Do Not Chase **Fire Trucks**

You are in violation of the law when you follow a fire truck. The citizens of Wheeler have a bad habit of following the trucks each time they are called to a fire. It is fortunate that no tragedies have resulted

from this practice. Fire Chief Earl Barnes warned Wednesday, that citizens are subject to a traffic ticket if caught in the act of following the fire vehicles.

It is natural for people to be curious as to where and how bad the fire is when the siren is sounded. However, the firemen are the ones called to help, not the individual; the firemen are trained and know how to handle the situation. SIGHTSEERS ARE ONLY IN THE WAY.

When the siren sounds, give the firemen time to arrive at the station and leave, before going to the station. The siren sounds 11 blasts and by that time, the firemen have reached the station and left with the needed equipment.

The destination of the trucks is written on the blackboard just inside the station. After the siren has quit blowing persons are free to check at the station for information concerning the fire.

There have been many cases where citizens raced to the station ahead of the firemen and hendered the men in carrying out their tasks and leaving with the trucks.

In buying sheers, readyto-wear or fabric, note the care instructions. The manufacturer may recommend special care instructions. When in doubt about how to care for a clothing article it's best to either have the item dry-cleaned or to hand launder it. When laundering by hand, don't use chlorine bleach or wring

or twist the garment. In sewing with sheers, consider the undergarment you'll be wearing the sheer and decide if it should have an underlining, lining or both. Seams and darts will show through when the sheer is used alone. An underlining of a soft, but opaque fabric, or an underlining of self-fabric will usually conceal seams and dart edges.

You will be imaginative

with sheers. For example, a bodice may be underlined, the sleeves left sheer, and the skirt lined with an underskirt that's seamed and hemmed separ-

Collars and cuffs are appropriate for crisp sheers, but the seam allowances must be trimmed to hairline width. 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

Our man won! For the first time in the history of the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District, we had a state winner in the State Conservation Awards Banquet. He's Darville Atherton from Wheeler. Darville and his wife, Sammy, will be attending the Conservation Awards Banquet in Ft. Worth on May 13th. This is quite an honor for Darville and Wheeler County. We have a lot of conservation work going on in our county and the folks down state will be hearing about it when we show up to get our award. Darville was nominated by his conservation district for the Comeback Farmer Award.

A RUINOUS PEST Has been found in alfalfa fields in our county. We have found larvae of the Alfalfa Weevil east of Shamrock and at Mobeetie. The weevil attacks the first crop of alfalfa. The larvae feed within the plant tips, on opening upper leaves and then on the lower foliage, sketonizing the leaves.

An alfalfa field damaged by the weevil appears greenish-gray at first. Damagdd leaves dry rapidly and the field takes on a grayish to whitish cast at first. In addition to destroying the first crop, larvae may crawl to the nece shoots of the second crop and continue feeding, retarding new plant growth and reducing the second crop. We suggest you consider spraying if 75% of the leaves are skeltonized. Cut the alfalfa a little earlier and let the sun help kill the remaining larvae. The pest shouldn't be a big problem after the first cutting, but it looks like he's going to be a big problem at this time of year from now on.

Manage that lawn! Lawn

Across the Fence management chores such as fertilization, mowing and watering are again beginning to occupy considerable

spare time of homeowners. With temperatures beginning to climb and a shortage of soil moisture in many areas, maintenance of the home lawn can be a perplexing job.

Following certain basic maintenance practices, an attractive lawn can be maintained with a minimum of problems.

First, adequate amounts of plant food are important to keep a lawn green and to maintain growth and health of the grass. Start by applying a complete fertilizer in the spring as the grass begins to grow. Then follow with another appli-1.69 lb cation in the fall about a 1.38 lb month before the first frost.

During the summer, an 1.63 lb application of nitrogen every 1.19 lb 30 to 40 days will keep the 1.29 lb lawn green and growing. Well-fertilized grass is able to withstand dry weather considerably better than grass that is hungry.

Nitrogen is a key fertilizer element in turf production. If deficient, plant growth will become stunted and a condition often called "firing" will develop. Lack of phosphorous will retard growth, and shortage of potassium will likewise inhibit plant growth and vigor. There must be a balance of these nutrients.

As rainfall becomes inadequate, waterings must be increased to supply needed moisture. Do not water the grass until it begins to show a need. Then soak the soil to a depth of eight or more inches to maintain a good turf root system. Frequent shallow waterings should be avoided.

In regard to mowing, guard against scalping

the lawn if it is not moved often. Removing a lot of growth at one time is detri mental to the grass. Close mowing is advisable if the homeowner can mow often THE WHEE

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Close, frequent mowing will cause the grass ti pro duce a lot of leaves very low to the ground. This pro duces an attractive and de sod. Since most home. owners do not mow more often than once every week to ten days, they should mow at some greater heigh to avoid scalping the gross too severely.

At PCA Community Room held in Wheeler, April 8, Congressman Bob Price discussed the current state of programs and legislation of interest to farmers and ranchers as well as his efforts to promote a more effective partnership between the Federal governmentand rural America.

Recent actions designed to bolster farm income with which Price expressed agreement include:

Allowing farmers a new option under the 1972 feed grain program which will mean larger payments to them for set aside of feed grain acreage. "Under the new option," Price said, "grain producers after setting aside the 25 per cent of their feed grain base to qualify them will be able to earn an increased payment of 76 cents per bushel on grain sorghum on an additional 10 per cent set aside of their base.

Permitting winter wheat producers to revise their Federal Crop insurance Corp. coverage to exclude land they put into additional set aside, as well as the decision to reconfirm the unrestricted planting of upland cotton for the 1972 crop year.

Authorizing the extension of support loans on 1971 crops of wheat and grain sorghum stored on the farm and in commercial warehouses and on 1970crop wheat in warehouse

A vigorous defense of farmers and ranchers by Secretary of Agriculture Earl Butz from attacks blaming them for higher food prices. "The simple fact is that in the last twenty years, farmers' prices for food products at the farm gate have gone up 6 per cent; while consumers' food prices at the store have

gone up 43 per cent," Price commented. Turning to another related theme, Congressman Price also stressed the importance of Rural Development. (Sec. Butz recently gave testimony before the House Agriculture Committee on which I serve," Price said, "and I was pleased to hear his comments on rural development legislation endorsing the provisions of several bills have introduced and worked hard for in the past to revitalize rural America, including my proposals to increase the size of farm operating loans from \$35,000 to \$50,000 and to convert farm operating loans from an appropriated funding to an insured loan basis. Duning the 91st Congress, I was the author of the law which raised farm ownership loans from \$60,000 to \$100,000.


