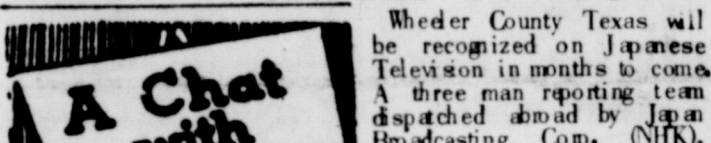

The tax rate will be \$1.35 per hundred dollars of assessed valuation, and the total bonded indebtedness to be assumed will be \$55,300.

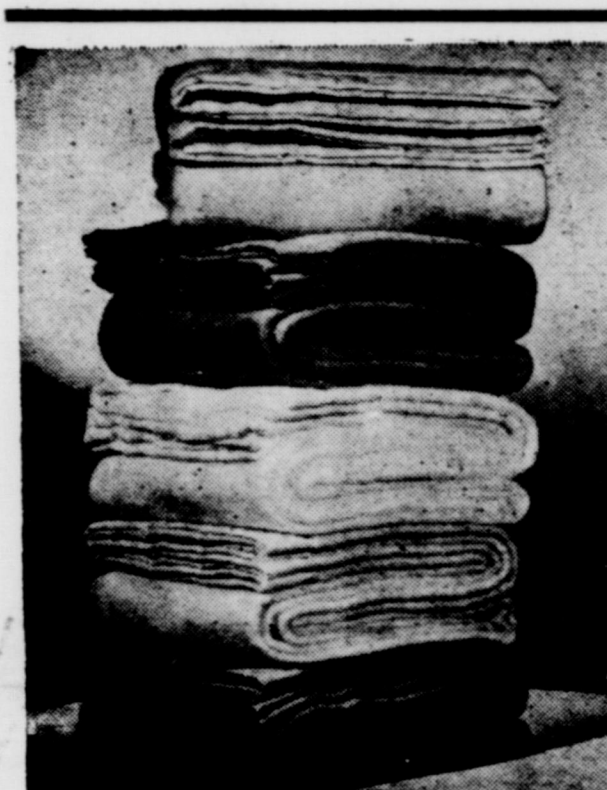

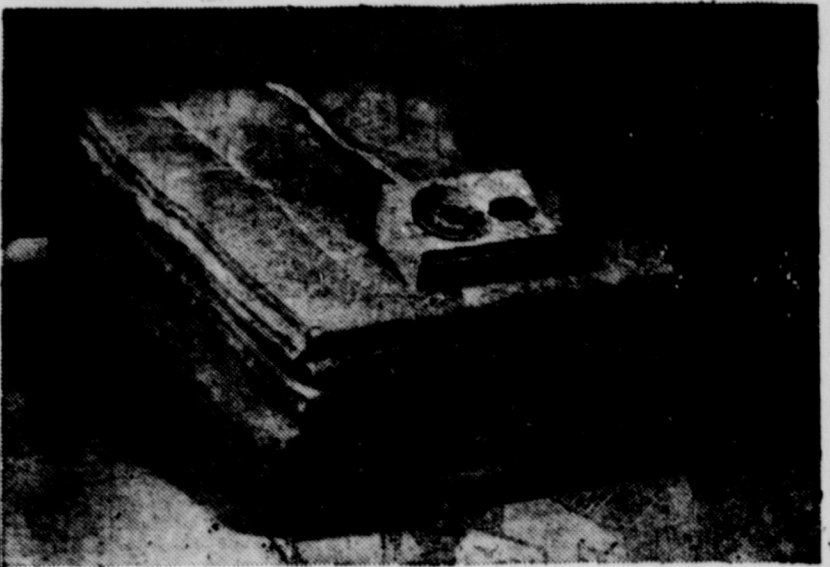

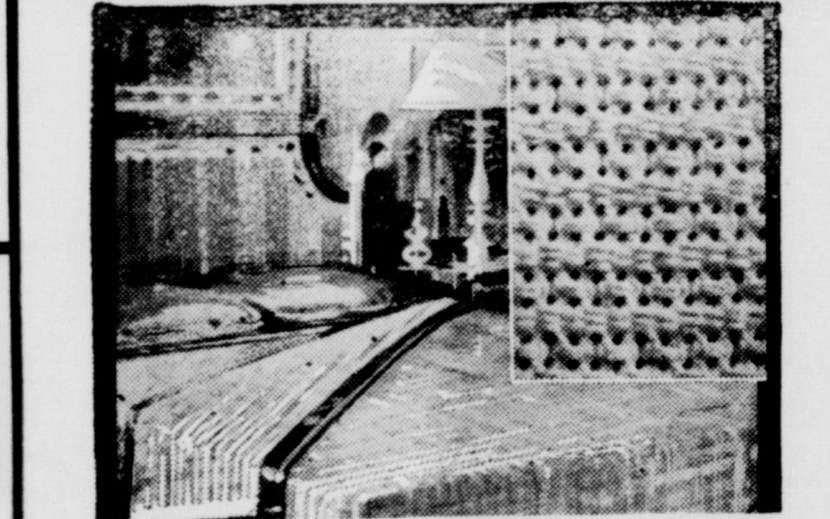

## County Agent Reports . . .

**BY CHARLES D. JACKSON**

What's the value of knowing how fast a bull will grow? This is a question that Wheeler County ranchers often ask and it is a question that the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station has come up with the answer.

According to Dixon Hubbard, Extension Area Livestock Specialist, three yearling Hereford bulls were selected each year from the bull performance test at the Trans-Pecos Experiment Station, Balmorhea. Bulls were picked for high, medium, and low rate of gain on test. They were then bred to groups of high grade Hereford cows. Weaning weights, ages, and feedlot data were taken on the offspring. The study covered five years and included 14 performance tested sires and 147 offspring. The top four gaining bulls that were used had gained 303 pounds per day on test and their offsprings adjusted weaning weight was 437.7 pounds with 192 pounds of gain per day on test. The medium gaining bulls gained 252 pounds per day on test and adjusted weaning weight of their offspring was 430.3 pounds and they gained 182 pounds per day on test.

The low gaining groups of bulls that were used only gained 189 pounds per day on test and the adjusted weaning weight of these bulls' calves was 417.8 pounds at weaning and these calves only gained 174 pounds per day on feed test.

For each difference of 0.5 pounds per day in test gain of sires, the offspring weighed an average of 9.34 pounds more at weaning and 29.86 pounds more at 420 days of age.

Using the values mentioned above it is possible to estimate the value of a sire selected on his gain record. Assuming all calves sold at weaning for \$25 cwt, the increase in value would be \$2.35 per head more for each one-half pound advantage in average daily gain of the sire. If the sire is used for 5 years and gets 30 calves a year, the increased value would be \$351 for each one-half pound advantage in daily gain.

Again, using the same values, if the calves are put in the feedlot they would average \$6.87 per head more value at 420 days of age for each half pound advantage in test gain of the sire. This figure is based on slaughter cattle selling at \$23 cwt. This would amount to \$1,030.50 in increased calf value due to the bull if 150 calves are sired during his lifetime.

These values are based on the heritability actually observed in traits studied in this particular test. Heritability figures are expected to vary from herd to herd or experiment to experiment. However, the heritability figures from this study are not as high as many others reported, so the examples showing the value of gain records on the sires should be feasible.

Remember, differences in gain of the sires must be measured under as near the same conditions as possible. This can be done on the ranch or at a central testing station. But, in both cases, precautions must be taken to eliminate possible differences due to nonhereditary influence such as treatment prior to test, level of nutrition, sickness, etc.

Seventy-nine cowboys and cowgirls have entered the Annual 4-H Junior Rodeo to be held this Friday, June 26 and Saturday, June 27 at 8:00 p.m. each evening in the Wheeler Rodeo Arena. Spectators will have an opportunity to see small fry youth through high school seniors in action. Twenty-eight different events will be featured on the program by the contestants. All contestants are from Wheeler County and they are attending school in the county at the present time.

The junior rodeo queen's contest will be a featured attraction again this year. These queens are sponsored by businesses, individuals and ranches throughout the county. Tickets are on sale this week throughout the county by 4-H members and they may also be purchased at the gate.
