Erick Downed... 40-0

The Wheeler Mustangs rode hard and heavy over the Erick Bearcats last Friday night and when the dust settled, the Mustangs had racked up their third win, 40-0.
Slippery running by Daryl Snelgrooves and Bobby Vanpool and the hard line smashes of Dunk Porter and Mendell Hunter proved to be too much for the Bearcats. Not enough can be said for the Mustang line which did an outstanding job of blocking for these backs and performed as a unit in blunting every Bearcat offensive move.
This victory set the stage for the first district battle of the year this Friday as the Mustangs take in Follett, which upset the local crew last year.
The first quarter was hardly half over when Dunk Porter slashed off his left guard on a counter and went into the end zone from 20 yards out. A recovered fumble set up the Mustangs in business once more on the Erick 19. Watson recovered the loose pigskin and just two plays were needed with the tally coming on a 16 yard pass from Wallace to Kent Sims. Wallace cut over guard for the extra point and the lead mounted to 14-0 late in the quarter.
Aided by a roughing the kicker penalty, Erick made their only serious threat in the second quarter as they drove to the Wheeler 16 where the tough Mustang line rose up and halted this treat. The Mustangs pounded the Bearcat flanks to midfield and then Wallace, Mustang quarterback who called a good game throughout, crossed up the defense with a pass to Burks to the Erick 24. Hunter moved for 3 and B. Vanpool sped to the 8. Snelgrooves got 4 and Porter rammed to the 1. The Mustangs were penalized to the 6 but Snelgrooves circled right end for the score on the following play. Wallace passed to Sims for 2 points and the half ended with the Mustangs holding a 22-0 lead.
Little doubt remained as to the outcome of the contest just 12 seconds following the second half kickoff. Bobby Vanpool took the kick on his 17 and set sail straight up the field behind a wedge of blockers... 83 yards later he was in the end zone. Erick got another shock when Hunter intercepted a Bearcat pass a few plays after the kickoff. This gave the Mustangs possession on the Erick 49. Behind cracking blocks thrown by Porter, Sims and Dorman, Daryl Snelgrooves whipped down the sideline for the distance and the visitors had a 34 point lead with just 2 1/2 minutes gone in the third period.
Coach Burnett substituted freely the remainder of the game and had his team attempt two field goals in the 4th quarter. A rash of fumbles by both sides late in the contest gave the Mustangs a chance to add to their margin which, this time, they accepted. A fumble by Sanders, who was racked by the hard charging Mustang forwards all night, was recovered by Rogers on the Erick 39. Snelgrooves made 18 to the 21 and Porter tackled on 3 more. Bobby Vanpool headed goalward around his left end and when the traffic got thick, dove into the end zone for the final score.
The Mustangs continued to show improvement in this contest and Coach Burnett seemed pleased with most phases of the Mustangs play.
