MUSTANGS UNSADDLE MATADORS 28-0

MEMPHIS -- Little Bobby Vanpool broke open a scoreless battle with a 93 yard touchdown run in the third quarter and sparked the Mustangs to a 28-0 victory over the Matador Matadas Thanksgiving Day.

An overflow crowd of 3,000 sat in bright, sunshing weather to watch the Herd roll to their 11th straight victory and eighth shoutout of the year to win the bidistrict title. The trememdous defensive showing by Wheeler which held on the oneyard line and then set up 3 last quarter touchdowns handed the Matadors their first defeat of the year, their fourth shoutout in history and their most lopsided defeat since 1961.

It was eleven men against one as every one of the Wheeler starters came in for a piece of credit. Richard Campbell, the Matadors' great fullback, who won last year's encounter single handed, tried to do it all over again, but failed. Campbell was all over the field

Leading the fense were Villard Hunter Dunk Porter and Terry Mc Casland. Hunter, the redheaded end, played the finest game of his career as he was in on 10 tackles, broke up passes and caught a touchdown heave of his own. The Dunk at middle linebacker piled in on 11 tackles and made the key yardage at fullback time and again. McCasland smashed in on nine tackles, backed by Overcast and Danny Dorman as they kept the middle of the line like the

With Hunter and Jamison leading the way, four plays later the Mats were on the 42 and punted out. On the next play, Wheeler again fumbled away the ball on their 18. Two plays later, Charles Ezzell ran wide right to a first

It was Matador's last threat of the game, although no one knew it then. The Mats made one more stab when Porter punted out to the Matador 45 and Ezzell returned it to the Wheeler 38. 1964 CENSUS OF AGRI-CULTURE BRINGS FARM AND RANCH STATISTICS UP TO DATE FOR CO.

The 1964 Lensus of Agriculture, now being conducted by the Bureau of the Census, U.S. Department of Commerce, in Wheeler Co., will bring up to date the farm and ranch statistics last collected in 1959.

Here are a few of the many facts recorded in the 1959 agriculture census for this County:

There were 719 farms and ranches in 1959, compared with 853 in 1964. The average size of farm and ranch was 735.8 acres in 1959, compared with 579.7 acres in 1954.

The value of products sold by the County's farmers and ranchers in 1959 was \$5,092,509. The value of all crops sold was \$2,414,353. The value of all livestock products sold was \$2,678,156. The 1964 national Cen-

sus of Agriculture is the 18th in a series which began in 1840. Because of the rapid changes American agriculture has been undergoing in recent years. Census Bureau officials regard the current census as one of the most significant ever taken. They ask every farmer and rancher to cooperate in compiling an accurate record of these changes by filling out the census form he receives in the mail and holding the completed questionnaire until a census taker calls for it.

SCD NEWS

Wheeler County is ideally located to provide fishing spots for panhandle city dwellers.

Income producing recreation is becoming important as a new land use all over the country. It has been brought about by the increased population of urban areas. People from the city are willing to pay for a place to get out in the country and pursue their favorite sport.

The Soil Conservation Service will give technical assistance for the construction of lakes to be used recreation purposes. Cost share assistance for such lakes can be provided if the primary purpose of the lake is livestock water. In other words, government cost share may be provided to construct a lake to be used for recreation income if it is also needed for livestock water.
