The North Wheeler county hospital board has announced that the Parkview hospital located in Wheeler, Texas will officially be opened May 9, 1965. The hospital is comprised of 15 patient rooms with beds to accommodate 20 persons. The latest modern equipment has been used to furnish the operating room, laboratory and a nursery with an explosion-proof incubator.

A highly qualified staff of trained personnel consists of the following: Mrs. Cecil Snelgroves R. N. She will also serve as hospital administrator and supervisor of the personnel: Mrs. Florence White R. N. of Wheeler; Mrs. Kathy Williams L. V. N. of Wheeler; Mrs. Lorna Mayfield P. N. of Lela; Mrs. Verna Bell Markham of Wheeler P. N.; Mrs. Leo Lamb P. N. of Wheeler receptionist; Mrs. Cora Lee Lowden Lab Tech; Mr. Glen Markham, custodian of Wheeler; Mrs. Bernice Hooker and Mrs. Lucille Laycock are the kitchen personnel.

This hospital district is fortunate in having the following doctors practicing in this immediate area; Dr. Larry Barbour; Dr. H. E. Nicholson; Dr. Paul Stewart and Dr. Glenn Walker.

The construction of Parkview hospital, an attractive all-brick, fire-proof structure has been financed by local taxation of the North Wheeler county hospital district. The hospital is located one block east of U. S. Highway 83 at Sweetwater and 9th in view of the city Park. Its location assures both privacy and convenience.

The hospital board is composed of Tom Puryear, president, Herbert Finsterwald, Vice-president; Hiram Whitner, Secretary; Clyde Dukes and Lester Leonard have cordially invited the public to attend the hospital opening May 9, 1965. The hours designated are from 2 p.m. until 6 p.m.

Immediately after the dedication ceremonies a reception and guided tour of the hospital.

BOARD OF EDUCATION CALLS HEARING ON SCHOOL PLANS

"Now is the time for all good men to come to the aid of their country!"

Sounds like a practice sentence in a typing class, doesn't it? And yet it seems to me that it illustrates the planning now being done by your board of Education, by me, and by the board of Equalization which will be holding hearing on May 12-13-14-15.

As you know, the McMorries Company of Amarillo was retained by the school district and by the city of Wheeler to do an equalization of all property (real and personal) so that fair market values could be assessed equally and uniformly for all tax payers. These men will be ready at the gym May 12, 13, 14, 15, ready and willing to explain to you their methods in arriving at the values placed upon your property. After this is explained to you, you may then, if you so desire, appear before the Board of Equalization before your values are finally fixed for the next school year.

In addition, when the tax hearings are completed, your board of Education, the Architects and Bonding Co will give to you complete facts and figures about a Bond Issue to be voted upon for a proposed new school plant.

You, the patrons of our school, have a right to these facts and figures and we propose to give them to you without fear or favor. Then you, as a citizen, will have the final responsibility of accepting or rejecting the Bond Issue.

We are representing you and the future of our children in making these proposals. We urge that before making up your mind, that you have full and complete information about everything connected with the project.

In all my career I believe one great truth stands out. It is simply this, "People usually have the kind of educational system for which they are willing to pay."

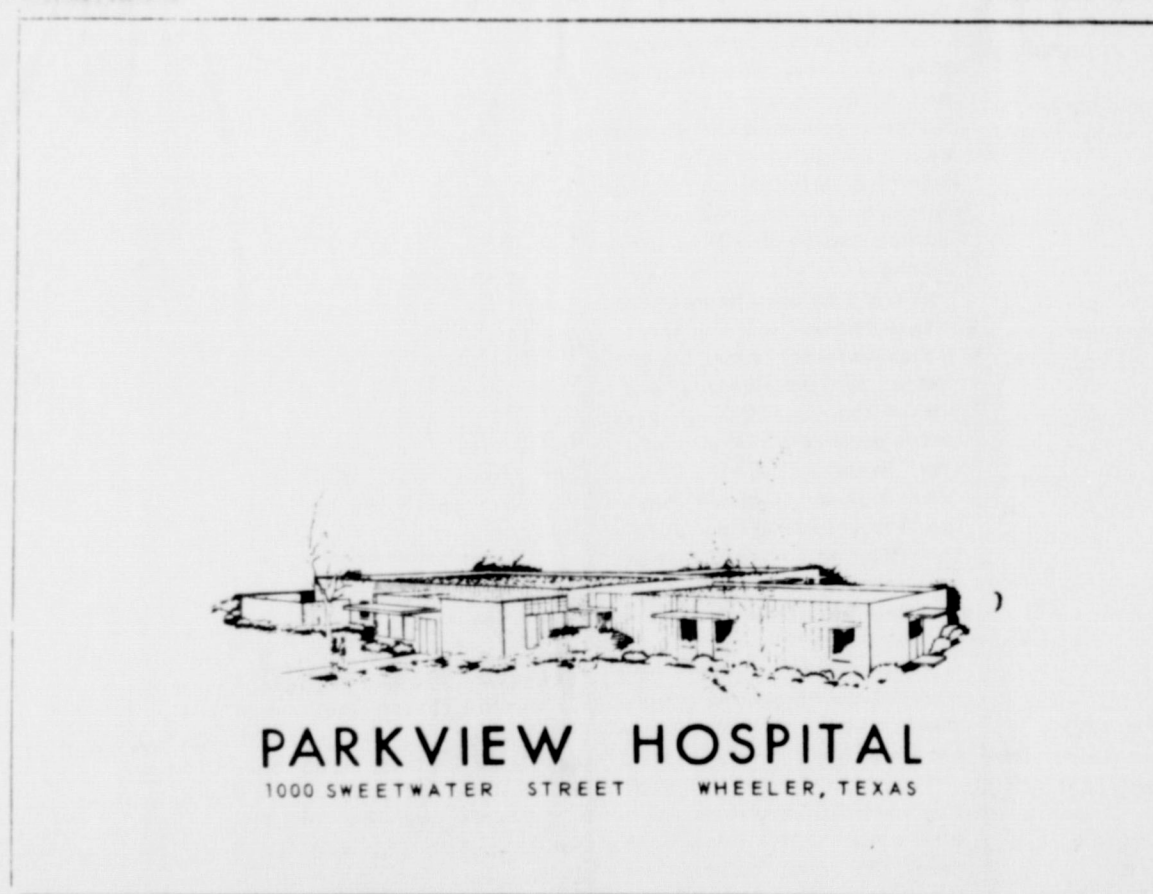

COUNTY AGENT

A properly managed farm pond can provide excellent fishing and serve as a source of recreation and income to farmers and ranchers.
 However, most ponds should be fertilized for maximum fish production just as cropland often needs to be fertilized for maximum crop production. Fertilizer increases the supply of plankton which is the main food supply for small fish and water insects.
 Early in spring when the water temperature reaches 50 degrees F., is the time to begin your fertilization program.
 Most Texas waters respond to an initial treatment of 100 pounds of 20-20-5 analysis fertilizer per surface acre, followed by successive treatments of 20-40 pounds per acre at 2-week intervals until a desirable bloom has been reached. In water surrounded by soils with ample potassium such as the blacklands, 16-20-0 gives good results. Nitrogen and phosphorus seem to be essential for good plankton production in most ponds regardless of the surrounding soil type.
 The plankton bloom is sufficient if a persons cupped hand disappears when the arm is immersed in the water to elbow depth. The bloom usually appears in 1 to 5 weeks after beginning the program. Subsequent applications should be made only as needed to maintain the bloom.

Farm Electrification Short Course To be Offered Here

A farm electrification short course for adult farmers will be held May 10-13 under the sponsorship of the Wheeler high school vocational Agriculture department according to Mr. Cordell, superintendent and Mr. Dennis Wilks, teacher of vocational agriculture.

Mr. Foy Page, farm electrification specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the department of Agricultural Engineering at Texas A&M University will do the instructing in the course. He is headquartered at Texas A&M University.

Mr. Page holds a Masters degree in Agricultural education and has taught vocational ag for 13 years prior to his present position. He taught farm electrification to high school students, young and adult farmers, and participated in farm electrification short courses at Texas A&M and Austin. Recently he completed an intensified three week short course in farm electrification at Texas A&M University sponsored by the Texas farm electrification committee. Arrangements for adult education short course in

electrical equipment and how to calculate the cost of operating electrical equipment. Farm wiring techniques will be demonstrated and class enrollees will have the opportunity to do practice wiring including 120/240 volt service outlets, 3-way and 4-way switches, lights, etc.

Mr. Wilks, teacher of vocational agriculture, states that enrollees are invited to bring their families and that visitors are welcome to the first meeting of this short course. Mr. Page will cover Safety in the Home at this meeting and if the past is any indication, men, women and children will find it interesting. All equipment used in this demonstration will be equipment found in every ones home.

Short courses in farm electrification as well as in other areas, are now available to farmers throughout the state under the new cooperative program between the Texas Education Agency and Texas A&M University.

This cooperative program is designed to make the services of specialist available to conduct short courses under the supervision of public schools. Such a program will enable teachers of vocational agriculture to provide improved educational services to farm people.

Specialist are now available in the fields of beef production, insect control, farm management, farm electrification, farm arc welding, swine production, tractor maintenance, dairy science, oxy-acetylene welding and pasture.
