Eckles, Weatherford Celebrate 83rd

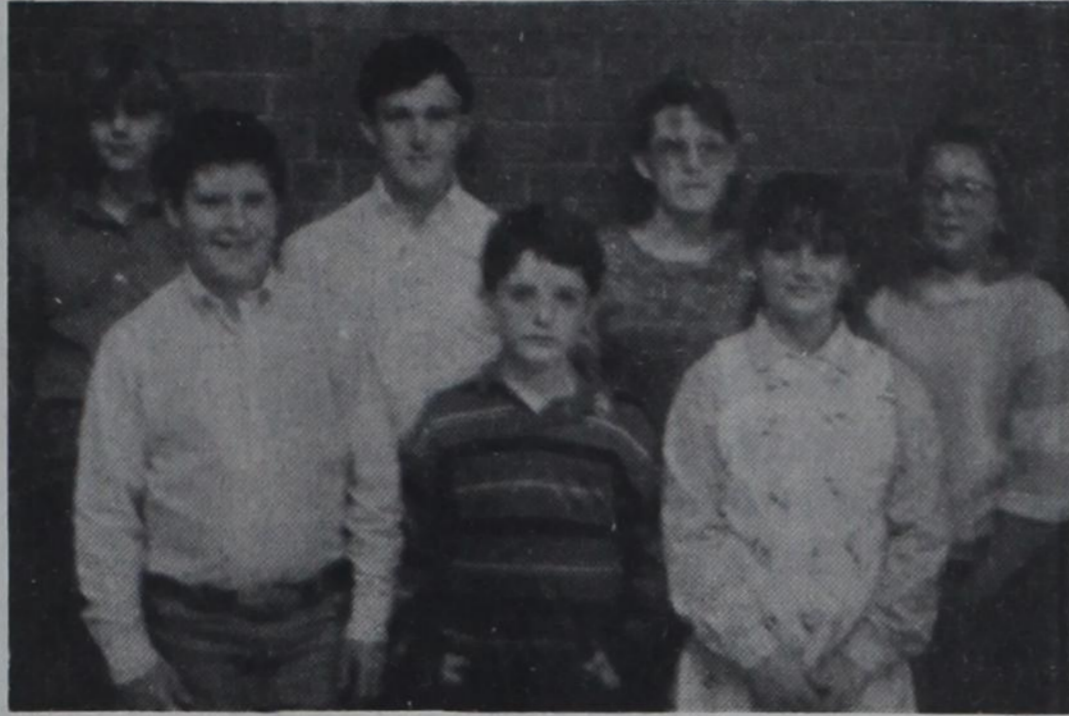

Co. Agent Informs Of Need For Tagging

All lambs and hogs that 4-H and FFA members plan to show in the 1989 Wheeler County Junior Livestock Show must be tagged on Saturday, December 3, 1988, according to County Extension Agent, Don King. The validation committee will be at the Wheeler County Show Barn from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon to supervise the tagging. Animals must be tagged at this time to be eligible to enter the county show. Steers that were tagged for state validation in June do not have to be brought in. The ownership deadline for steers was October 15, 1988.

A sheep shearer will be at the show barn on December 3rd, during the tagging, to shear lambs. Shearing at this time will make the lambs easier to wash and clip at show time.

Entries for the county livestock show are due in the county Extension office by Friday, December 16th. The Wheeler County Junior Livestock Show is scheduled for January 20-23, 1989. Lambs and hogs will be weighed in beginning at 6:00 p.m. Friday, January 20th. The market hog show will begin at 1:00 p.m. on Saturday, and will be followed by the market lamb show at 6:00 p.m. Steers will be shown at 5:00 p.m. on Monday, January 23rd. The auction sale for steers, lambs and hogs will begin at 7:00 p.m. Monday.

King also stated that youth must be enrolled in a 4-H club by December 1st to be eligible to exhibit a 4-H project in the stock show. Anyone who plans to show but has not enrolled in 4-H this fall, should contact their local 4-H leader or the county Extension office right away.

4-H is the youth development program of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and focuses on the needs, interests, and concerns of boys and girls between third grade and 19 years of age regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, religion, or national origin.

Seminar On Suicide, Drugs And Prevention For Parents Planned

Suicide is the third leading cause of death among teenagers. Only auto accidents and drug overdoses cause more teenage deaths. The abuse of alcohol and drugs is closely related to each of these killers. The use of a mind-altering chemical may cause a teenager to act on a suicidal impulse that otherwise might pass with time.

Mobeetie School To Participate In Bee

Mobeetie High School students will have the opportunity to participate in a unique social studies academic competition which could lead to a scholarship, prizes and a study trip to Washington, D.C. later this year. The school has registered for the Close Up Foundation Citizen Bee.

The Citizen Bee is an academic competition that focuses on social studies and progresses through school, regional, and state events. Finalists compete for the national title in Washington in June 1989. Three Mobeetie students will advance to regional competitions with top students there going to the state finals this year.

ACTIONS OF 2-7 FA SOLDIER, WIFE SAVE SENTINEL BOY'S LIFE

A Fort Drum soldier and his wife were driving down Interstate 81 on their way home after a relaxing four-day hunting trip. The hunting had not been particularly eventful, but the time away had been enjoyable. All of a sudden, they noticed a woman at the side of the road waving her arms over her head trying to flag down passing motorists.

Car after car passed by, even though the woman's actions and disposition indicated that there was an emergency.

"I couldn't believe people would drive by without stopping to help," said SP4 Jody R. Robertson. "It was obvious she needed help."

When Robertson approached the woman, Deborah Ware, to see what the problem was, he could see her son David in the car.

"The boy looked a color I had never seen before," Robertson added. "He looked a bluish-purple; I thought he was dead."

Robertson took the child out of the car and placed him on the ground. He bent over the child, listened and watched to see if he was breathing at all. When he realized the child was not breathing, he tilted the child's head back to help clear the air passage.

"When I tilted the boy's head back, I heard a strange sound," Robertson continued. "It reminded me of the sucking sound of a vacuum cleaner."

Robertson then cleared the air-way with a thrust to the boy's stomach with the palm of his hand, a technique he had recently learned in a three-day combat life-saving course taught at Fort Drum.

Assigned to A Battery, 2nd Battalion, 7th Field Artillery, Robertson was awarded the Army Commendation Medal at the battalion headquarters by Maj. Gen. Peter J. Boylan, commander of the 10th Mountain Division, in a ceremony held recently for his actions in saving the boy's life Oct. 17.

Mrs. Ware is the wife of Capt.

David Ware II, commander of Headquarters and Headquarters Company, U.S. Army Garrison, Fort Drum.

Their 8-year-old son David apparently suffered a seizure and had stopped breathing, according to his father.

In today's society, people are afraid or reluctant to stop to help out another person, Robertson said. He feels strongly that people should be willing to lend a hand.

"I think that if a person sees something like this happening, they should render assistance," he said.

Robertson didn't act alone. His wife, Michelle, summoned an ambulance, which quickly arrived and transported David to the Upstate Medical Center in Syracuse for further

treatment. He was released from the hospital Oct. 19.

When Robertson saw the boy, he knew had to act quickly. He used a technique he had recently learned at the Combat Lifesaving Course, taught here by CWO 2 Frank Radke of the 2-7.

"The Combat Lifesaving Course is a 40-hour course that is prepared by the Fort Eustis Institute of Professional Development," according to Radke. "The course is taught to non-medical personnel by the unit physician's assistant and medical staff. It is designed to teach the soldiers advanced first aid and life-saving techniques they will need to know on the battlefield. Graduates of this course are able to assist medical personnel during combat or mass-casualty situations."

Robertson's actions reflect his professionalism as a soldier, but more importantly his care and concern for others. His true reward did not come in the form of kind words or awards.

"The little boy couldn't speak, but he reached up and gave me a big hug and squeeze around the neck, and that was enough," remarked Robertson. "Young David is doing well now, and that is enough for us."

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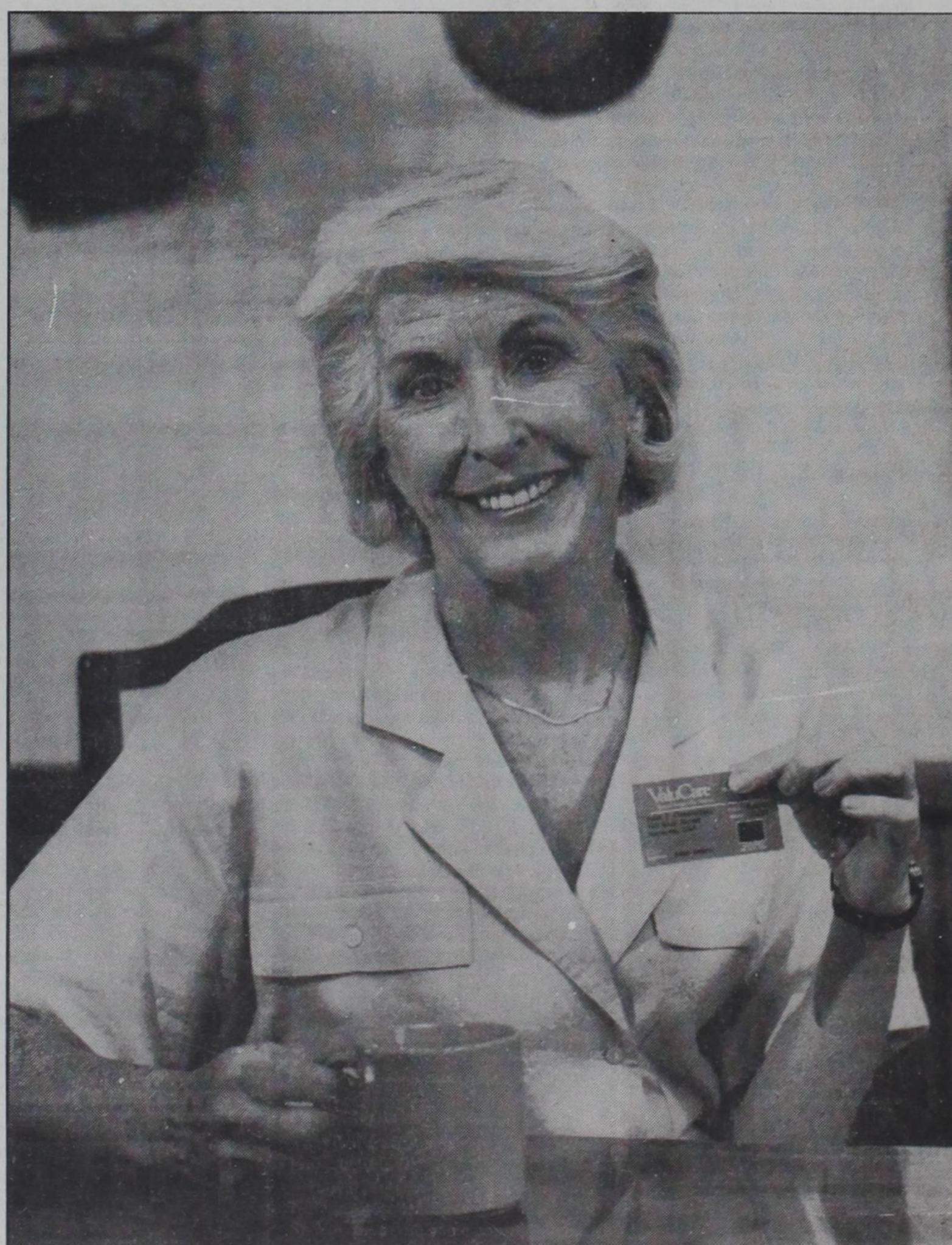

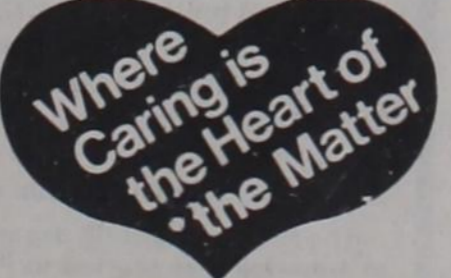

ABOUT OUR SCHOOLS

"YOUR JIMMY IS NOT JOHNNY... AND MARY IS NOT JANE"

Most children spend a great deal of time comparing themselves with their peers to decide how they "measure up". They worry about their height, their weight, their complexions, their athletic prowess, their mentality, etc. Children want to be accepted, to fit in. They listen closely to the opinions others have of them, and most important, they are concerned about what their parents think of them.

Parents need to be extremely cautious about comparing their children with other people's children. It is so easy for parents to say to their child, "Johnny always makes the Honor Roll", or "Tom always scores the most goals in soccer," or "Jane has such a lovely singing voice," or "Judy will make the cheerleading squad because she is so agile."

Children are in a precarious

position. They are not fully mature, have not grown to their full height, have not all lost their baby fat, and have not reached their highest mental capacities at any time during their growing years. We must remember that each individual grows and develops at a different rate, and it is unfair to penalize a child for not being as perfect as we might like at any particular time.

The adults who affect children the most—parents, teachers, and school administrators—carry a heavy responsibility. It is everyone's role to encourage and help children to believe that each of them has strengths and weaknesses. No one is perfect. Comparing children with one another does not encourage them. It discourages them.

Children need the wisdom of their elders. They need to be nurtured by them. Parents, especially, can en-

courage their children by instilling in each of them the belief that his or her special talents are unique and worthwhile in the parent's eye. Parents should communicate that while it is very nice that other children do well at some things, their own children, too, do very well at some things.

When we compare children with their peers, we teach them envy. When we rave about the abilities of other people's children, we teach our own children anger. And when we tell them to be more like some other child, we teach them frustration.

Most children want very much to please their parent. Being an advocate for your child means being satisfied with who he or she is. Teach your child to be patient. The physical growth will come. The mental abilities and physical coordination will develop as he or she grows. If a child has a special hobby or interest, help him or her to develop it as such as possible. But remember that comparing your child with others is futile. It does nothing positive. Enhancing a child's self-image by emphasizing and admiring those traits that make the child truly unique is positive enrichment. Your child wants to "live up" to your expectations. You will do much for your child if you make those expectations reasonable or reachable.
