

Secretary of State Mark W. White, Jr. announced that all presently commissioned Notaries Public desiring re-appointment for the new term which begins June 1m 1973 and ends June 1, 1975 must pay the required fee and file a new oath and bond with the County Clark between May 1, 1973 and May

15, 1973, inclusive. Secretary of State White further stated that any person not now a Notary Public who desires appointment for the beginning of the new term on June 1, 1973, should apply to the County Clerk before May 14, 1973. The required application forms may be obtained from the

County Clerk. Mr. White emphasized that Noraties Public should not send requests for appointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State inasmuch as the law specifically requires that the County Clerk approve Notary Bonds and forward copies of the application to the Secretary of State



ed on lovegrass sod in early October gained 118 pounds of beef to the acre. The project was completed on anybody around that had been May I when the lovegrass had made sufficient growth. The best gain month was March when the average daily gain was 122 pounds. The value of the gain was around 560 to the acre. Since the overseeding and fertilization cost \$22 an acre, the added value of the gain was close to \$27 an acre. We had sought to get around 200 pounds of beef before the lovegrass started, but due to the cold weather, we only got half-way. If we can record 250-300 pounds of beef to the acre during the summer, we can probably come close to producing 400 pounds of beef to the acre from lovegrass.




