

county, many of these were youngstands seeded late last year or older stands which were heavily graved or hayed You have probably heard


the statement that Lovegrass will take lots of grazing abuse. Itwill take more than most of our native grasses but like any living plant it can take only a certain amount of use.

When the leaves of a plant are clipped of by a cow or an implement it takes some of the reserves from the root system to replace this leaf growth. When this leaf is mature it will restore the reserve to
