WALL GIVEN 7 1/2 YEAR TERM



Tommy Wall of Shamrock was sentenced to 7 1/2 years in the state penitentiary Thursday by a jury of 12 men. The jury found Wall guilty of raping an 11 year old Shamrock girl Dec. 9, 1965.

The trial began Monday, May 16 in 31st District Court with Judge Lewis M. Goodrich, presiding. The final juror was chosen Tuesday at 5:45 Tuesday after 54 prospective jurors were examined. Court was in session until 10:30 Monday evening in an effort to select the jury.

Testimony began Wednesday morning. Testifying were Dr. Blackletter, examining physician and Dr. Porter, lab technician, both of Shamrock. They testified for the state. County Attorney Guy Hardin and the victim of the crime were also called by the state to testify. A recording made by the victim only hours after the incident occurred was played for the jury. The recording was made in the office of Guy Hardin. The wife of the accused was called to the stand by the state, but she refused to testify.

The jury retired to decide the case at 8:45. The men returned at 10:05 to have the recording played and to have the testimony of Guy Hardin read back to them. They returned to the jury room at 10:35.

The jury deliberated until 1:30 a.m. Thursday before retiring for the night. A verdict of guilty was returned at 11:20 Thursday.

Wall chose to have the jury determine the sentence. After hearing a plea by the defense attorney, George Gilkerson of Lubbock for leniency the jury retired to set sentence. The men returned at 2:20 p.m. with the decision.

Vegetables From A to Z

 "Vegetables from A to Z," a continuation of articles on new ways to prepare vegetables to add variety to your meals.

The next vegetables are beans and Broccoli. Beans and Broccoli are both good sources of Vitamin A.

Ruth's Green Beans
 2 tablesp. butter or margarine
 1 medium onion, minced
 1 clove garlic, split
 1 pkg. frozen green beans, thawed just enough to break up
 1 teasp. salt
 1/8 to 1/4 teasp. pepper
 1/2 teasp. sugar
 2 medium tomatoes, chopped, peeled

In butter in large skillet, saute onion and garlic until golden; discard garlic. Add beans, salt, pepper, sugar and tomatoes. Cover and simmer 20 to 25 minutes or until beans are tender.

Fried Broccoli
 2 lb. Broccoli
 1 teasp. salt
 Boiling water
 1/4 cup olive or salad oil
 2 cloves garlic, halved

Wash broccoli; split each stalk lengthwise; then cut lengthwise gashes along each stalk. Place flat in 10" skillet; sprinkle with salt; pour in boiling water till 1" deep. Cover; boil 15 to 20 minutes or until stalks are tender crisp. Lift out to pie plate. Pour water out of

skillet; then pour in oil. Add garlic and cook until golden. Discard garlic; add broccoli and heat, shaking skillet gently until well coated. Taste and add more salt if necessary.

Buying hints for broccoli. Buy 2 pounds for four servings. Broccoli should be fresh and clean with firm, tender stalks. The broccoli should have tightly closed green flower buds in compact clusters or heads; there should be no yellow evident in the buds.

The James Connally Technical Institute, a part of the Texas A&M University System, will offer courses in 15 areas of study when its doors open for the first time in September.

The Institute was created by an act of the Texas Legislature in April 1965. The Legislature authorized the Board of Directors of Texas A&M University to establish "a coeducational institution...which may offer courses of study in vocational and vocational-technical education for which there is a demand within the State of Texas."

Information on the new educational facility, located near Waco, is now available at the office of all county agents. Agents have been supplied with a copy of the Institute's general catalog for the 1966-67 session.

The instructional programs of the Institute are designed for training and retraining youth and adults so they may join the state and nation's work force as skilled workmen and technicians. A major objective of the Institute is to provide occupational training needed by Texas business and industry and for which there is sufficient demand by students.

Persons desiring to enroll must submit applications for admission. High school graduates can be admitted as regular full time students. Mature individuals who have not graduated from high school will be permitted to register if they furnish evidence that their preparation is substantially the same as required of other applicants.


