MUSTANGS SHUTOUT 30-0 BY CANADIAN

Blocked Punt Sparks Big Third Quarter By Wildcats

The scrappy Wheeler Mustangs played jaw to jaw with the highly ranked Canadian Wildcats for two quarters last Friday night and trailed 6-0 at the half but saw the Wildcats use a blocked punt to propel them to a 30-0 whitewashing of Wheeler before a capacity crowd at Nicholson Field.

Canadian scored their first touchdown the second time they had the ball on a 41 yard drive in eight plays. Lonnie Hines got to paydirt on an eight yard scamper at the Mustang right side on fourth down. Hines pass for the two pointer was batted down by Lonnie Whitener of the Mustangs.

For the rest of the first half, the Wildcats spent most of the time on defense as the Mustangs threatened twice to tie or go ahead of the visitors.

Taking the kickoff after the initial Canadian touchdown, the Mustangs relentlessly pounded the Wildcat line using tailback Lewis Britt at the tackle holes to move to the Canad an 25. On third down at the 25, Don Champan, who was starting his first game as quarterback for the Mustangs, lofted a pass intended for J.C. Brooks in the end zone but Kem Carr stole it away for a touchdown.

David Wilson broke to the midfield strip on the first play after the theft but the Mustangs regained possession at the Canadian 46 two plays later when Carr fumbled a pitchout and Bill McIlhany curled around the pignskin for Wheeler.

Kent Ware and Britt pounded the interior of the Wildcats defense for yardage on every play to set up a first down at the Canadian 11 but things got rougher for the home crew from that point.

Three running plays netted four and the Mustangs elected to go for a field goal on fourth down. Jim Verden's kick sailed low after a bad placement and the Wildcats were successful in stopping a Mustang bid goalward.

When things turned sour for Wheeler in the big Canadian third quarter splurge, misfortune came in bunches.

Driving out to the 47 with the second half kickoff, the Mustangs were forced to punt. Ricky Wheeler, fine Canadian tight end, broke through the middle and went right between the three Wheeler up-back blockers on kicks and smashed Verden's kick to the ground and back toward the Mustang end zone. After

blocking the kick, Wheeler fell on the pignskin at the Mustang 13 and it took the fired up Wildcats just three plays to cover the idistance with Carr circling his right end from 5 yards out. Carr turned the other flank for two points and the Wildcats had a 14-0 lead.

After not drawing a penalty in the first half, the Mustangs got the flag twice on their next possession with the second being a 15 yarder for holding which wiped out a first down at midfield on a pass completion. From the 20, the Mustangs used a screen pass but Bob Dickinson read it and downed Britt 10 yards back of the line at the Wheeler 10 yard line.

The Mustangs booted the ball out to the 40 but were guilty of a face mask penalty on the tackle and the Wildcats set up shop at the Wheeler 25. Five plays later Canadian hit paydirt with Carr going inot the end zone from three yards out. Wilson tacked on the two points with a sweep and Wheeler trailed 22-0.

If things hadn't happened enough against the Mustangs there was more to come. Ware fumbled on first down after the kickoff and Ricky Wheeler recovered at the Mustang 22 to set the final Wildcat scoring drive in motion. On the final play of the third stanza and again on fourth down, the Wildcats shoved it across when Carr swept the Mustang right end from the 10 yard line. Wilson got the two points and the scoring was over.

Wheeler was able to put the ball into play on offense only seven plays in the final 12 minutes as the visitors used a drive from their 16 to the Wheeler 37 to eat up most of the time.

IRISH NEXT FOE FOR THE WINLESS MUSTANGS

The Wheeler Mustangs for the second week in a row must feel like David going against Goliath. After facing highly ranked Canadian last week, the Mustangs jump up a notch in classification and test the undefeated and district favorite Shamrock Irish at Shamrock Friday night.

The Irish were extended for the first time last week before gaining their third win of the season, 13-3 over the Wellington Skyrockets.

The winless though improving Mustangs, gave Canadian a real struggle before succumbing to the Wildcats and came out of the battle without any injuries of note and should be in good shape for the Shamrock encounter.

With a new coaching staff, the Irish will have an entirely new look on offense and defense than in past years but the same personnel is around that got the Irish to the second rung in their district in 1972.

Using the explosive Denver City T for their basic offense Shamrock puts the many talented Ronald Gragg at the man under spot and he is ably backed by speedsters, Sammie Jackson, who has been picked as AA player of the week twice this year, and Terry Beasley. Steve Galmor is the other member of the backfield for the Irish and he dealt the

Wheeler Post Office Has New Building

Employees of the Wheeler Post Office completed the process of moving their office Monday evening and opened the doors of the new Post Office to the Public Tuesday morning. The Post Office was moved from 121 West Texas St. to 509 South Canadian.

Postal Patrons not only have to get used to using

keys, many citizens have to learn a new box number. Of the 590 boxes in the new facility, it was necessary to change 148 box numbers. The old post office boxes were opened with combinations; the new boxes require the use of keys.

The Wheeler Post Office has been located at 121 W. Texas for the past 16 years. The building was leased from Wheeler Gas, Inc. There are no plans at the present for the use of the building vacated by the government office.

The new facility was built by High Plains Building Co of Amarillo at approximately \$60,000. The building contains 2040 square feet; it is a concrete block structure with a brick veneer exterior. The building was 6 months under construction. Dirt work began April 5. Postmaster Hiram Whitener stated: Each box holder was handed two keys to his box. "Additional keys will be made available for persons needing them. It will be necessary to obtain additional keys at the window of the Post Office."

Colts Are 34-6 Victims Of Irish; Go To Clarendon

The little Irish just had too much for the outnanned but game Wheeler Colts last Thursday at Shamrock and fell 34-6 in their season opener.

Ricky Mitchell broke free on a fake pass and run for 69 yards on the first play from scrimmage and Shamrock took a quick 8-0 lead before the fans had hardly settled in their seats.

On their second possession Shamrock covered 73 yards in seven plays with William Terry going over from 11 yards out.

Just 40 seconds remained in the half when Shamrock got their third TD with Albert Olmer skirting left end on a reverse from the 7 yard line. The run was no good for the two pointer and

the Colts trailed 20-0 at halftime.

Shamrock tacked on two more touchdowns in the third quarter for their final total before the Colts could get on the scoreboard.

Bobby Guthrie intercepted a Shamrock pass at midfield early in the fourth quarter and was finally brought down at the Little Irish 15 to set up the Colt touchdown.

The Colts could muster only a couple of first downs up to this point in the game and got their third when Dell Ford, found a gap at left

guard and rambled to the end zone from 14 yards out. Thursday will find the Colts traveling to Clarendon for their first district encounter with the kickoff

Rites Are Read For F. Arrington

Funeral services for French Arrington, who was born and raised and spent most of his life on the Arrington's Rocking Chair Ranch a few miles southwest of Canadian, were held Saturday afternoon in the First Presbyterian Church in Canadian.

Mr. Arrington was 78 years old.

He was the son of the late G.W. "Cap" Arrington, legendary lawman and pioneer rancher, an early-day Texas Ranger who was the first lawman at Old Mobeetie.

French Arrington was born at the ranch, operated it himself after his father's death and left it only a few months ago to move to a home in Canadian, turning the ranch management over to his son, George W. Arrington, Canadian oil man.

Mr. Arrington died at about 7 P.M. Thursday at Hemphill County Hospital in Canadian.

Funeral services were conducted by the Rev. Smiley Johnson pastor of the Presbyterian Church, and burial was in the Canadian Cemetery under the direction of Stickley Funeral Home.

Mr. Arrington is survived by his wife, Illie; one daughter, Mrs. Ann Johnson of Mesa, Arizona; two sons, George of Canadian and Bill of Pampa; six sisters, Mrs. Mae Grimes of Claude, Mrs. Sadie Teas of Canadian, Mrs. Empress Bowers of Snyder, Mrs. Inez Crenshaw of Daytona Beach, Florida, Mrs. Orlean Houghland of Perryton and Mrs. Caroline Long of Senoda, Arizona; nine grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

Here are some frank facts which should help you in shopping for and serving weiners.

The label is the consumer's guide in buying frankfurters - there are no secrets in hot dogs. Everything that goes into them is inspected and regulated according to federal standards. Shoppers should read labels on products packages and compare them.

For example, if the label states "all meat," the franks contain skeletal muscle tissue - the same as steaks, chops or roasts. If a product utilizes tripe, heart, lips, beef cheeks or other parts, they must be specifically listed on the label.

A label also must indicate if poultry meat is a constituent of frank. If so, it's limited by law to less than 15%.

Law also limits certain other ingredients.

For example, a certain amount of fat is needed for good flavor but the content is held to 30%. Taste tests at Iowa State Iowa University consistently show that franks containing less than 15% fat are ravedbarely edible.

Chemicals, including nitrates and nitrites, which are added to products have received much attention lately. Actually nitrates and nitrites are the oldest meat preservatives known - they've been used since cave-man days.

Sodium ascorbates or

sodium erythorbates are added to speed up the curing rate. These salts of ascorbic acid (vitamin C) sometimes are listed on the label.

In order to keep the meat in a tubular shape, a binder such as cereal or soy protein is included. However, this is limited to three percent.

Water also is added - in the form of ice - to keep the meat cool. This is also regulated, and most is lost during cooking and smoking.

This past summer our office had a mailout of material for home food preservations. At the end of the series we asked for an evaluation. One hundred women took part in this mailout series, but only 35 returned evaluations. Would you like to see what these 35 industrious women did in their "spare time" this summer. Together they froze 1,652 pints and 582 quarts, canned 598 pints and 754 quarts of fruits and vegetable, made 427 pints and 251 quarts of pickles, and 633 pints and 32 quarts of jelly.

These 100 women preserved nearly three thousand dollars worth of food for their families.

Where do you store all these canned foods? They should be stored in a clean, cool dark place. Canned food kept in a warm damp place may change in color and flavor.

How long should home canned food be stored? It is wise to use all of it within a year.

Freezing dies affect canned foods. Canned foods that have been frozen may have undesirable changes in flavor and texture. However, they will not spoil unless the seal is broken.

The other day I saw a homemaker who had used wax paper for shelf paper. This seems to be an inexpensive idea and it just wipe clean.

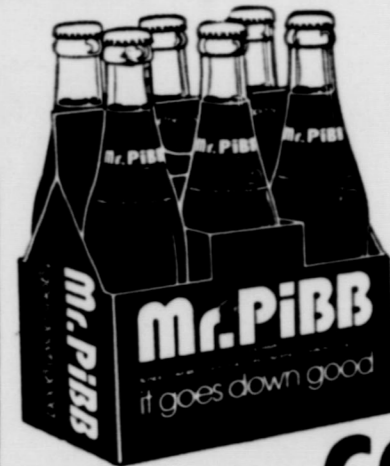

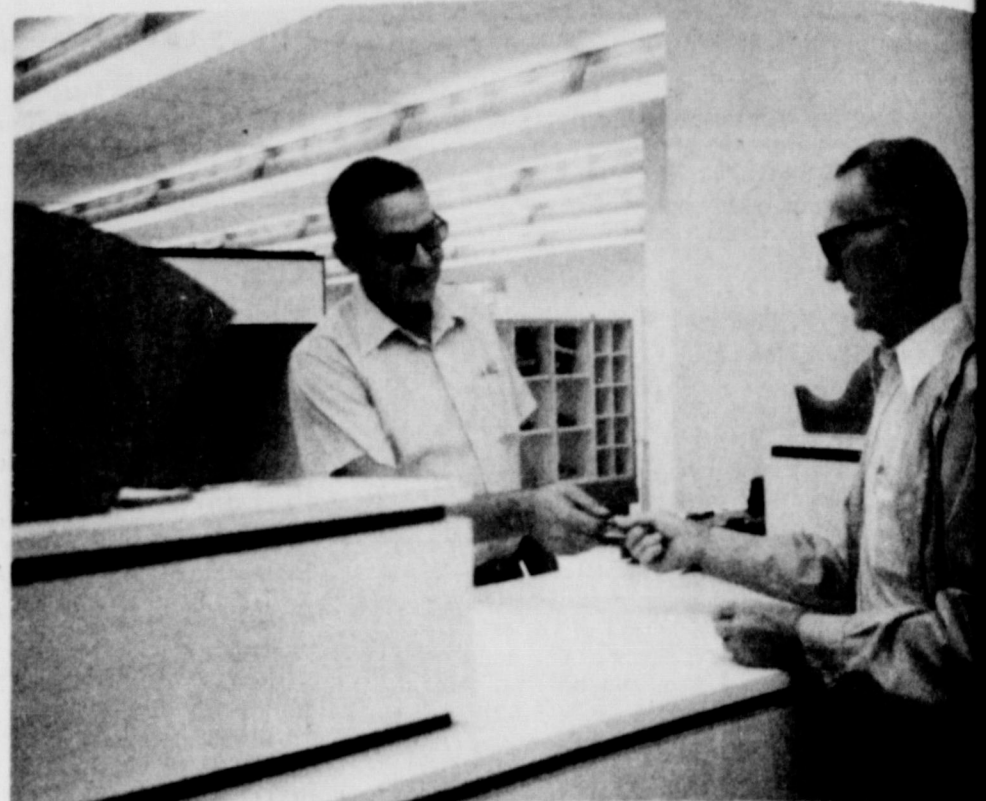

Wheeler School Is Participating In New Education Program

The Wheeler Schools are participating as a member of the Eastern Panhandle Cooperative for comprehensive education (EPCO). These programs will implement Plan A in Texas schools according to Mr. Thomas, Superintendent of Wheeler Schools. The philosophy of the new comprehensive program is that every child can learn in his own way at his own ability level if learnings are presented interestingly and intelligently by a skilled teacher. Some children have special needs. If the regular class cannot meet these needs for growth and adjustment, then a special

class is provided through this comprehensive program. Through this special program of new experience, each will meet with some success to provide encouragement and make life worthwhile. Until recently, many Texas students weren't getting the types of educational help that they needed the frustrated little boy who had trouble reading because of dyslexia - the emotionally disturbed youngster who just couldn't adapt to the classroom environment - the four-year-old girl who was physically handicapped. Most of these students have normal intelligence, but have a learning disability. Today steps are being taken to meet the needs of all these students and more, from ages 3 to 21. The mechanism is Plan A special education. What's Plan A? It's a comprehensive plan for special education which focuses on the educational needs of a child, instead of just his handicap. Today it's only being used in 187 Texas School districts, but by 1976 it will spread to all schools in the state. A main feature of the plan is the recognition that many special education

MENTAL HEALTH, MENTAL RETARDATION SERVICE

Regionalization of Mental Health Mental Retardation Services to the Texas Panhandle has been a goal of the Amarillo Mental Health Mental Retardation Board of Trustees since February 1966. On October 27, 1972, the Texas Board for Mental Health Mental Retardation revised policies and procedures for Community Centers which encourages local Boards of Trustees to develop regional programs to effectuate a network of service to all Texas citizens. The AMHR Regional Board of Trustees working with the Judges and Mayors of the Panhandle in cooperation with the Amarillo State Center for Human Development worked out the official regionalization plan. The 21-county area is grouped in as equal a population distribution as possible with consideration of local trade and travel patterns. There are six districts with two to four counties in each. District IV is made up of Wheeler, Gray and Roberts counties. Your district representatives are Mrs. Rodney Barker, Shamrock, Texas, N.L. Sechrist and Mr. T.A. Hennard, Jr., Wheeler, Texas. The objectives of this

Regional Plan are to identify the mental health and mental retardation needs of this area and develop in cooperation with the local citizenry the ways and means of providing solutions to these needs that have been identified. Your district representatives would appreciate hearing from any interested citizens as to their ideas on the needs of Wheeler County.

Hemphill County Receives Grant

Governor Dolph Briscoe today awarded a \$35,256 grant to Hemphill County to consolidate the county's police and sheriff's departments into a single agency. The money will come from the Criminal Justice Council which administers the state's block grant from the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration under the Crime Control Act of 1973. Under the project the Canadian Police Department will be abolished. By contract between Canadian and Hemphill County, the sheriff will assume all responsibility and perform all the duties of a city-ordnance enforcement in Canadian, in addition to his own responsibilities as sheriff. The move is calculated to reduce index crimes by pooling functions, procedures and equipment, as well as staff. The award was one of 34, totaling \$1,731,730, recommended for the governor's approval by the CJC Executive Committee at its August 14 meeting.

Retired Senior Volunteer Prog.

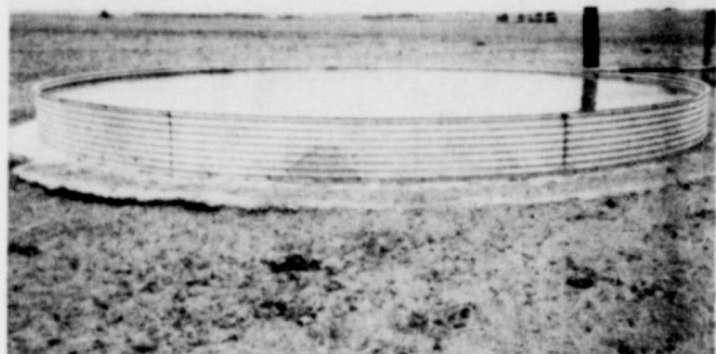

education teacher, who is assigned to several classrooms to help teachers with individual and group instruction for handicapped students. Other classifications are homebound and hospital teachers, who carry out the instructional program in the homes or hospitals of handicapped pupils; special education teachers who do their instruction in appropriate community facilities; teachers of a diagnostic class, who determine the nature of students' learning difficulties over a period of weeks; and teachers of a vocational adjustment class who supervise handicapped pupils spending part or all of a school day in on-the-job training. Supportive positions include special education supervisors, counselors, psychologists, associate school psychologists, educational diagnosticians, visiting teachers and teacher aides. All of these personnel work as a team in the special education program. Before a student can become involved in special education he or she is tested and evaluated by an Admission, Review, and Dismissal Committee at the school, which is composed of at least three persons. Once the student is a part of the program, a diagnostician or other specialist will determine the individual's educational needs, and write a prescription of ways that the special education instructor best can teach the student. This committee also will decide what type of a classroom situation would be most appropriate. For example, a severely handicapped child might need special equipment and learning help in a self-contained classroom for much of the day. But he could attend a regular classroom for just the music and art classes. Another popular method is the use of the resource room. A bright student might do well in all of his courses but math. But because of a learning disability, he

mentally reverses himself when doing problems. During the math period, he would go to the resource room to get help from a special education teacher in overcoming his problem. For the first time, this statewide program provides special education instruction for children ages three through five. Eligible children are those with physical disabilities, mental development, language and/or learning disabilities, or who are emotionally unstable.

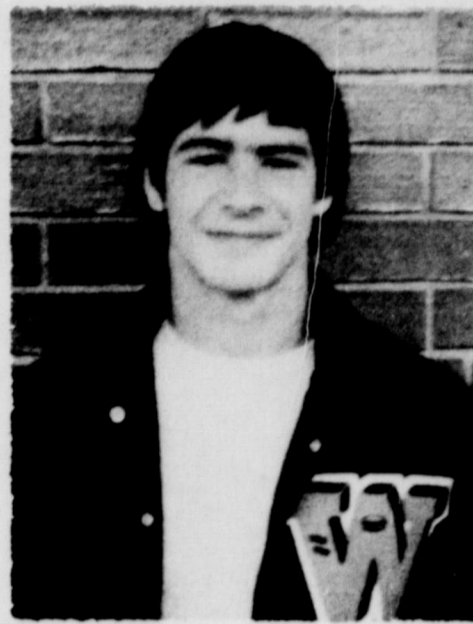


