### County Agents Report

Several livestock producers have been asking when Wheeler County would receive its Modified Certified Brucellosis Accreditation. We hope that we will receive our accreditation by late spring or summer. Thus far over 700 herds which are all known herds, have been tested and about sixty-five of these herds had or still have infection. As soon as these herds report clean from retesting and the infection rate is reduced to less than 5 percent of the herds and 1 percent of the cattle, then Wheeler County will receive a Certificate as a Modified Certified Brucellosis Free County.

Breaking ice on stock watering troughs or tanks is no pleasant task. This irksome job can be avoided by installing an automatic livestock waterer, equipped with an electrical heating element.

Water should be available for livestock for all times, even in the coldest weather. Automatic waterers keep a continuous supply of fresh water on hand.

Electrically heated waterers come in different shapes and sizes for all types of livestock. Basically, a unit consists of a tank fed by pressure or a gravity water system, a float valve, a heating element controlled by a thermostat, and a housing to support the tank and exclude outside air movement around it.

I suggest purchasing the smallest unit that will provide ample water for your livestock. A general purpose bowl-type waterer will handle up to 30 head of cattle or 60 hogs. Types which have the heating element immersed in the water or are attached to the underside of the tank are usually more efficient than those warming the space enclosed by the housing.

The thermostat, being an important part of the automatic waterer, should have a five degree range between the "on" and "off" operating points for best results. Cattle or combination waterers should be insulated on the sides to conserve electricity. Covers are also recommended for reducing operating costs and as an aid to keeping the water clean. It is important to select a unit which can be cleaned easily.

Water temperature should be maintained just high enough to prevent freezing. This will usually be between 45 and 50 degrees F. Detailed information on selection, installation and operation of these time and labor-saving devices is available at the local county agent's office.

Now is the time to fight rats. With cold weather, rats move from outdoors into houses and farm buildings in search of food and shelter.

Just 50 rats can eat enough grain annually to feed a dairy cow for a year. One rat can eat about two-thirds as much mash as a hen, but they waste and contaminate many times more food than they eat.

If you see one rat, you can be sure that there are others. In addition to destroying grain and feed, rats carry more than 35 known diseases to man and animals. They also gnaw on anything that comes between them and their food supply—grain bags, paper cartons and wooden containers—and start fires by damaging wire insulation.

How do you get rid of them? By removing their shelter, starving them out and rat-proofing buildings. Use concrete, galvanized sheet metal, brick, hardware cloth or aluminum. Build foundations and basement floors and walls with concrete. Store grain and other feed on pallets in rat-proofed rooms.

Poisoning is the most effective way to kill rats. Use a good bait, put it in a proper place and service the bait station regularly. Always keep poisoned bait away from children and animals.

Most practical chemicals are anticoagulants which include products such as fumarin, prival and warfarin. These chemicals are usually mixed with grains and can be purchased ready-mixed.

It is important that plenty of bait be available at all times during a baiting period of 10-14 days.

### SCD NEWS

#### Range Use

Proper range use consists of grazing rangeland in such a manner so as to not exceed approximately 50% of the current annual growth by weight of the key plants.

Plant physiology requires a maximum amount of green material to be left at the end of the growing season in order to allow the plant to build a sufficient food reserve. This food reserve will be maintained during the winter within the root system. The potential of the plant the following growing season will depend on the amount and depth of food reserve.

Close grazing just prior to frost will not allow the plant to develop a deep, durable root system and will usually result in winter killing. Therefore, under proper range use a more adequate grazing system can be maintained resulting in more grass.

Proper range use for the taller grasses will leave about an 8-10 inch stubble. Shorter grasses need to be maintained at approximately 4-6 inches prior to frost.

This is one of the many practices recommended by the Soil Conservation Service. For additional information contact your local office.


**A Thought for Parents**



### Solve Your Rat Problems

by Charles D. Jackson

Rodents have long been a major problem in Wheeler County for farmers, ranchers and anyone that has a green thumb around the house. Field rats, pocket gophers and prairie dogs are continuing to inflict heavy damage in many areas of the County. Until recently the Wheeler County Commissioner's Court was permitted to purchase poison grain and resell to local residents. According to Mr. H.D. "Jimmy" Ellard, Assistant District Agent, Fish and Wildlife Service, this form of grain distribution will no longer be allowed. Due to changes in agricultural practices, increased interest in all forms of wildlife and in a few cases, misuse of field rodent baits, it has become necessary for the Fish and Wildlife Service to have a closer degree of control over the poison grain.

In the future the poison grain will be sold at demonstrations conducted by fieldmen of the Fish and Wildlife Service. At these meetings people will be instructed concerning the use of the proper baits, placement of this materials and the use of fumigants for all rodents concerned. The sale of the bait and finances will be handled by the host farmer, who is a member of the County Rodent and Predator Committee. No surplus bait can be left in a county after the program is completed.

The next demonstration conducted in Wheeler County will be held February 23 at the County Agents office from 10:00 a.m. until 2:00 p.m. Anyone desiring to purchase grain may do so at that time for prairie dog, pocket gopher and field rat control. It may be necessary to hold a follow up demonstration a week or so later.

Listed below is the formula for mixing poison grain if anyone would like to prepare their own. I would like to remind anyone that this poison grain is very dangerous and anyone should take utmost safety precautions when handling the bait.

**FIELD RODENT BAIT**  
 1/16 MIX  
**INGREDIENTS:**  
 Maize or steam crushed oats, 16 lbs.  
 Glass Starch, 1 tablespoon water, 1 pint  
 Strychnine Alkaloid, 1 oz.  
 Baking Soda, 2 tablespoons  
 Heavy corn syrup, 1 cup  
 Glycerine, 1 tablespoon

Dissolve starch into 1/4 cup cold water and stir this solution into the remaining part of the pint of water which has been brought to a boil. Cook until it forms a thin clear paste. Blend the strychnine and soda together and stir into the starch part. Then add the corn syrup and glycerine. Stir the mixture thoroughly. Pour over grain and mix until every kernel is coated. Spread on a paper in a thin layer and dry.

This mixture will give good results on field rodents if properly used. Best results are obtained in prairie dog control if oats are used in the bait. Prebaiting with untreated oats should be done before the poisoned grain is placed. Alternate materials should be used if protected birds are in the area.

This material should be stored in properly labeled containers out of reach of pets, livestock and children.

Give first aid by inducing vomiting. A tablespoon of mustard in a glass of warm water helps. Give powdered charcoal or burned toast and call a doctor immediately.

### New Hours For

General Telephone customers will join others throughout the nation in enjoying reduced station to station interstate long distance rates effective February 1, 1965, according to Joe H. Collyns, director of public relations.

The rate reduction, announced late last year by the Federal Communications Commission, extends the hours during which station to station late night rates and night rates are in effect. For example, the late night rates which apply only to station to station interstate calls (formerly referred to as the "After 9" rates) are now in effect all day Sunday and from 8 p.m. to 4:30 a.m. Monday through Saturday. Station to station interstate night rates, formerly in effect from 6 p.m. to 9 p.m. each day, will now be in effect all day Saturday (from 4:30 a.m. to 8 p.m.) and from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Emphasis is placed on the fact that only station to station calls of over 431 miles between states are affected by the new rate reductions. Person to person calls and regular day time calling rates remain essentially the same.

E. H. Danner, president of General of the Southwest, has indicated that it is too early to determine precisely what effect the rate reduction will have on the long distance calling habits of General's customers. However, he pointed out that it is entirely possible that the effect will be to provide an additional stimulus to long distance traffic, thereby resulting in little or no change in General's toll revenues. "It is extremely important to bear in mind that long distance traffic has been increasing steadily from year to year and that this upward trend is expected to continue," he said.



## LANDMARK BURNS

The "Old Kelton Cash Store" was destroyed by fire on the morning of January 5. The store was built in 1924 by Mr. J.D. Rutherford and A.C. Johnson. At that time it was known as "Kelton Cash Store". They owned the store until 1932 when they dissolved partnership. At the beginning of the operation of the store all merchandise was hauled from Texola, Oklahoma. A carload of flour would be purchased at one time, with part of it going to a store in Texola and the other half at Kelton. The Kelton store would use up their part first and then help the store at Texola use up their part before another shipment could be bought. An old 1928 Chevrolet truck was owned by the store with a panel on it with the print of "Kelton Cash Store, Kelton, Texas." Many a time people would notice the truck in town and know that they had a way home.

The Johnson-Rutherford partnership was dissolved in 1932 and Mr. Johnson put in the present "Johnson Cafe and Grocery". Mr. Rutherford continued to operate the store until 1933. The store was not in operation for about a year and was used for a school class room for a while. Mr. Rutherford went from Kelton to Oustee, where he operated a store. He now resides at 607 Red River, Wheeler, Texas.

Mr. and Mrs. Albert Holcomb from Aledo, Oklahoma were the next owners of the store. They were the ones that were instrumental in getting the Kelton Post Office. Mr. and Mrs. Holcomb ran the store until 1942. They sold the store to Mrs. Holcomb's brother, Mr. and Mrs. Ollie Elliott of Sayre, Okla. Mr. and Mrs. Holcomb now live at 2915 Epperly Drive, Oklahoma City. They now operate a cleaners there. Their son Gary lives in Weatherford and has a new son, Ann, the daughter is in Oklahoma City.

Mr. and Mrs. Elliott operated the store until 1960 when they sold the store to
