Fireplaces are a cource of pleasure year round, but at Christmas they seem to have a special glow. A different glow can come from colored flames.

To have beautifully colored flames in your fireplace there are a number of chemicals which may be used. First, select bits of wood, bark, driftwood, pine cones, sweetgum balls or similar material. Then secure appropriate chemicals from a local hardware store or a man ufacturing chemist.

Coloered flames can be produced by chemicals such as red with strontium nitrate or chloride, green with Borax, blue with copper sulphate, orange with calcium chloride, and yellow with common table salt. Caution should be taken


