Mercy Flight To Galveston

Morgan Locker, of the Muleshoe Flying Service, stood by all day Thursday, waiting for the weather to break so that he might perform a mercy flight to Galveston.

Unfortunately ice and snow and bad weather reports held up his departure until 8:30 Friday morning.

Cotton Hike For County

According to Bernis Camp, local Manager of the U. S. Agricultural and Stabilization Office, Bailey County's cotton allotment will show an increase this year of 416.7 acres.

The allotment for last year was 95676.3 acres which has been increased this year to 96093.9 acres. Although this increase amounts to a little less than one-half of 1 per cent, it is estimated that, with favorable weather conditions, the 11-77 cotton farmers in the county should be able to produce an additional 575 bales, based on the average figure for the past five years.

New Teacher For Junior Hi

Mr. J. E. Bachman is a new teacher of the sixth grade class in Muleshoe Junior High. His hometown is Spur, Texas, in Dickens County where he graduated from high school. Upon graduation he attended Texas Technological University and West Texas State University. He has taught school for fifteen years in Crosbyton and Spur, Texas. He taught one year in the fourth grade and four years in the fifth. "Slowly but Surely he is advancing, for he now teaches the sixth grade." His wife is Jean Collom Bachman. She is the home economics teacher in high school. Mr. Bachman's hobbies are raising bees, photography, hunting and fishing.

Dirt work has begun and sewer lines are being laid at the Mary DeShazo, Junior High and High School buildings here; the starting of an \$853,888.00 expansion and improvement program.

At present, the old Vocational Agriculture barn is in the process of being torn down by the Future Farmers of America boys, who are salvaging the materials to be used at their stock pens.

The total contract bid is divided among the five new installations as follows: Mary DeShazo, \$342,400.00, for the construction of a 24 unit classroom building to replace the old building which will be torn down entirely, with the exception of the present gym and cafeteria.

Junior High will be getting eight classrooms at a cost of \$111,280 and a gymnasium at a cost of \$189,300.00.

For facilities at the High School, a new Vocational Building will be constructed at \$79,155.00 and the new cafeteria will cost \$131,745.00.

Facility Added For Handicapped

The inter-agency agreement between the Board for State Hospitals and Special Schools and the Texas Education Agency, Vocational Rehabilitation Division, has been expanded to include a residential facility located on the campus of the Denton State School.

This facility was established to provide comprehensive evaluation services, personal-social adjustment training, and vocational training to mentally retarded males between the ages of 16 and 27, whose I. Q.'s range between 50 and 75 and who have potential for employment, but owing to the lack of evaluation and training, or low socio-economic environment, or poor personal-social adjustment have failed to make satisfactory adjustment in the community.

Referrals to this program must be made through the local Vocational Rehabilitation Counselor, O. E. Lumsden, at Muleshoe High School. Anyone having a person in mind who might benefit from this program, may discuss the referral with him. Lumsden will fill out all necessary application papers for admission.

No person with a history of delinquency can be accepted into this program. Only ambulatory persons can be accepted according to Lumsden.

Police Activity 28 Arrests Last Month

Twenty-eight arrests were filed in Corporation Court for the month of November, 1964. Of these 21 were for traffic violations, 2 for intoxication, 3 for being involved in an affray, and 2 for vagrancy. Elizabeth Watson Is School's First Curriculum Head

A well-known and popular schools as Curriculum Director, teacher in Muleshoe schools. She is Mrs. Elizabeth Watson since 1941 is heading a new who attended grade school in phase of work in our public Hale County, completed Junior

High and High School in Plainview before entering Wayland College. She received her B. A. degree from Texas Technological College and M. Ed from the same College in 1932. She is presently doing work above the Master's Degree.

The daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Bailey, Olton, Mrs. Watson came to Muleshoe in 1941 and since that time has become noted by parents and pupils alike for her work toward furthering the education of those who are slower to learn than some, by spending long hours after class to help them with all of their school work, voluntarily. Her experience in teaching includes Elementary, Junior High and High School.

Mrs. Watson is a member of: National Education Association (NEA) Texas State Teachers Association (TSTA), Past President of Muleshoe Unit, Past President of the Muleshoe Classroom Teachers Association Member of Delta Kappa Gamma and Past President of Epsilon Delta Chapter, Member of AAUW and Kappa Kappa Iota. She is a member of the First Baptist Church.

In the role of Curriculum Director, many titles could be given and well suited - supervisor, coordinator, director of instruction, consultant, resource person, etc. Whatever the title, the process is the same. A process which leads to the improvement of teaching and learning.

The curriculum is now generally considered to be all these experiences that learners have under all the direction of the school. Curriculum improvement refers not only to improving the structure of the curriculum but also to stimulating growth, learning, and changing

of values on the part of all the persons who are concerned with the curriculum.

The curriculum involves what happens in classrooms, auditoriums, gymnasiums, hallways, cafeterias, school activities - anywhere the children are under the guidance of the schools. It includes informal experiences as well as formal ones. It is as big, broad, and all-inclusive as the lives of people in any major American institution.

Her major tasks are:
 1. To aid the teacher and the principal in understanding children. Children grow at different rates; some mature more quickly, some more slowly. Their readiness for learning develops as an individual process. For example, a child's readiness for learning to read may

develop during his first year in school; or it may not develop until he is in the second grade. A few are not ready to read until the third grade; yet all may be normal children.

In like manner to differences in physical growth and development, the interests of children change during childhood; they also change markedly from earlier childhood to adolescence, and still further in post-adolescence.

2. To help the teacher to develop and improve individually and as a co-operating member of the staff. Strange as it may seem, the individual cannot succeed in being accepted as an equal by the group until he has developed a surety in his own knowledge or a sincerity in his ways of doing that draws respect from other members of the group.

3. To assist school personnel in making more interesting and effective use of materials of instruction.

The Curriculum Director becomes almost a source of information or technician at times. Here is an area in which the supervisor can be of maximum help to the beginning teacher. All teachers need specialized assistance in the wise choice of teaching materials and audio-visual aids for a particular purpose or block of work.

4. To help the teacher to improve his methods of teaching. Every good teacher grows by improving his ways of teaching. It should also be said that every good teacher develops his own system of teaching techniques; he may adapt to his own teaching some good ideas from another teacher, but he does not adopt it per se.

5. In this gradual improvement of teaching methods, the wise supervisor can help the teacher to see more readily interrelationships between subject matter areas, and to prepare in advance resource materials or units, and to identify more successful and less successful methods that he employs.

6. To make the specialized personnel in the school system of maximum assistance to the teacher - the music teacher, art teacher, the librarian, testing counselor, etc., special education teacher, speech therapist, school nurse, etc.

7. To assist the teacher in making the best possible appraisal of the student.

A student once said: "Many good teachers would be master teachers if they could learn how to grade the student's work."

There is much truth in this remark. The making of tests to fit the purpose of the learning is all important. How do you grade intangibles as attitudes, conduct, and cooperation.

Concepts of evaluation are undergoing big changes designed to measure a pupil's growth in terms of his achievement from the point at which he started, rather than in terms of a comparison of his performance and marks of others in his class.

8. To stimulate the teacher to

evaluate his own planning, work, and progress.

The ambitious teacher will turn to the supervisor for aid in self evaluation. Together they will check to strong points and weakpoints.

9. To help the teacher achieve poise and a sense of security in his work and in the community. A sense of security in one's position is perhaps more conducive to success than any other one factor. Different communities expect different kinds

of participation of teachers in community activities.

10. To stimulate faculty groups to plan curriculum improvements and carry them out cooperatively, and to assume a major responsibility in coordinating this work and in improving teacher education in service.

11. To acquaint the school administration, the teachers, the students and the public with the work and progress of the school.

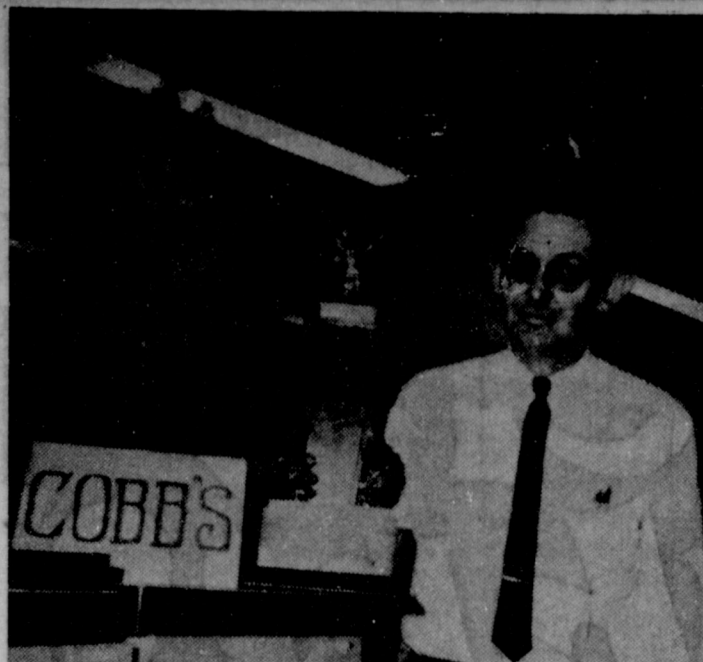

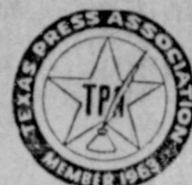

3 for failing to stop at a light or stop sign, and 4 for various other causes. Eleven accidents were recorded, with fortunately no injuries, but a total estimated property damage of \$2,985.00.

During the month there were 2 cases of breaking and entering, and 1 of theft. These

cases are still under investigation. There was one case of carrying a prohibited weapon, to which the defendant pleaded guilty and was fined a total of \$125.85.

A total of \$367.00 was collected in fines, \$267 being for traffic violations, and the remainder jail fines.

Appropriateness, 20 points — Does the entry portray or relate to the meaning of a story, legend, or custom of Christmas, either religious or secular? If lighting itself is the decoration, rather than only the means of lighting the scene, if the combination of colors of use of lighting suggestive of Christmas?

Function, 15 points — Are all of the entry's parts working? (If any of the lights are out, part of the effect is lost.) If the decoration has mechanical parts, are they working? If figures are used, are they all standing up straight and in order?

Originality, 10 points — Does the material or combination of material used in the entry show

originality? Is it a new idea or fresh approach to an old idea?

Unity, 5 points — Does the entry carry out one story, theme or idea. Is the lighting in keeping with the theme.
