AREA RECEIVES **ACCEPTED** .81 INCH RAIN

Wheeler received .81 inches of rain Friday evening and Saturday. It fell slowly and every bit soaked into the thirsty ground.

Ira Passons and Jim Porter reported .1 inches of rain with Allison reporting 1" according to our correspondent, Mrs. Lester Levitt. Mrs. Clarence Zybach also reported 1" at their place between Briscoe and Allison.

Gageby area reported the heaviest rain with 1.5" falling in a period of 30 minutes and 1" being received Friday night and Saturday.

According to Joe Rogers Wheeler's official record keeper, the only other rain received in Wheeler was .8" on July 14 and 15. The total for the year now stands at 15.86" compared with 18.77" at this time last year.

The rain we received will be a help to the crops in Wheeler County, but it will be necessary that another general rain fall in order to produce a decent cotton crop. James Verden of Production Credit estimated that with another general rain later this week we could have a cotton crop 75% of normal Mr. Verden reported that Wheeler County will have one of the Shortest Feed Crops produced in the 8 years he has been here.

Grass is the worst hit, with pastures nearly dead from the drouth.

Cattlemen had begun culling their cattle because of the shortage of hay, but will hold them for a while to see what hay can be produced in the remaining

County Agent Reports BY CHARLES D. JACKSON

Due to the extremely dry weather and wilted conditions of the grasses, this is an ideal year for prussic acid poisoning in Wheeler County. This type poison. ing is commonly called "Johnsongrass poisoning." Cattle loss in one Wheeler County Herd has been very heavy due to this poison this summer. Grasses normally affected with prussic acid poisoning is Johnson grass, sudan and cane. This condition develops in these type grasses when the plant is injured or stops growing due to dry weather and begins to wilt. Only a small amount of this poison is necessary for it to be lethal

Cattle normally die within twenty to thirty minutes where large doses are consumed. If an animal lives as long as two hours, then their chances of recovery are very good. Symptons in a typical herd is that a portion of the herd will be down and many of the animals will be staggering and breathing hard. Whenever the animals get too weak to belch, then they will nor-

mally bloat. In helping to prevent losses from this condition, cattle should be fed grain and roughage prior to turning in on this type grass if the producer is reasonably assured that the grass isn't toxic.

There is a very effective antidote if there is time for treatment before death. The treatment normally administered is sodium nitrite and sodium thiosulfate that is usually administered in the vein for best results. Your local veterinarian should be called at once due to the short time that it takes for an animal to die.
