



About Knits

Information

By Vivian Warminski Knits have become an inportant part of every girl's wardrobe -- since they are both smart and comfortable. But remember even though knits are very much in the news, they do require special know ledge and care on the part of the buyer.

A single knit--such as Jersey-has just one set of wrap yars and one set of filling yarns, so it is lighter in weight than a double thickness to the fabric. Many new knits are pre-lined. When choosing your pattern, select a simple one with as few seams as possible. Do not choose patterns requiring cutting on the bias, such as circular skirts.

In preparing your knitted fabric for sewing, first establish your guideline--or grain line--by hand basting along one straight lengthwise rib. Fold double knits parallel with the basted rib and then lay out your pattern, using pins placed closely together. On all knit fabrics, you should stay-stitch the edges you do not want to become distorted, such as necklines, and shoulder seams. Use a fine sewing machine needle, synethic or cotton thread and sew from 12 to 16 stitches per inch. Snigle knits require a medium tension; a loose tension-a size 11 or 14 needle and a straight or small zig-zag stitch--for double knits is recommended.


It's best to sew seam tape or ribbon into the shoulder seams and waistline of all knits. Stitch double knits around the botton and then catch-stitch the raw edge invisibly to the garment.

management specialist says the income averaging provision of the Internal Revenue Cose can benefit farmers and ranchers who have unusually high taxable income this

Specialist John Seibert, of Lubbock, says income averaging can be helpful to such people as dryland farmers who have had a succession of drouth years and than have gotten moisture for bumper crops. Others who might benefit from the provision include cotton producers who have sold both their

'64 and '65 calves this fall. The current averaging provision was put in the code in '64. Averageable income must be more than \$3,000 before it can be applied Seiin four words, "Second verse, same stanza." bert said.

Under the provision, the income of the four preceding years is averaged and then multiplied by 133 1/3 percent. The product is then subtracted from this year's taxable income and the remainder is called the Averageable income, provided it exceeds \$3,000 he said.

This Averageable income is taxed under a moderately complex formula, according to the specialist, but the tax liability will be less than

When a battery gets low from prolonged use of a starter or accidental discharge, it can be easily recharged ring in the vehicle with a battery charger. This saves the job of removing the battery and hauling it to a service station. Batteries can be maintained at a peak charge, too, instead of waiting for them to catch you unaware.

There are three common types of battery chargers. These are the trickle charger used only for keeping a battery in a state of full charge while in standby storage as in filling stations.

The fast or quick charger is capable of restoring a high state of charge in a sound battery in 20 to 30 minutes. These are quite expensive, usually \$75 to \$100, chiefly for service station use. The battery charger of five
