



### In Wheeler Area **Delayed Retirement** Credit Given Inspector for District 1, with

Many social security beneficiaries recently received increases in their checks because of a new provision in scales. There is a \$10.00 the social security law known as delayed retirement credit. This credit adds to a worker's check one percent for each year or 1/12th of one contact Joe Don King, Copercent for each month betunty Extension agent, by ween age 65 and 72 that the December 12. Phone No. worker delayed his retirement 826-5243 No credit is given for delaying retirement beyond age 72, as he wants and still draw his social security beginning at age 72. Also, no credit is given for years before 1971 that the worker earned too much money to draw social security.

In order to qualify for the increase a worker must not have received any social security checks before age 65. This delayed retirement credit may actually encourage a person to work longer rather than take early retirement.

The delayed retirement credit will be automatically figured each year. Only the worker receives the delayed retirement bonus. Dependents or survivors drawing on the worker's record do not share in the increase.

> clined racks well above the ground to provide drainiage, air circulation and resistance to wind damage. Pipe left in the field during freezing weather should be completely drained after use and secured from wind damage. Place tractor-tow lines and other mechanically moved sprinkler lines near the edge of the field or in an out-ofthe-way place and secure them to prevent wind damage.

lers and risers. Use a drill bit of appropriate size to check sprinkler nozzles for wear and replace those which show wear of 1/16 inch or more. Separate sprinklers with broken springs and worn bearings and nozzles so they can be repaired before next season. Store sprinklers and risers in boxes or bins.

Remove and inspect sprink-

If rubber gaskets or seals on portable pipe can be easily removed, take them out and inspect them for wear, cracks and other signs of damage. Note the number and size needed for replacements. Store usable gaskets in a dry bin protected from rats, petroleum products and sunlight. Never hang gaskeets on nails or wires because they will lose their shape. Cover all openings in elec-

tric motors with rodent screens and seal conduits and circuit boxes. However, don't cover an electric motor with material that cuts off and Publisher circulation and causes moisture condensation.

> To service engines, King suggests following directions in the owner's manual or using these general procedures.

> Change the motor oil and filter and run the engine to recirculate fresh oil. Use ethylene glycol base permanent-type anti-freeze, or drain the cooling system and the engine block. Pour about two tablespoons of ene oil in each spark plug opening to prevent rust of upper cylinders. Turn the engine over a few times to spread the oil and then replace the spark plugs. Cover the exhaust pipe and crankcase breather to pre-

vent moisture entry. Store batteries in a dry place after making sure they are fully charged. Shut off and drain all fuel lines and drain the carburetor. On LP gas engines, drain the vaporizer-regulator fuel and water lines.

Now is also a good time to order new pipe. couplers, gaskets and nozzles so they will be available next spring, King adds.



Care directions are based on fabric finish, fiber blend and construction. Unless followed precisely, the garment may never look the same again. In general, if labeled "wash", the garment can be dry-cleaned. However, sometimes these "wash" labels also state specific warnings such as "machine wash only" and "do not dry clean". If a label reads "machine wash line dry," avoid using even a low temperature dryer on the item. It could shirnk or become permanently wrinkled In addition, crisp fabric can become limp if dried the wrong way. Following clothing care labels insures a better looking, longer-wearing wardrobe.


