

Fire Prevention Week

October 9-15, 1988 is FIRE PREVENTION WEEK in Wheeler County and across the nation, sponsored by the National Fire Protection

In his proclamation, County Judge Morgan calls attention to this year's FPW theme, "A sound you can live with...TEST YOUR DETECTOR!" which emphasizes the importance of smoke detectors, their installation and testing. Battery operated smoke detectors should be tested monthly to make sure they are in good working

The Wheeler County Farm Bureau joins with the fire departments in urging participation in fire prevention. Larry Elmore, President of the Wheeler County Farm Bureau said, "Fire can be friend or foe, depending on the situation. Unfortunately, unfriendly situations arise all to often, costing lives and devastating property." Prevention is your best defense, but to minimize loss you must be prepared if fire starts:

*Test smoke detectors regularly. Change batteries within the recommended interval or when you see or hear a "low battery" signal from the detector. If you have yet to equip your home with these proven lifesavers, do so soon.

*Post phone numbers of the fire department, emergency medical service and others who could help during an emergency. Teach youngsters how to call for help in case of fire or other emergency.

*Prepare, then practice a home fire escape plan.

The Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District was formed on April 6, 1948, with the AMEND DT-American National protection and enhancement of the Petroleum Company et al to Pruden- available renewable natural resources tial-Bache Energy Growth Fund L.P. as its primary purpose. Its boundaries coincide with the boundaries of SECURITY NOTICE-American Wheeler County. It is governed by a National Petroleum Company et al to board of five elected directors who are resident land owners in the District RDT-Federal Deposit Insurance and are actively engaged in farming or

The current Board of Directors consists of Clarence Zybach, (who has been on the board since its creation), Paul Macina, Jim Batton, Darville Atherton, and John Vermillion.

The District entered into a memo of understanding with the Soil Conservation Service in 1948 to provide personnel specially trained in the field of erosion control. The current SCS consists of Fred Allison, Jr. District Conservationist; Ben Westmoreland, Conservation Technician; Calvin Devereaux, Soil Conservationist; Kenneth Reed, Mryon Merz and Martin Bailey, Range Conservationists. Harold Nash is employed as the District Clerk.


The SWCD works closely with the SCS to promote all phases of conservation. Your SWCD is proud to present this report of some of the work and accomplishments during the 1988 fiscal year.

Wheeler County SWCD has been very busy during 1988. Most of the business was the result of a new government program - The Conservation Reserve Program (CRP). Under this ten year program, highly erodible cropland is converted to grassland with government assistance. The land user receives annual rental payments for not farming land in the CRP program. Seven sign-up periods have been held to date. Wheeler County has 303 active contracts on approximately 50,000 acres. Wheeler County is eligible for about 54,000 acres.

The Food and Security Act of 1985 mandated that every farmer who produces crops on highly erodible soils must have a Conservation Plan by January 1, 1990. These plans must be fully applied by January 1, 1995. Wheeler County has approximately 550 farms that must be under a Conservation Plan by January 1, 1990. There have been 268 plans prepared thus far. If you desire federal funds in 1990, do not wait until December 1989 to get an approved conservation plan.

In addition to these new programs, The Great Plains Program, Resource Conservation and Development Program, and the regular District Programs must be carried out. We currently have two RC&D contracts and four active Great Plains Contracts. Fencing, Livestock Water Development and Grass Seeding are being done under GPCP.

Some of the accomplishments of the SWCD/SCS for 1988 include: New District Cooperators - 65 for 26,689 Acres; Conservation plans prepared -296 on 68,963 Acres; Individuals and Units of Government assisted - 794: Individuals applying a practice - 408: Grass Seeding - 8,000 Acres; Deferred Grazing - 54,000; Cropland benefited from applying a practice - 49,571 Acres; Range and Pastureland Benefited from applying a practice - 1443 Acres; Ponds - 1 No.; Diversions -4,000 feet; Fences - 11,000 feet; Conservation Presentations and Tours - 5 No. These are only a few of the conservation accomplishments done

DISPATCH SERVICE CONTRACT This agreement this day made and entered into by and between the City of Shamrock, Texas, acting by and through its Mayor and City Council, hereinafter referred to as City, and the County of Wheeler, Texas, acting by and through its County Judge and Commissioner's Court, hereinafter referred to as County, WITNESSETH:

SECTION I That for and in consideration of the mutual convenants and promises herein contained, City will operate and furnish 24-hour dispatch service system from the County as outlined in Section V.

SECTION II

In compliance with State Law and the regulations of the Department of Public Safety of the State of Texas, the management control of the teletype system shall be vested in the Chief of Police of the City of Shamrock. Operation and supervision of the

The dispatch system shall be separated on the account of the City as an individual department of the City, and personnel of the Dispatch System shall be employees of the City. **SECTION IV**

maintenance and upkeep of such equipment, suitable for the operation

presently operating.

SECTION V It is further agreed and understood that the County shall receive dispatch service for all County officers. Department of Public Safety Officers, Texas Parks and Wildlife Officers, Wheeler County Ambulance Service, Shamrock Fire Department and all other County and State officers operating within Wheeler County, Texas.

SECTION VI The County shall pay unto the City fifty percent (50%) of all personnel services along with fifty percent (50%) of telephone and teletype expenses, such combined expense not to exceed \$39,269.00 (Personnel payment-\$34.979.00; Communications-\$4,290.00), without prior approval of the County, as billed by the City with such billings to be submitted on a

monthly basis as nearly as possible to the first day of each month.

SECTION VII

The County shall provide housing for the dispatch system and shall be responsible for all utility billing with the exception of telephone service. All long distance calls shall be logged by the persons placing such call and both parties hereto shall be responsible for payment of all such long distance calls logged by the representatives of such parties. Each party hereto shall be responsible for fifty percent (50%) of the "Base" telephone and teletype charges and unidentified long distance calls. The City shall be responsible for insuring the communications equipment of the dispatch system.

SECTION VIII This contractual agreement shall be for a period of one year beginning October 1, 1988, and ending September 30, 1989. At or before the end of such period the Parties hereto shall meet together for the purpose of re-negotiating a similar contract for the ensuing year. This contract may be teminated by either of the parties with such termination to be effective not less than thirty (30) days from date of such written notice.
