Colonel Wilson E.Speir, director of the Texas Depart ment of Public Safety touay warned that 42 persons may lose their lives in Texas traffic during the long Labor

Day weekend. The holiday officially begins at 6 P.M. Friday, Aug. 31 and runs through midnight Monday, September 3. Speir said the DPS is mak-

ing preparations to cope with increased holiday travel. "Every available Department of Public Safety partolman will be on duty during this three day weekend, utilizing all resources we can put our hands on to prevent acfidents,"

he added. The DPS director noted that special attention will be paid to hazardous traffic violations normally associated with a high holiday death toll. Partolmen will be especially watchful for such offenses as speeding, driving while drink ing, improper passing and driving on the

wrong side of the road. In addition to stepped-up enforcement activities, the DPS will also work with local law enforcement agencies and the news media of Texas to conduct an accident prevention program called "Operation Mortor-

cide." During "Operation Motorcide" tabulations and pertinent facts about all fatal holiday traffic crashes will be compiled three times daily and teleased to the news media. Notation will be made as to where and why accidents are happening.

Speir called the holiday program "a life and death struggle for the lives of our citizens," and he urged every motorist to cooperate in the effort.



Five hundred cows on a section of land is a drezm of a lot of cattlemen here. Vi sited with a man a few days ago who is working kn that dream. Wayne Stark who got hold of one of my lovegrass bulletins about a year ago, has got a pretty fair stand of lovegrass on 1,000 acres. His two sections are out at Pakan. He is most enthusiastic about Wheeler County and the potential hero. Wayne seeded some old shinnery oak infested sand hills out there this spring. In spite of high sinds and lack of moisture, he got a good stand. We don't see alot of folks leaving irrigated land out around Her ford to come here, but in all likelihood, you'll see a lot more in the years ahead.

out at Lela. Got an idea the other day for tractor drivers. you save may be your own. For a long time, I've wanted to see .400 pounds of beef produced on an acre of dryland weeping lovegrass. We pulled it off a few days ago. We got 1.8 p ounds average daily gain from a group of heifers on lovegrass. As you may recall, we started outgrazzing Elton rye on lovegrass sod on January 29, 1973. With a 120 pounds t othe acre headstart, before the lovegrass came out, the going was easy until July 3 When the grass ceased growing in the drought.

After a 3" rain later on in July, we got going again with some heifers. Because of the dry weather, we only carri dd 1.2 head to the acre after July 3 but had 2 head to the acre most of the time. Herman Seymour, the county agent at Sayre, Oklahoma says a man in his county grew 100 pounds of Morpa lovegrass seed to the acre and sold them \$4. per pound.
