FAIR STARTS TODAY

Activities start today at the American Legion Building in preparation for the Wheeler County Fair with the dates August 27, 28 and 29.

The next three days will be busy ones for Wheeler Countians and nearby residents. The 1964 Wheeler County Free Fair formally opens at the American Legion Building here this afternoon, with many of the entries expected before the day ends.

Being a popular annual event, the fair will continue through Saturday.

Persons living and/or attending school in Wheeler County are eligible to enter the fair, and all entries must comply with the department rules with classification to be determined by the director or chairman of each department.

Frank Walker, president of the fair board reported that a large number of entries are expected. Tom Bryant is the vice-president and Henry Risner is the secretary.

Farm products entered in the competition must have been grown by members of the community represented during 1962. In the event any classes are not filled, ribbons are to be awarded according to the placings of the judges.

Purposes of the fair are to reflect agricultural and individual development of the county.

Much activity is ahead on the final day of the fair. The Flower Show, Junior Horse Show, Appaloosa Horse Show and the Livestock Show.

The Junior Horse Show will have a class for registered and unregistered stallions. These two classes were not shown in the fair book, but will be included this year. A youth may show a stallion owned by a member of his immediate family. There are nine halter classes and eight performance classes.

A special feature of the fair will be an animated wild life exhibit by the Texas Fish, Game and Oyster Commission and a mobil civil defense exhibit sponsored by the Wheeler County 4-H Council.

The hay show exhibits will be accepted Thursday evening and have to be in place by 8:30 Friday morning. Neal Prett, extension pasture specialist for the Extension Service from College Station will judge.

GRAZING AND HAYING RIGHTS

A telegram was sent from U.S. Representative Walter Rogers in answer to a request by Wheeler and area farmers for permission to use diverted crop land for haying and grazing purposes.

The telegram read: "Agriculture Department offers Haying and grazing privileges on diverted crop land through October 31 to farmers and ranchers in Potter, Gray and Wheeler Counties. Arrangements, made through ASC County Committee, Walter Rogers."

This means persons having soil bank land and feed grain diverted acres will be able to graze this land at the rate of a minimum of one dollar per acre per month with the maximum charge being fifty percent of the annual payment.

If the land is baled for hay then the charge is fifty percent of the annual payment on the soil bank land or the feed grain diverted acres. Of course, the payment of a minimum of one dollar per acre per month on the feed grain diverted acres will cease when the secretary of agriculture releases this land for grazing which is November 1st. The Wheeler County ASCS Office will administer the program if the request is approved. 14 counties in the Panhandle have already received this approval.

The request from Wheeler County, sent last week, read: Honorable Walter Rogers, We will appreciate your help in getting approval for drought grazing of soil bank and diverted acres in Wheeler and Gray Counties to the local ASC Office. Signed, Clifford Walsler, president of Wheeler County Farm Bureau; John O'Gorman, chairman of ASCS County Committee; Leon Moore, president of Wheeler Chamber of Commerce; Morris Pillows, chairman of Wheeler Co. Building Committee; and Grainger McElhany, State Representative.

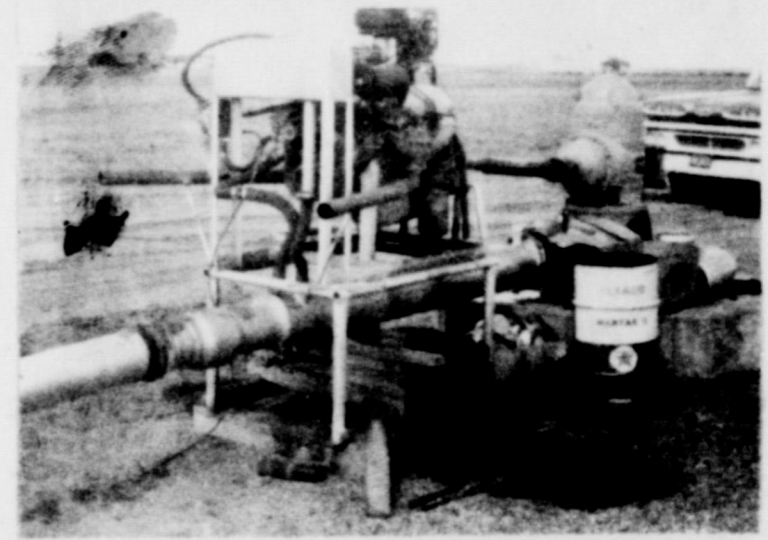

IRRIGATION SYSTEM INSTALLED ON GRADY DODD PLACE NEAR BRISCOE

Grady Dodd of the Briscoe community is shown beside his newly installed irrigation system. The Dodds have a 320 acre farm and plan to irrigate 250 acres of wheat and row crops.

The 400' well was completed July 22 and irrigation was started July 31.

A Tri-Matic System is one of the many systems available Mr. Dodd reports that he can irrigate 22 out of 24 hours. The system

moves itself at the rate of 300 feet each 12 hours and through the 126 sprinkler heads leaves moisture equivalent to 4" of rain.

The well is pumped with butane and has an estimated capacity of 800 gallons per minute.

At the present time, Mr. Dodd is irrigating 34 acres cotton, 25 acres millet and some maize. He is in the process of planting 200 acres of wheat.

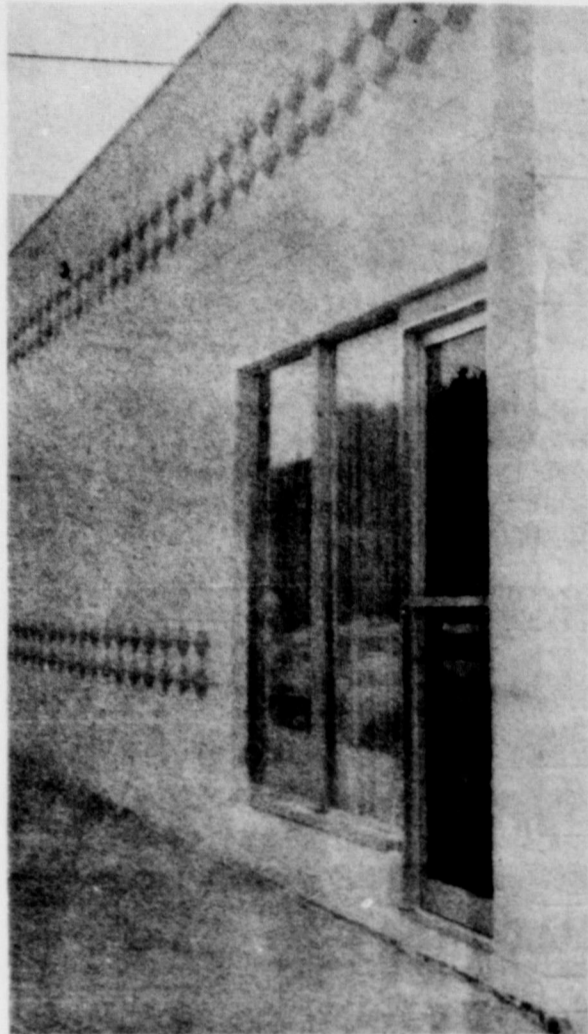

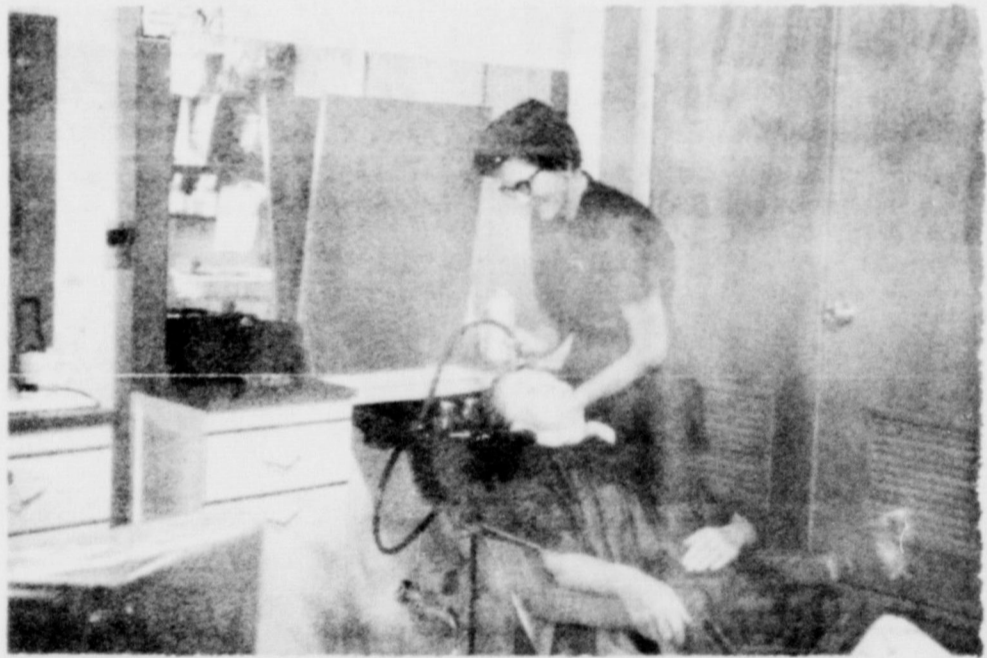

COUNTY AGENTS REPORT

BY CHARLES D. JACKSON

On one Wheeler County Ranch heavy cattle losses resulted recently from nitrate poisoning on Midland Bermuda Grass. Although nitrate poisoning in Bermuda is very rare according to Extension Agronomist and Livestock Specialist, I think that livestock producers will agree that any losses would be considered excessive. The Wheeler County nitrate losses were caused by nitrate accumulation during drought where the leaves wilted or rolled during the day, but take up sufficient water during the night to regain turgor. Grazing of plants that are in stress due to drought should therefore proceed with caution since the plants are consumed before the nitrates can be converted into protein.
Following the application of fertilizer materials to pasture grasses and forage sorghums, several precautions should be observed to avoid possibilities of nitrate poisoning of livestock. The cattle should first be removed from the area to be fertilized. If spillage occurs in filling a rig, the material should be picked up to prevent spots unusually high concentration. Bags should be removed from the field since cattle will sometimes be attracted by them. Livestock should be kept off the area for a week after the area has been fertilized and irrigated.
If the forage is particularly succulent it is a good idea to not graze before 10:00 a.m. since nitrates accumulate in the plants at night and are not changed to the protein forms until sufficient light has been received.
The possibility of nitrate toxicity should not discourage farmers from using nitrogen fertilizers at economically practical rates recommended by the Extension Service since nitrate accumulation in plants may occur under certain conditions on soils that have not been recently fertilized. A veterinarian should be called at once when nitrate poisoning is suspected.
The county agent's office has a procedure outlined for ranchers for use to test plants for nitrate accumulation.

It is a chemical test that the livestock producer may run in the field. Another method would be to use cull cows as quina pigs to test the grass before it is grazed by the entire herd.
A rough, bumpy or pimply surface on watermelons may be an indication of anthracnose-one of the most destructive diseases of susceptible varieties. This fungus is known to attack all parts of the above-ground portion of melon plants. It usually appears first on the older leaves near the crown. First symptoms show up as irregular black spots on the leaves.
During rainy or damp weather, these spots increase in size and the center becomes an orange-pink mass of spores. The spots or lesions will enlarge to kill the leaf and, if weather conditions persist, the fungus will spread rapidly, defoliating the entire plant.
In dry weather the disease does not spread rapidly and spore masses on the leaves are usually gray and difficult to detect.
Since the fungus is known to remain in the soil for several years, it is advisable to grow cucurbits only once in a five-year rotation where land is infested.
Although anthracnose can be controlled by fungicides, the most economical means is to plant resistant varieties where feasible.
Charleston Gray, Congo, Blackstone and Fairfax are among the resistant varieties. For fungicidal control of anthracnose, seed must be treated with such chemicals as Arasan, Spergan and Semesan.

GRUB CONTROL

Feet cattle producers and dairymen offer fail to notice the hidden damage inflicted by cattle grubs. These losses began when heel flies attach their eggs to cattle and continue through the period when the grubs appear as lumps in the back. Grub losses can be reduced with timely applications of any one of the three recommended systemic insecticides. The insecticides are called systemics because they are distributed inside the body of the animal and carried to the site where the grubs occur.
Since only one application is necessary, proper timing is all important. Early applications of systemic insecticides are considerably safer and more effective than the later ones. The treatment time might possibly vary within the state, but greater efficiency will be obtained when applications are made between May 1 and September 1 or as soon as possible after heel fly activity ceases.

Apply either a 0.375% or 0.25% spray is used, make 2 applications not more than 3 hours apart. If the 0.25 spray is used, make 2 applications not more than 3 hours apart. The 0.375% concentration should be applied once per year. With either spray concentration, the animals should be wet to the skin as thorough coverage is essential. Do not treat sick or emaciated animals or calves less than three months of age. Treat animals 3 to 6 months of age only lightly. Co-Ral should not be used with pyrethrin, allethrin or synergists. Do not treat lactating dairy animals or dry dairy animals within 14 days of freshening. Allow at least 7 days between the last pour-on application or either spray concentration and slaughter.
Pour-on treatments using Co-Ral should be applied at the rate of 1/2 pint per animal (4 lbs. 25% wettable powder in 3 gallons of water or light mineral oil) distributed uniformly down the backline. The mixture should be agitated frequently to maintain uniform suspension and precautions taken to prevent run-off. Allow at least 7 days between the last pour-on application and slaughter.
Runnel offers a choice of treatment methods and formulations. When employing the free-choice method, either the mineral block or granules containing 5.5% of this product may be used. Provide one mineral feed box or one mineral feed for each 15 head of cattle. Commence treatment as soon as heel fly activity ceases and feed for 75 days or more continuously. Consumption can be enhanced by mixing the granular form with an oil meal (cottonseed, linseed or soybean). The recommended rate of consumption is 1/4 pound per 100 lbs of body weight per head per month. Remove mineral blocks or granules 21 days prior to slaughter. The granular form containing Runnel may also be mixed with feed according to manufacturers directions for the 14-day treatment. The recommendations include feeding 1.5 lb. per 100 lbs. of body weight over at least 3 days between treatment and slaughter.
When using either method of treatment, animals should have easy access to water. Do not feed ronnal to sick or stressed animals or in conjunction with any other salt or mineral supplement. Do not use a ronnal feed additive and a ronnal mineral supplement at the same time. Dairy animals within 28 days of freshening or lactating dairy animals should not be fed ronnal.
Ruelene may be applied as a 0.5% spray for grub control. Thorough coverage of the animal is essential with large animals requiring approximately 1 gal. of spray while smaller animals require only 1 to 3 qts. depending on the size. Do not apply to dry dairy animals within 28 days of freshening. Lactating dairy animals, or sick or stressed animals.

At his Wheeler County campaign Kickoff Rally in Wheeler Monday night, Bob Price, Republican Candidate for Congress in the 18th Congressional District, blistered his democratic opponent for being "the Panhandle's absentee Congressman."
Price charged that his opponent "has been absent from the Panhandle so long that he had lost contact with the voters and their views on issues affecting the area." Price cited his opponent's stand on wheat legislation as an example. He stated that "the Panhandle wheat farmers voted overwhelmingly against the wheat referendum last fall, but less than six months later the present Democratic incumbent cynically voted to support the administration's wheat legislation. This legislation, "Price charged, "was clearly contrary to the expressed will of our wheat farmers. It is time, "Price further declared, "that we elect a congressman from the Panhandle who is close to the people of the district and who will courageously fight for their views and turn out the present administration lackey who is controlled by the power hungry political lords of Texas."

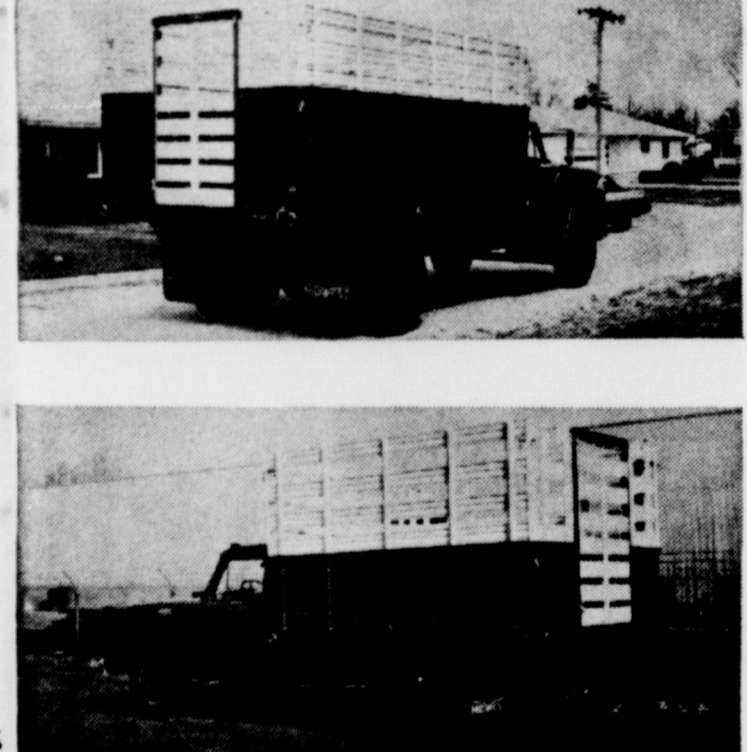
