William "Pete" Corcoran, 68, of Pampa died Saturday, Oct. 7, 1995. Graveside services were at 3 p.m. Tuesday at Mobeetie Cemetery with Howard Swiney, minister of Lefors Church of Christ, officiating. Arrangements are under the direction of Carmichael-Whately Funeral Directors.

Mr. Corcoran was born Dec. 22, 1926 at Mobeetie. He had been a resident of Pampa for 20 years. He married LaVerne Johnston on Feb. 15, 1947 at Shamrock. He worked for the Texas Highway Department for 20 years, retiring in 1988. He was a veteran of the U.S. Army, serving during the Korean Conflict. He was a member of Mary Ellen and Harvester Church of Christ.

He was preceded in death by several brothers and sisters.

Return of the Colors to Ft. Elliott

The colors were lowered from the flag pole at Fort Elliott 105 years ago this month. On October 1, 1890, the last two companies of Cavalry rode out abandoning the fort according to post returns located in the National Archives. On October 21, 1995, a period 37 star post flag will be raised on the original Fort Elliott flagmast. The flagmast is the only surviving original frontier fort flagmast in existence in the United States. The flag will be raised in a ceremony scheduled for 10:00 a.m. and will feature The 4th U.S. Cavalry Regiment, E. Company (Old Fort Griffin Memorial Regiment) of Amarillo which has been recently adopted as the official military re-enactment unit of the Old Mobeetie Texas Association. Mustangs Close Pre-District With 17-13 Loss to Stratford

The Wheeler Mustangs winded up pre-district play last Friday night at home by taking on a tough AA team from Stratford. The Mustangs, again, wound up on the wrong end of the scoreboard losing a tough contest 17-13.

Stratford moved the ball at will the first quarter scoring 10 of their 17 points early by long runs from tailback Fabian Cruz and T. D. Baskin. The

Mustang defense seemed inept at stopping the option series presented by the Elks. However, the Mustangs were quick to score with 5 minutes into the second quarter by a tough 3 yard run by Andy Francis and Travis Stevens providing the extra point. This touchdown was set up by super runs by Bryan Judd, Jeremy Davis, and passing from Stevens. The Wheeler offensive line seemed to be on a bet-

ter blocking path as Stevens appeared to have a little more time to throw the football and the backs were having good lanes to run through. Throughout the first half the game saw-sawed back and forth between Stratford and Wheeler. Mental mistakes seemed to keep the boys in black off course and prevented any further scores.

In the second half of play the Wheeler defense kicked in with force as Cruz, one of the areas leading rushers was held to only 3 yards of rushing the entire second half. The Mustangs seemed to be more aggressive in their style for defense and had 11 men around the football at all times. The Mustang offense continued to look great with runs by Davis and Judd, however, to many mental errors and penalties cost the Mustangs in the long run. Wheeler was able to add six more points late in the fourth quarter, but with no timeouts remaining the Mustangs lost another close one to the Elks. According to Coach Verden, there were to many mental mistakes and misassignments on the special teams that prevented the Mustangs from pulling out a win.

The Mustangs were penalized eleven times for 80 yards, their biggest penalty night of the season. But not all was lost in Friday's game. The Mustangs played four full quarters of hustle football. They amassed 340 yards of total offense (243 on the ground and 97 in the air) and held Stratford to under 300 yards of total offense, a task not completed by many this year. Brian Judd rushed for 121 yards, Francis added 74 yards and 2 T.D.'s. Stevens was 6-21-1 on the night and tremendous receptions were made by Jason Porton and Keith Rose. The Mustangs dropped at least four wide open passes that could have made the difference in the game and this is unusual for the fine handed (Continued Page 7)

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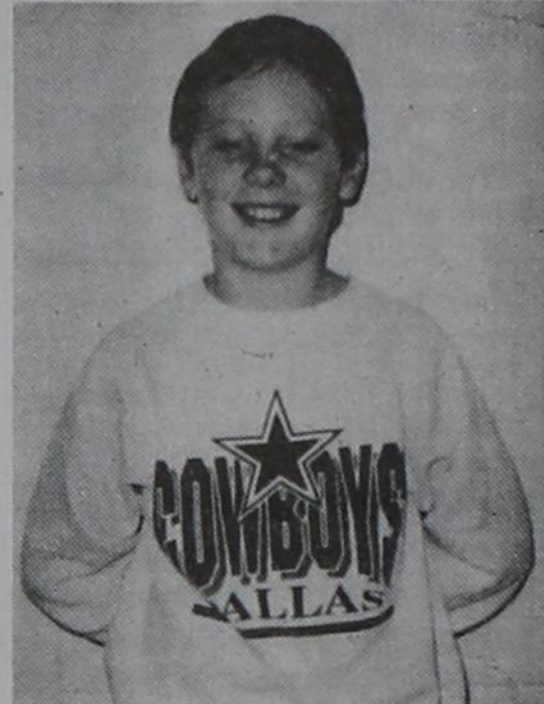

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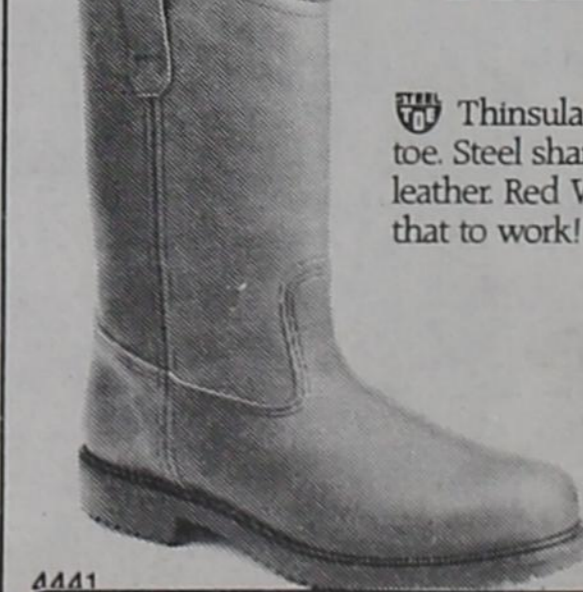

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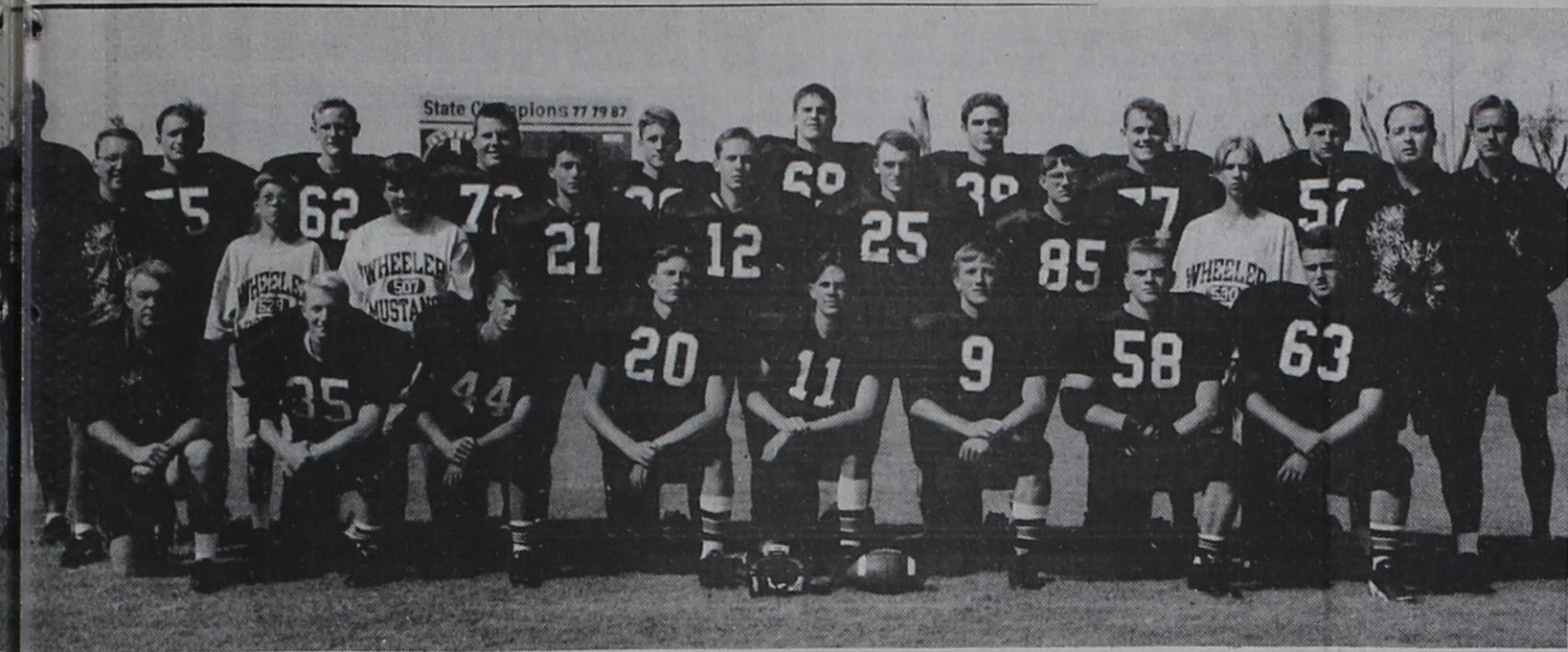

The tongue is also a vital organ of communication which allows people to articulate their feelings, their opinions, and their beliefs.
For this reason, the New Testament warns that this vital organ of communication can be extremely dangerous. For example, James 3: 5-8 says: "The tongue is a small part of the body, and yet it boasts of great things. Behold, how great a forest is set aflame by such a small fire! And the tongue is a fire, the very world of iniquity; it defiles the body among our members as that which defiles the entire body, and that which on fire the course of our life, and is set on fire by hell. For every species of beasts and birds, of reptiles and creatures of the sea, is tamed, and has been tamed by the human race. But no one can tame the tongue; it is a restless evil and full of deadly poison."
Because this major organ of communication can be so dangerous, disciples of Jesus should test their words before they speak, asking themselves several questions. These questions are:—
1. Are these words absolutely truthful? The words of the disciples of Jesus must always be truthful. Disciples of Jesus must say "falsehood—" and speak the truth. (Ephesians 4:25)
2. Do these words edify? The words of the disciples of Jesus should never hurt people or injury their reputation. Rather disciples of Jesus should be characterized by words of edification. (Ephesians 4:29)
3. Do these words bring glory to God? Since their words should bring glory to God, disciples of Jesus will not speak words of profanity. Their words should "—give grace to those who hear." (Ephesians 4:29)
The tongue is a major organ of communication which can be used for several good purposes. With the tongue, a mother can comfort her children. An ambassador can effectively represent his country. A preacher can teach the word of God. Rather this organ of communication must be governed because it can also be "—a restless evil and full of deadly poison—."

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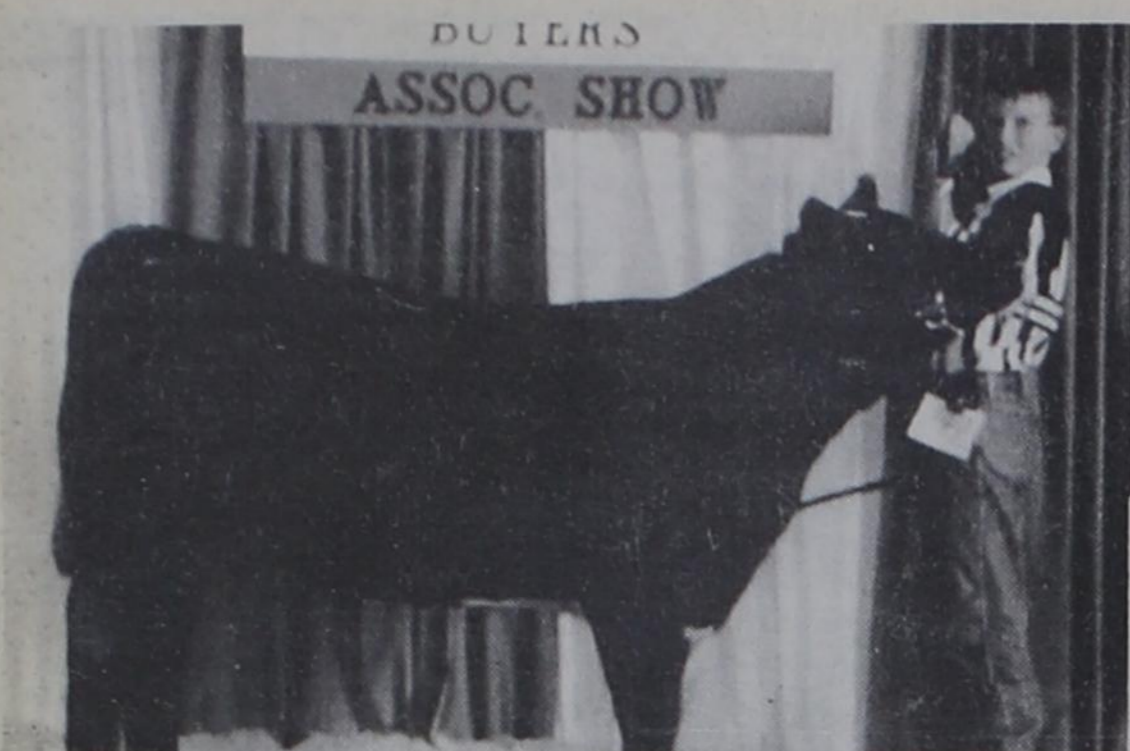

Dept. Of Public Safety Winter Driving Hints

Freezing temperatures, ice, snow, sleet; for some it's an opportunity to stay inside an open fire, but for others, it's a part of driving.

During November through February last year, there were over 19,000 weather related accidents in Texas. Trooper L.B. Snider with the Texas Department of Public Safety stated that with taking just a few precautions, many of these collisions could have avoided.

Trooper Snider went on to say that skidding is always a threat but "Mother Nature's tricks" seem harshest during the winter. Forget your summertime driving habits, "replace quick acceleration and quick braking with slow and gradual acceleration and earlier braking."

Try to avoid skids by staying aware of road conditions. Be especially alert to bridges and overpasses, intersections and areas where windblown snow can hide ice riddled roads. If a skid should occur, "DON'T PANIC!" Back off the accelerator, stay off the brakes and turn your wheel in the direction you want to go. With anti-lock brakes, your reaction will differ. Be sure not to pump the brakes, depress them evenly until you regain control of the vehicle.

When traveling: (1) insure that your vehicle is winter ready by checking your battery, tires, windshield wiperblades and anti-freeze; (2) don't be a "peep hole" driver, remove all ice and snow from all windows; and (3) start early; allow time for traffic delays and for rest periods, adjust your speed for the road and traffic conditions.

CALCIUM SUPPLEMENTS MAY DO MORE HARM THAN GOOD

Consumers have discovered that calcium is important for your body, but supplements are not exactly what nutrition experts had in mind.

Sales of calcium supplements in supermarkets and drugstores have increased 13 percent in the last year alone. But most are unaware that calcium pills appear to interfere with absorption of zinc — a nutrient many people, particularly the elderly, already do not get enough of daily. Nearly one in two older Americans takes in less than two thirds of the zinc RECOMMENDED DAILY ALLOWANCE, according to a study of some 700 elderly men and women. Zinc is crucial for proper immune function, protein synthesis, wound healing and many other tasks.

One researcher discovered calcium's effect on zinc in two separate experiments. Both showed a significant drop in zinc absorption when participants took calcium supplements, but in a group of 59 — to 79-year-old women zinc absorption dramatically fell six-fold when supplemental calcium was given.

In other words, the more calcium in the gastrointestinal tract, the more zinc gets pushed out of the body.

For some time, researchers have known that calcium supplements can interfere with the absorption of iron. This recent study is the first to detect a potential problem with zinc as well. Now that high-calcium supplements are being recommended to stave off osteoporosis. It is believed that shortfalls in zinc absorption may be common.

A consensus panel convened by the National Institutes of Health has recommended that all people over 65 as well as over 50 not on estrogen replacement therapy take in 1,500 milligrams of calcium a day. That's almost twice the recommended dietary allowance of 800 milligram — an amount hard to get from food alone.

A solution that could help is for consumers to include more zinc-rich foods in their diet — meat, poultry, eggs, and seafood. Of course, health professionals recommend averaging no more than about six ounces of flesh foods a day, largely for the purpose of limiting fat consumption. Cereals and whole-grain products contain some zinc, but minerals in those foods are less available for use by the body.

A second option is to take a multivitamin/mineral supplement that contains 100 percent of the recommended daily allowance for zinc (15 milligrams). That amount of zinc will bring most calcium supplementers where they need to be for zinc absorption.

Instead of assuming that supplements make it okay to eat a less-than-optimal diet, consumers should be aware that taking supplements only makes it more important to follow as nutritious a diet as possible to minimize any negative impact the pills and tablets may have.

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No. Plains Elec. Observes October As Co-op Month

North Plains Electric Cooperative, Inc. is one of 47,000 cooperatives throughout the United States that will participate in the annual Cooperative Month observance during October. This year's theme is "Cooperatives — Expanding People's Horizons."

"About 120 million people in every state of the union receive goods and services from cooperatives," Pat McAlister, General Manager of North Plains Electric said, "and 25 million of that number are consumer-owners of 1,000 electric cooperatives." Cooperatives also exist for financial services (credit unions), housing, insurance, farm marketing and farm supply, telephone service, health and day care, and news services.

North Plains Electric was incorporated in 1944 and provides electric service to 4,959 meters in rural Ochiltree, Hansford, Lipscomb, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Roberts and Wheeler counties.

"An electric cooperative is a unique kind of electric utility because it is locally owned and controlled," McAlister said. "Each person has a voice and vote in the co-op's activities and can be selected to the co-op board," he added. "The cooperative way of conducting business is a true example of grassroots involvement and democracy in action," he explained. Additionally, many electric systems have long track records of helping start and expand commercial, industrial and community facility projects, producing hundreds of thousands of new jobs.

"Obviously, whatever benefits the co-op and its consumer-owners benefits everyone in the community too," McAlister said. "And the same holds true for any other kind of co-op," he added. "The theme, 'Cooperatives — Expanding People's Horizons,' is one of the best explanations anyone can give in describing co-ops," he added.

White Deer Ld. Museum Has Special Exhibition

The Holland Wing of the White Deer Land Museum at 116 S. Cuyler in Pampa will be officially opened to the public on Sunday, October 15 from 2 p.m. until 5 p.m. A special exhibit, "Camp Cantonment, 1875: the Army Comes to Stay," will be on view at the ceremony. The opening marks the completion of a project begun last year following a bequest from the late Ruth Ann Holland of Pampa and supplemented by donations from private individuals and groups.

The Holland Wing houses meeting/reception rooms, traveling exhibit space, archives, and storage and work rooms. Located in the office building of the former White Deer Land Company, the Museum was begun by Pampa benefactor M.K. Brown and was later deeded to Grae County by the Foundation which bears his name. Anne Davidson is curator.
