We were out in the Mobeetie area last Wednesday looking at crop damage by hail and high winds. L.C. Powell hadhis maize crop beat in the ground and Dale Dyson's cotton was damaged heavily. Surprisingly enough, a few hundred yards up the road, Fat Horne's cotton and Dean Tipps milo was in

good shape. We believe Mr. Powell's milo will be O.K. and will not need replanting. However, Dale Dyson reported that he planned to plant mile on his damaged cotton acres.

Where Treflan was applied as a preplant for cotton, we wouldn't recommend replant ing milo because there'll be dama ae.

I suppose that everytime anything is put into print. the risk is run that it may be misunderstood. This may have been the case week be fore last when we mentioned in 'Across the Fence' that a self propelled hay loader and stacker could cut the cost of picking up and stack . ing hay from 10¢ a bale to a little less than two cents.

What me meant to say was that several cents cost per bale could be saved by mechanizing the picking and stack. ing operation. By the way, Doane's Agricultural Report's 1967, Machinery Custom Rates Table mentions that 10¢ a bale to haul hay to the barn to be stored is a fair price quote. More than likely there will be increases instead of decreases in any custom charges that involve selling


