

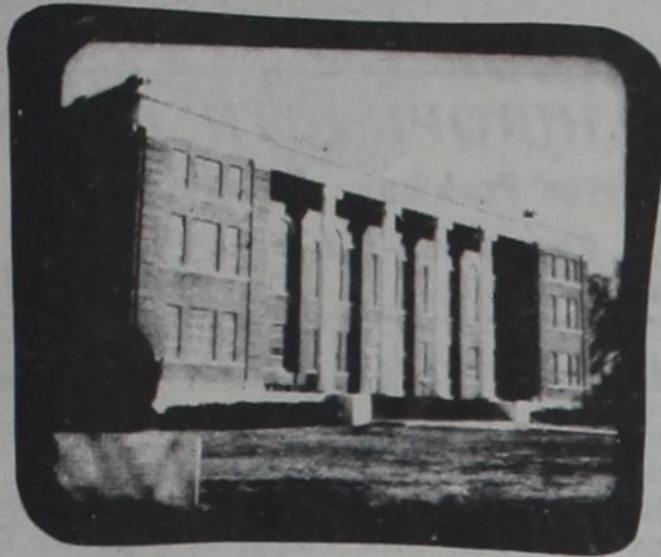

SEASON OPENER SCORE: 48-6

Overcoming first game mistakes and maybe a slight case of the jitters, the Wheeler Mustangs came alive in the second quarter and proceeded to rout the Clarendon Broncos 48-6 last Friday night.

Wheeler outplayed the Broncos decisively and gave the head coach, Ronnie Karcher, his first win as the Mustangs head mentor.

It was evident after the first series they had the ball that the Mustangs meant to keep their winning tradition rolling along.

Moving from wingback to running back was just what the doctor ordered for Shane Goad as the 170 lb. tailback tore his way for 214 yards and three touchdowns on the night.

Using the running game nearly exclusively because of the wet con-

ditions enabled the Mustangs to gain 307 yards via the ground and the hard hitting Mustangs defenders held the Broncos to a paltry 54 yards rushing.

Going to the air only six times, the Mustangs completed a couple but they were big ones as junior quarterback Shawn Bradstreet passed to Guest for a 16 yard scoring toss on a screen and hit Tommy Velasquez on a 17 yarder for 6 points with 25 seconds to play in the first half.

Bradstreet had another pass slip through the receiver's hands that had six written all over it.

The Mustangs put the game away with 20 points in the second quarter for a 27-0 halftime lead and increased their margin to 41-0 before the Broncos tallied their lone TD on an 85 yard pass and run with 4:37 remaining in the game.

Even though they had the better team and better coaching, it was still a real big win for Wheeler and gives them a lot of momentum for their tough schedule ahead.

Clarendon missed a 32 yard field goal on their first possession and that was it offensively for the Broncos in the first half.

Using their potent running game, the Mustangs rode the runs of Guest to move 80 yards in 10 plays and Guest hit the end zone from 2 yards out at 1:13 of the first quarter.

Sammy Zepeda booted his first of 6 extra points and the Mustangs were on their way.

Michael Kenney bolted 24 yards for the Mustangs fourth running TD of the game with four minutes to play in the opener for both clubs.

Early in the third quarter, Clarendon was passing from inside their 10 and Kyle Sword ran back on interception 22 yards to paydirt.

Fresh from their 48-6 pasting of the Clarendon Broncos, the Wheeler Mustangs will be going after their second win against a District 2-AA foe when the Shamrock Irish visit Nicholson Field Friday night.

The gridiron hasn't been too kind to the Irish the past few years but no matter what, the Irish always play the Mustangs tough.

"We expect the Irish to come gunning for us Friday night and there is no one on their schedule they would rather whip than Wheeler," Coach Ronnie Karcher said this week.

While the Mustangs were beating Clarendon, the Irish were falling to the powerful Spearman Lynz, 48-0, in the Irish' home opener.

Friday night's "county champion-

ship" will be played on Nicholson Field as the home town fans welcome back the defending Class A State Champions.

Shamrock is really in a rebuilding stage as new head coach Ed Johnson has only 2 offensive and 2 defensive starters back from a club that was 1-9 in 1987.

Spearman held the Irish to only two first downs and a total of just 39 yards total offense. The Lynz used long runs to amass 241 yards on the ground as they completely dominated both lines of scrimmage.

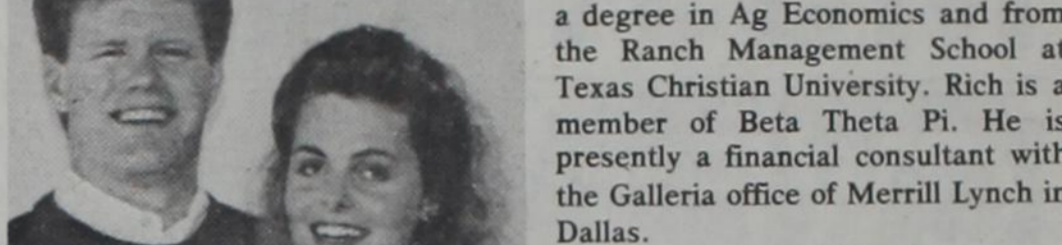

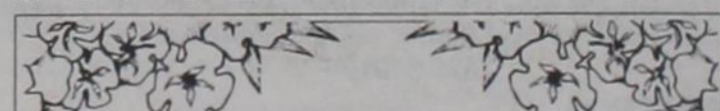

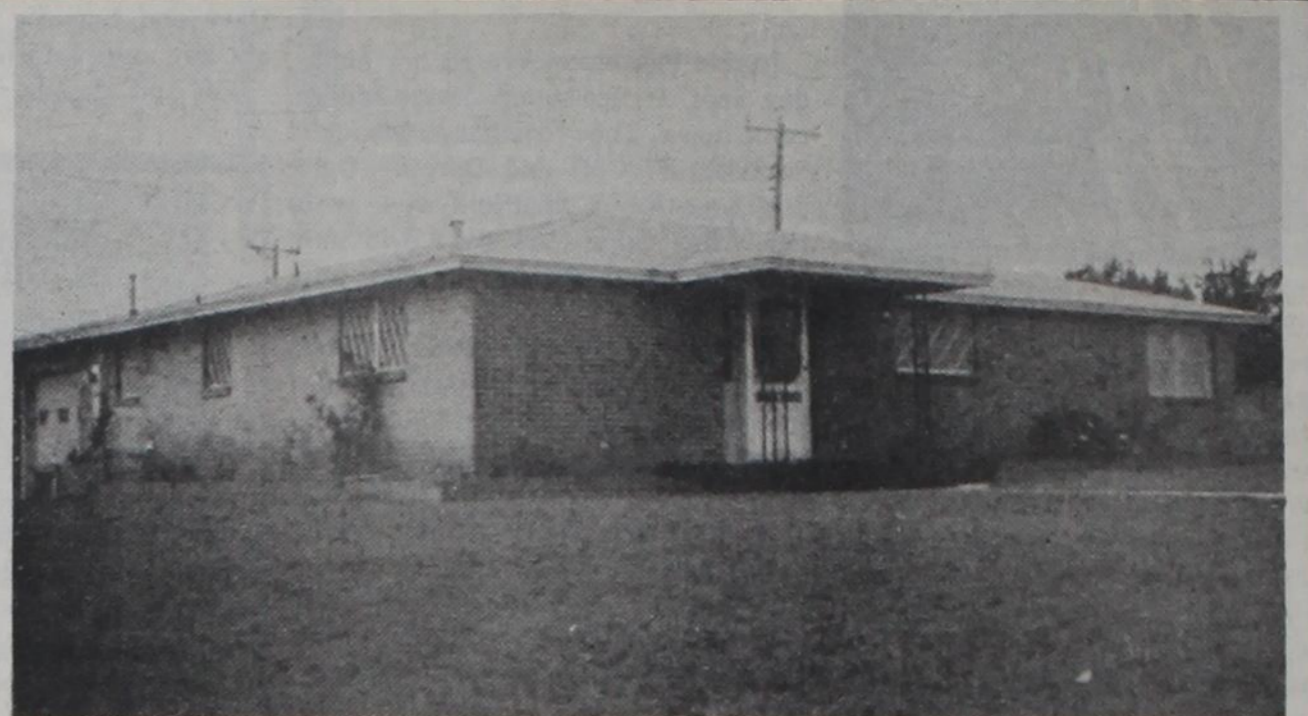

Those people who advocate this attitude use one of this nation's greatest freedoms—the freedom of speech—to openly promote their anti-god lifestyle, yet, when someone, like Miss Guidry advocates a godly lifestyle, these people are offended, saying that their rights have been violated. But what about Miss Guidry's rights?

The freedom of speech is a precious freedom. Yet it is abused when people use it to deny the freedom of speech of other people. The Bible warns about such an abuse in Christianity when it says: "Act as free men, and do not use your freedom as a covering for evil..." (1 Peter 2:16)

If freedom, particularly the freedom of speech, means anything, it means that the "good guys" must listen to the "bad guys"; however, it also means that the "bad guys" must listen to the "good guys".

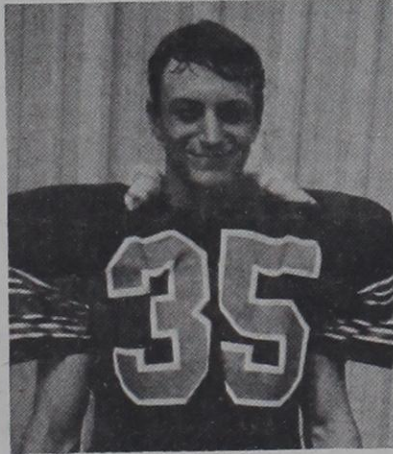

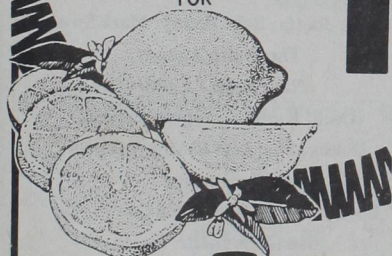
