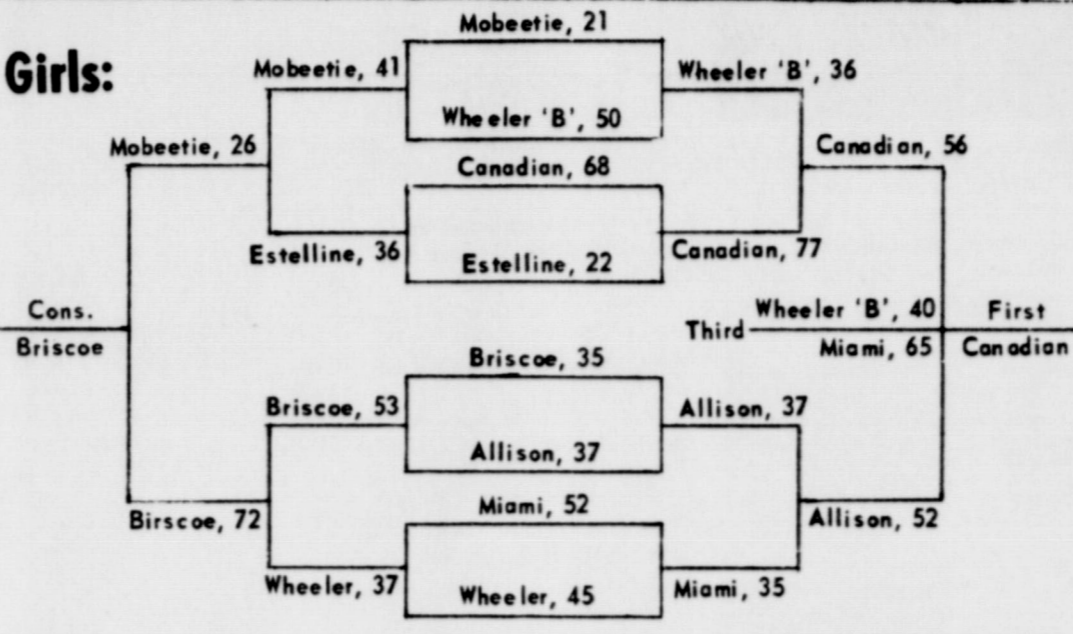

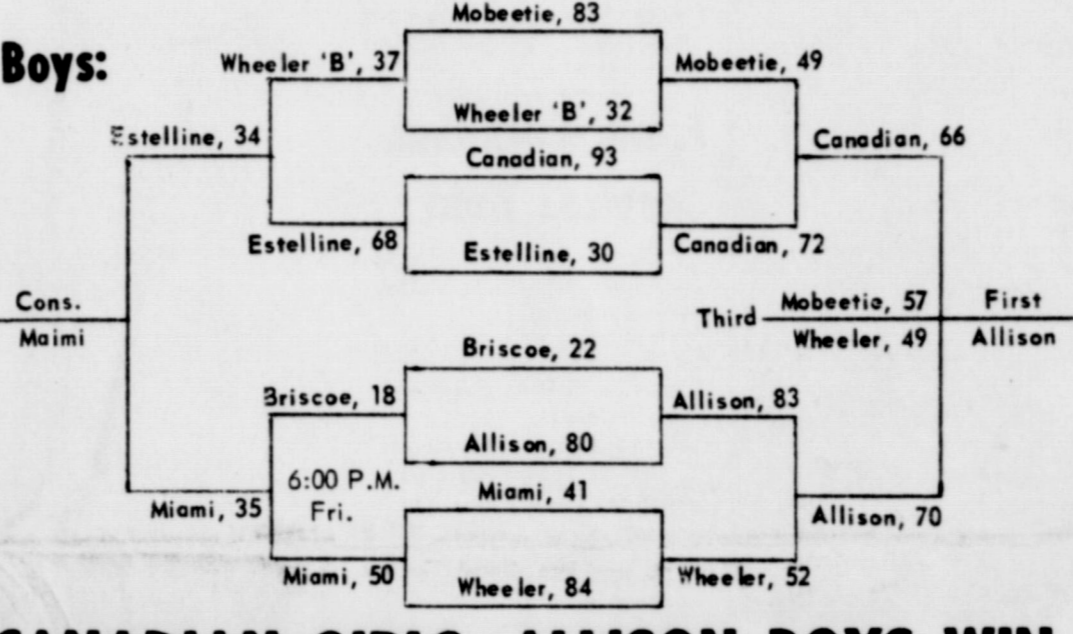

A packed house in the Wheeler gym last Saturday night saw the finals of the annual Wheeler Tournament and basketball fans of the area were treated to some fine basketball as the girls and boys teams of Allison and Canadian vied for top honors in the three day tourney.

When the excitement had died down, the Canadian girls and the Allison boys had taken the coveted first place trophies back to their respective schools.

Devonna Adcock led the Canadian girls in their 56-52 win by scoring 22 points and she was matched in the scoring column by Vickie Reynolds of Allison who also netted 22 points in a losing cause.

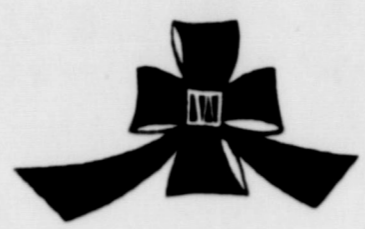
Scale Inspector In Wheeler Area

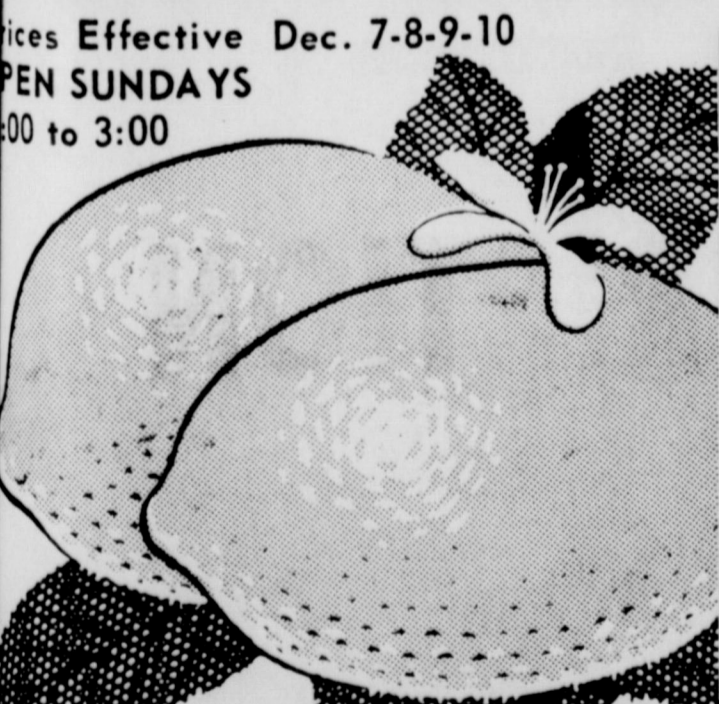

KING'S KOMMENTS

Time spent now in winterizing and servicing irrigation equipment may save trouble and expensive repairs next season.

Don King, county agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service winter season.

Cover the discharge pipe of turbine pumps to keep rodents out of the pump column. Store portable irrigation pumps with your other machinery.

Remove and inspect sprinklers and risers. Use a drill bit of appropriate size to check sprinkler nozzles for wear and replace those which show wear of 1/16 inch or more.

If rubber gaskets or seals on a portable pipe can be easily removed, take them out and inspect them for wear, cracks and other signs of damage.

Cover all openings in electric motors with rodent screens and seal conduits and circuit boxes. However, don't cover an electric motor with material that cuts off circulation and causes moisture condensation.

To service engines, King suggests following directions in the owner's manual or using these general procedures. Change the motor oil and filter and run the engine to recirculate fresh oil.

Store batteries in a dry place after making sure they are fully charged. Shut off and drain all fuel lines and drain the carburetor.

Now is also a good time to order new pipe, couplers, gaskets and nozzles so they will be available next spring.

Top O' Texas Cow Belles

The Top O' Texas CowBelles is an organization of women who are protesting against beef boycotts. They resent the blame for the high cost of beef being placed on the ranchers and feed lot operators by some of the consumers.

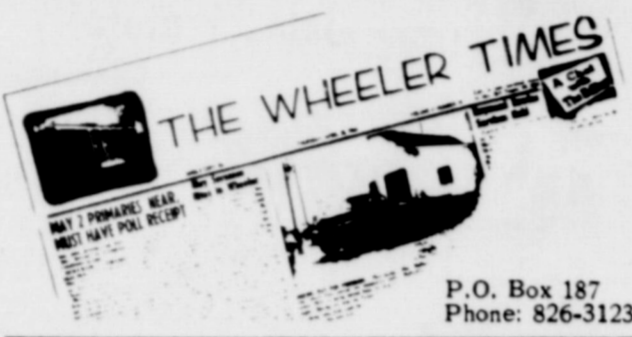

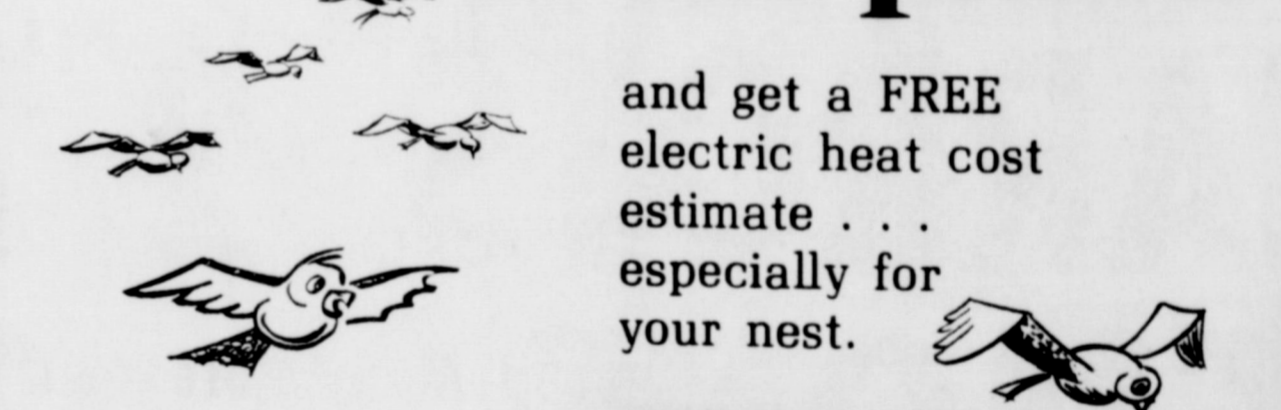

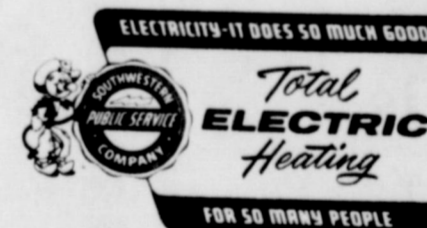

Did you know that clothing care labels attached to garments have a purpose? They inform the consumer of the item's proper care and maintenance for maximum wear.

Believe the label even if reasons behind its recommendations aren't obvious rather than risk ruining the garment. Care directions are based on fabric finish, fiber blend and construction. Unless followed precisely, the garment may never look the same again. In general, if labeled "wash", the garment can be dry-cleaned. However, sometimes these "wash" labels also state specific warnings such as "machine wash only" and "do not dry clean". If a label reads "machine wash line dry," avoid using even a low temperature dryer on the item. It could shrink or become permanently wrinkled. In addition, crisp fabric can become limp if dried the wrong way. Following clothing care labels insures a better looking, longer-wearing wardrobe.

Pumpkin Bread
 3 1/2 cups flour
 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
 2 teaspoons soda
 1 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1 teaspoon cinnamon
 1/2 teaspoon cloves
 1 teaspoon allspice
 2/3 cup chopped nuts
 2/3 cup raisins
 2 2/3 cups sugar
 2/3 cup salad oil
 4 eggs
 2 cups pumpkin
 2/3 cup water

Combine flour, baking powder, soda, salt, cinnamon and allspice. Mix nuts and raisins and combine with 2 or 3 tablespoons of the dry ingredients. In large mixer bowl combine sugar, salad oil, eggs, pumpkin and water. Mix dry ingredients; add nuts and raisins. Pour batter into two well oiled loaf pans. Bake about one hour in an electric oven that has been preheated to 350F.
