BLOOD MOBILE WILL BE IN WHEELER AUGUST 9th

In early 1966 Parkview hospital became a part of the American Red Cross blood program. Blood at that time was being secured by the hospital from local donors and had to be typed, processed and cross checked or could be purchased from the Amarillo blood bank at the cost of \$21.50 per unit. Under the Red Cross blood bank program the cost is \$8.00 per unit. There is an extra cost to the patient in both cases for cross checking at the price of \$5.00. The laboratory fee of \$5 is paid by all insurance policies, but very few policies pay for any blood at all.

A supply of blood is now available at all times in our area of all types and any quantity can be secured from the chapter headquarters at Wichita Kansas. The local community must aid in the blood bank program and their share is the greater one.

No service of the American Red Cross depends more on the public at large than does the blood program.

The bloodmobile will be in Wheeler again on Aug. 9 and our quota is again 100 units. We have fallen short of our quota in the past, with our quota being 100 units for each visit we have only donated 97 units altogether.

The hospital reports they have used 76 units from the blood bank. During this period 10 units were used from local donors in an emergency situation, and because the bank was in short supply at that time, of the type needed for the patient.

Funeral services were held Monday, July 24, for Arville Dean Atherton, 19, Arville Dean passed away at Parkview Hospital Saturday, July 22, 1967. He had spent the past four weeks in the hospital being treated for burns received in a butane explosion.

Arville Dean was born in Shamrock, Texas, Dec. 13, 1947 to Darville Edward and Sammie Lee Atherton. His entire life with the exception of the past year was spent in the Briscoe Community. He attended Briscoe schools and received his high school diploma in 1966.

THE REMAINS: Some stucco and part of the tin roof is all that remains of the Kenneth Killingsworth home in Kelton community. Killingsworth awoke and the house was full of smoke. He awoke his wife and three children and all of them made it safely out of the house. Mrs. Killingsworth was treated at Parkview for burns about the face and back. Kenneth received only minor burns on his hands and back. The fire which apparently started in the kitchen of the five room house, left the house and its contents a pile of fine ashes. The Shamrock Fire Department was called, but arrived too late to extinguish the blaze.

FARM SAFETY WEEK

The week of July 23-29 has been proclaimed as National Farm Safety Week by President Johnson. It is at this time that we need to concentrate on the important of safety. The motto for the week is "Think and Act Safely." It is only human for us to think "Oh well, it will never happen to me."
Just ask the 3.4 million people yearly who suffer from disabling injuries if it didn't happen to them. There is an average of 8,000 farm residents accidentally killed a year. Did they believe it would happen to them.
Back in 1913 when the National Safety Council was born there wasn't much of a philosophy of safety: accidents just happen... and that was that. They happened to people on farms, in mills, in homes, on roads and railroads. Few men really had much of an idea why accidents happened nor did they know much about how to prevent them. The fact that accidents could be reduced by a logical, systematic prevention means was a new idea.
Time has given the validity of this disciplined and organized approach to accident prevention tools.
While tomorrow promises new possibilities for cutting accident rates, we should not wait for tomorrow to speed up our safety program. NSC President Howard Pyle has said that if the Nation would apply all of its present accident knowledge, accident losses could be slashed in half.

But the main accident prevention depends on how well we as individuals perform in our daily lives. Many years ago, Dr. Herman Horne, a prominent educator, remarked, "Aristotle defined courage as the 'golden mean' between cowardice and foolhardiness. The man of courage recognizes danger, but doesn't run into it unnecessarily, and acts on behalf of the greatest good. So it is with all virtues; they are the 'golden mean.' We should be safe when there is nothing at stake worth risking one's safety for."
Let us in Wheeler County make our community a safe place for all to live. This can be done by following some safety simple rules:
1. Take time to care
2. Be alert to ordinary hazards of daily life
3. Know what to do in an emergency
4. Correct hazards promptly
5. Learn to live with hazards that can't be helped or corrected
6. Think and act safely.

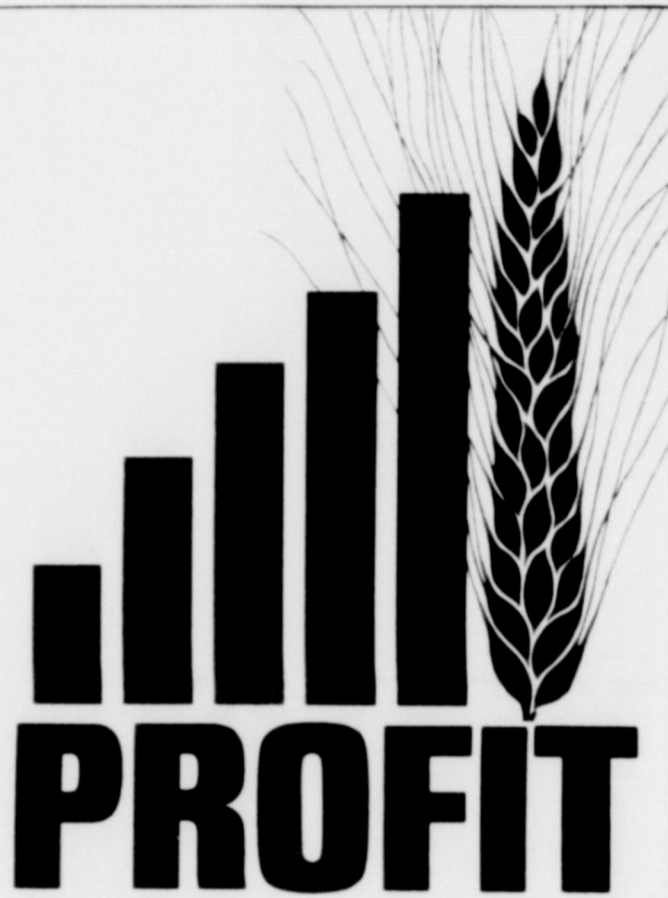

ACROSS THE FENCE

We look for a bumper crop this year. Most farmers are optimistic about the chances of cotton, milo and hay and grazing. Two to three inches of rain fell last week and milo and cotton's really coming along. Fertilizer applied will likely give maximum results.
Fusarium Wilt. We've noticed some akra wilting and dying in Wheeler County gardens. If you look closely, you can see a browning or brown coloration of the water conducting vessels in the stems of the plants. This makes the plants literally starve themselves to death for water because water has to move from the roots upward through the stem to the leaves. We suggest gardeners grow another crop if they observe this problem.
Nematodes Nematodes or parasitic eel worms can play havoc with gardens. The earliest type to identify is the root knot nematode because the roots are abnormally swelled and distorted. Others can be seen only under a microscope. However, the damage is readily evident. Stunting and a general decline in bearing time are easy-to-see symptoms. Perhaps the best answer is growing resistant varieties. Lima beans resistant to nematodes are Fordhook 242 and Bixby. Pole Beans resistant are Alabama Number 1 and Number 2. California blackeyes 5 Southern Peas and Dixie Lee are resistant. Information is available at the office for other vegetables. We get a lot of questions from homeowners about chemical control of nematodes. Nema-gon, an effective nematocide, is one of the best. It is the only one that can be used around living plants. Applied in the planting row as a liquid prior to planting, nema-gon will control nematodes at an economical cost.
