Robert Brickey and Joey Stone are serving aboard the USS Jonas Ingram and recenty wrote this account of a rescue mission in which they and their fellow crewmen part ocean were so mulated icipated: "Last week we received an S.O.S. from an Indian Ship which was taking water, fast and sink ing. By the time we got there it was too late, the ship had already sunk, taking thirtyfive men to their deaths. We spent two days without sleep picking people out of the water and taking

care of them. But, for twenty of them we were just too late. It is sad that people should die, but when a sailor dies, it's different. Aguess you would just have tobe to sea to feel it; because when a sailor's ship sinks, the odds of living is a lmost zero. He is at the mercy of the elements and God Bless him if he can't swim. If

New seedings of Weeping Lovegrass are now hurting for moisture. Some seedings seed ed in May have sprouted and are trying to grow while other seeded after June 1, have not sprouted. In time of inadequate moisture such as this it takes much longer to get a good stand of grass. In evaluating pastures that were seededthis year do not become easily discooraged. If the stand is sparse, many more seed may sprout following the next rain. Remember that each of the very small seedlings when mature cover a very large area. There pound. 


