



Reverend Ross Dunn has been named chairman of the Breath of Life Camaign to fight children's lung diseases according to Frank Scott, president of the North Texas Chaoter, National Cystic Fibrosis Research Foundation. Rev. Dunn of Wheeler. Texas, will lead Wheeler volunteers in raising funds to support research and care programs for children affected by lung-damaging diseases like cystic fibrosis, severe asthma, chronic bronchitis, bronchiectasis, and a condition called "child hood enphysema". Cystic fibrosis, an incurable genetic disease, is inherited when both par. ents carry the recessive gen e for C/F. It is believed that one in twenty persons or 10 million Americans may carry the C/F genen, usually without knowing it. Curre nt research funded by the National Cystic Fibrosis Research Foundation is seek ing a practical test to identify these carriers.

Because of improved therepy and constant research many C/F patients are living beyond infancy to their teens and into young adulthood. That same kind of therapy is relieving and often curing children suffering from other respiratory afflictions whose symptoms resemble those of C/F.

"Most people don't realize that there are six million children in the U.S. affected by pulmonary illness," said Rev. Dunn. "For some of these children, breathing is not the natural function we, who are lucky, take for granted."

The Breath of Life Campaign supports not only research but over 100 C/F Centers for diagnosis a nd treatment across the country.

Wheeler County **Rural Accidents**

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated six accidents on rural highways in Wheeler County during the month of May, according to Sergeant J. L. Dalrymple, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and three person injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first fi ve months of 1973 shows a total of 64 accidents resulting in one person killed and 30 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Oubbock Department of Public Safety Region for May, 1973 shows a total of 550 accidents resulting in 21 persons killed and 318 to May, 1972 with 517 accidents resulting in 25 persons killed and 329 persons injured. This was 33 more accidents, 4 less fatalities, and 11 less injured in 1973 at the same period of time. The 21 traffic deaths for

the month of May, 1973 occurred in the Following counties: Gray 5; Lubbock 4; Bailey and Hartley, 2 each Castro, Knox, Montague, Palo Pinto, Randall, Swisher Wise and Young, one each.
