SEARCH WARRANT ISSUED: A search warrant was issued Monday morning for the residence of 810 Osage Street, Gary Jackson, 23, was arrested following a search of the premises. Confiscated at this address were bags of marijuana, pipes, marijuana seeds, and other items from a local civil defense truck. Jackson was charged with a felony, possession of more than 4 ozs. of a controlled substance, he is being held in Wheeler County Jail in lieu of \$3,000 bond. Police Chief Keith Miller was assisted in the search and arrest by Sheriff Larry Anderson and Doyle Ramsey Deputy Sheriff. Chief Miller commended the men who were in and Justice of the Peace Charley Whitley for his assistance in the search warrant. Approximately \$330 worth of marijuana was taken off the market as a result of two arrests, each package would have sold for \$10 and could have produced about 10 cigarettes.

death of Harry Wofford I recall many pleasurable memories of growing up in Wheeler. I feel sure the people today are missing a lot by not having up in Wheeler 40 pages. If I listed all of who contributed to my life in Wheeler with pleasant memories I would fill this page. Paris Holt and I rode to San Antonio with Harry and Orth Beal. They were on their way to New York. We were going to "The Fair of Progress", the "Fair of 1933" in Chicago. We stopped off in St. Louis to see the Cardinals beat the Cubs. Dean struck out and I set a strike out. Ducky Medwick, Martin Leo Dorocher, a whole gashouse gang-great that day. Harry and I got a photograph from Leo. I went two weeks in Chicago, rode a ferry to Milwaukee and visited the Midaleberg Inn, and then to Flint Michigan to see a new 1933 Chevrolet. Most as it came off the assembly line for Clara Woodward. Clara paid for expenses I left her with \$50 and got

home with \$1 left. For a couple of kids just out of Wheeler High, 17 years old, to take a trip such as this would not have been possible if it had not been for these good people and parents who trusted us. Wheeler was filled with comedians. Rufus Foust spent the whole morning digging a ditch. During his lunch break, his good friends Bob Rogers and Ed Tillman, threw in his shovel and covered up the ditch. Rufus retaliated by filling the old drinking water bucket in the blacksmith shop full of .22 holes. Two other Wheelerites, while driving in New Mexico, rolled their car. They came upon a sign "Dip, 500 feet". One of them said "Oh, my God, what a dip." He pulled on the emergency brake, putting the car into a skid and they rolled over. The 1931 football team with one of the greatest athletes I have ever known Temple Hooker gave me fond memories. Earl "Bootie" Wofford coached us against Miami during the month school was out for cotton picking. Wheeler upset Miami, putting the district into a three-way tie. We had to play White Deer. Temple played defensive center and was causing White Deer's center much



Wheeler County Social Security

Social security benefits were being paid to residents of Wheeler county at a rate of \$238,000 a month at the close of 1974. Howard L. Weatherly social security manager in Pampa, Texas, said recently. Of the Social Security beneficiaries living in Wheeler county, 1,185 are retired workers and their dependents. Another 330 are receiving benefits as the survivors of workers who have died, and 120 are getting benefits as disabled workers or their dependents. Weatherly pointed out that although most social security beneficiaries are older people, about one out of every four is under age 60. In Wheeler county, 210 people under age 60 are collecting social security payments each month. Nearly 85 are under age 18, receiving payments because a working father or mother has died or is getting social security disability or retirement benefits. Most of the 25 beneficiaries in Wheeler county between 18 and 22 years of age, are getting student's benefits under a provision in the social security law permitting the continuation of a child's benefits under a provision in the social security law permitting the continuation of a child's benefits beyond his 18th birthday, and up to 22, if the child is attending school full time. Also in this 18-22 age group, Weatherly said, are some other types of beneficiaries, illustrating the broad family protection that the social security program provides "workers of all ages. Some are children of retired, disabled, or deceased workers who have become disabled before they reach 22 and who will probably never be able to work and become self-supporting. The monthly benefits of these people, severely handicapped by physical or mental disabilities, will continue indefinitely. Benefits are also payable to the mother if the disabled son or daughter is in the mother's care. Weatherly said that another relatively small but significant group of youthful social security beneficiaries are those who are receiving benefits as disabled workers. Beginning with the checks beneficiaries received in July 1975, Weatherly said, social security benefits have increased 8 percent.





Using the two piece home
canning jar lids and rings
can be tricky.

It's important to follow
manufacturers' instructions
for tightening since some
brands differ in method.

To use these kinds of
closures, the compound on
the lid is usually softened
by letting the lids sit for a
few minutes in hot water.

This helps soften the compo-
und to assure a good seal.

Then the lid is placed on
the jar with the sealing
compound against the glass.

When the band is screwed
tight, but not with undue
force, the lid has enough
'give' to let air escape or
'vent' during processing.

This makes a vacuum form.
The screw band shouldn't
be tightened further after
processing.

Consumers should test the
seal 12-24 hours after
canning, or when the jars
have cooled completely.

If the lid sits down when
pressed and doesn't move up
and down, the jar is sealed.

Bands can then be re-
moved for use in other
processing.

Whether or not it pays to
have a freezer depends on
how it's used.

Consumers make a major
investment in a freezer,
both in initial cost and

Having a freezer keeps
homemakers from shopping
so often, and once-a-week
shopping can save time and
money. Leftovers needn't
taste stale because the
freezer holds them at their
flavor peak for longer than a
refrigerator would. Cutting
down on wasted food can also
save money for the freezer
owner.

A rapid rate of food turn-
over is recommended. Prac-
tice the "first foods in"

per pound of food.


