Attention Cattlemen BRUCELLOSIS MEETING SET

Cattle producers in Wheeler County are urged to attend a meeting in Wheeler on September 4 regarding upcoming new regulations on brucellosis testing.

The meeting will be in the County Courthouse and will begin at 8 p.m., announces County Extension Agent Max Hatter.

A veterinarian with the Texas Animal Health Commissioner will be on hand to inform producers of pending changes in the present brucellosis regulations. Comments and feedback are being invited from producers and a state wide hearing on the new regulations will be held in Austin on September 18.

The new brucellosis testing program is expected to begin October 1 and is designed to eliminate the cattle disease from Texas, thus allowing the state to be declared Certified Brucellosis Free.

For all cattle producers

to benefit from the new testing program, it is important that they become familiar with the new regulations. Thus the upcoming meeting on September 4 will provide an opportunity for producers to learn about the new plans for brucellosis testing.

WHEELER SCHOOL ENROLMENT REACHES 333 '73-'74 HOLIDAYS LISTED

Wheeler School students are in their second week and looking forward to their first vacation of the year. The students will be out of school Monday, Sept. 3 for Labor Day.

Enrolment this year stands at 333 which is a loss of seven students from last year. Counting the 16 Kindergarten students, there are 212 students in the elementary grades. The high school has 121 students this year.

The largest class is the Seventh grade with 36. The Seniors are second in size

with 32. The Sophomores and Freshman each have 31 members in their class. There are 27 Juniors.

The size of the elementary grades is as follows: Kindergarten, 16; First, 17; Second, 25; Third, 21; Fourth, 28; Fifth, 17; Sixth, 27 and Eighth, 25.

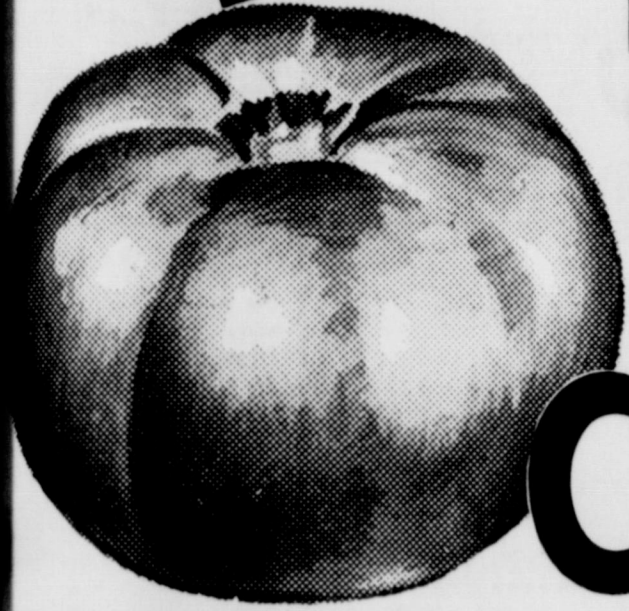

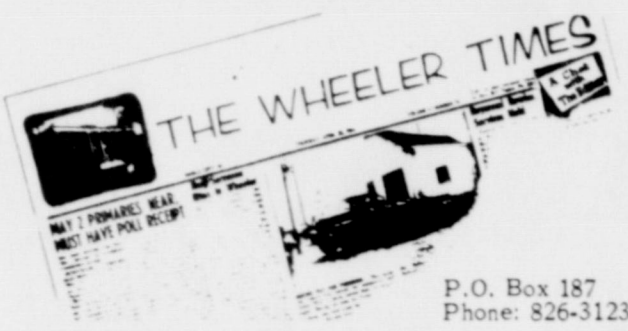

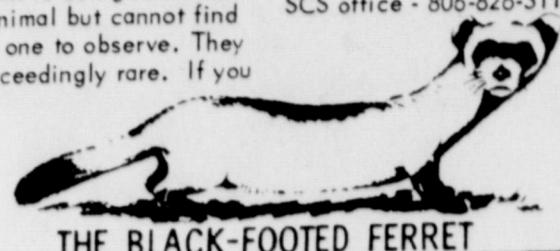

Farm Pond Safety Advice

Ponds, like any body of water, attract people. When the two come together, there always is chance of a drowning or boating accident.
"Ponds are an asset to the environment and have many uses," Bill Brooks, District Conservationist for the U. S. Soil Conservation Service in Wheeler stated. "During the past 30 years, Texas landowners have built more than 350,000 ponds as part of their soil and water conservation plans. Some 150 have been built in this area."
"Families and friends are attracted to ponds because they are nice places to picnic, swim, boat or fish," Brooks said. "But the small boy passing by who is attracted by the water may do almost anything. This is why keeping ponds safe is so important."
Here are some pond safety suggestions listed by Brooks:
Before construction, find out about your liability. You may need to protect yourself with insurance and have your pond built by a reliable contractor who will follow engineering specifications.
During construction, remove trees, brush and anything else that might hinder safe boating or swimming. Eliminate sudden drops and deep holes in the swimming area.
Once a pond is complete, mark the safe swimming area and put warning signs at danger points. Tell swimmers not to swim alone, and post safety instructions for swimming and boating. Use buoys that will float if swamped, capsized, and worn swimming and boating gear. Stay out of ponds during storms and when spillways are flowing. Above all, recognize that farm ponds are hazards to small children.
"Your farm or ranch pond can be a source of enjoyment as well as profit, BUT ONLY IF IT IS SAFE," Brooks concluded.

CHATS WITH GLORIA

A few more weeks the weather will change, but your refrigerator should still be running most of the time. Here are some hints to help you run your refrigerator efficiently and keep your energy costs at a minimum.

—Much moisture in your refrigerator can cost money. Free and automatic defrosting models have a harder time of it than the manual defrosting models. The manual defrosting model should not be built up more than one-fourth inch on the condensing unit, as it prevents general circulation of cold air. Defrosting models are easier to defrost. The manual defrosting model should be defrosted every two weeks. The automatic defrosting model should be defrosted every six months.
