diversion terraces and a terrace system have been laid out and is now under construction on the Hubert Lindall farm east of Shamrock. Also, Grady Dodd, who lives near Grady, is in the process of constructing a diversion terrace and a water way.

## ASCS Announces The Coming Election To Be Handled By Mail

Farmers in Wheeler County will soon have their annual opportunity to choose the best men available to serve as ASCS committeemen. The elections of Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation community and county committees are held once a year through out the county sometimes between early September and December. In Wheeler County, the community elections will be held by mail. Ballots must be returned to the Wheeler County ASCS office by September 12, 1963.

All farmers who either participate or are eligible to participate in any of the programs administered by the farm-committeemen are eligible to cast ballots in the community elections.

Ballots for community committeemen will be tabulated publicly by the county committee beginning at 9:00 a.m. Friday, September 13, 1963 in the Wheeler County ASCS office.

After the community farm-chairmen serve as delegates to a committee are elected, their county convention, where ASCS county committee of three regular members are chosen. This year, the county convention will be held Thursday, Sept. 19, 1963 at 9:00 A.M. in the Wheeler County ASCS office. The convention is open to the public.

The farmer-committee system for administering national agricultural programs is unique—and 30 years old this year. Committees of farm producers were first used by the Secretary of Agriculture in local administration of the agricultural adjustment programs authorized in 1933. Later legislation—in 1938—specifically provided not only for the use of farm-committees in carrying out the program but also general directives for the election of committee members.

Since the county and community committees are responsible for the local administration of many national farm programs, it's important that capable men be elected. The committees make local program decisions, and county office staffs do the necessary detailed administrative work. The offices maintained by the county committees are the farmers' local contact for business connected with program participation. The men serving as committeemen perform a most important function in seeing that the farm programs are practical and appropriate and that they are administered fairly and effectively.
