What can be learned from long term experience? Plenty, say organizers of the 1996 Ranch to Rail North beef producer conference.

The event will be held on May 7 at the Civic Center in Amarillo. "In addition to updating the 1995-96 information, we're emphasizing interpretation of the data collected through the Ranch to Rail effort," said F. T. "Ted" McCollum, area beef cattle specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. A portion of the program will feature four to five actual case studies based on cattle enrolled in past years.

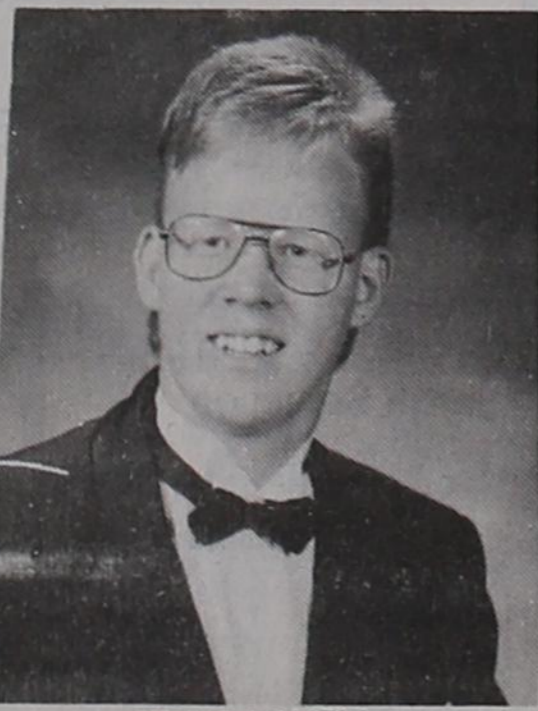
### TEXAS AGGIE MUSTER HELD IN WHEELER APRIL 21

Saturday will be election day; local voters will go to the polls to select school board members for their respective schools and representatives on the board of trustees for Parkview Hospital.

#### Wheeler I.S.D.

Wheeler I.S.D. has three places to be filled on the board of trustees with two race contested. Dell Ford is presently serving in Place One and is being challenged by Jay Lewis. Janet Stevens and Dan Sams have filed for Place Two on the Wheeler board. Wayne Kuehler is presently serving on the board and will not seek re-election. Mike Smith in Place Three has no opponent in the election.

#### Ft. Elliott Consolidated

Ft. Elliott has three full terms to be filled on their school board. Royce Zybach, Bob Finsterwald, Wayne Zybach and Wanda Hefley are each seeking election to one of the three

places.

Two individuals are to be elected to 1-year unexpired terms on the Ft. Elliott Board. Greg Estes and Clyde Dukes Jr. have filed for these positions.

#### Allison I.S.D.

Allison school district voters will seat two members on their school board. Seeking the two 3-year terms at Allison are Jerry Tice and Garland Dukes.

The Allison Voters will cast their ballots in a special election on May 4. The ballot reads: For or Against—Authorizing the Board of Trustees of Allison Independent School District to purchase attendance credits from the state with local tax revenues.

Asked E. L. Fowler how he was coming along with his computer. He said it was smarter than he was and gave him a hard time.

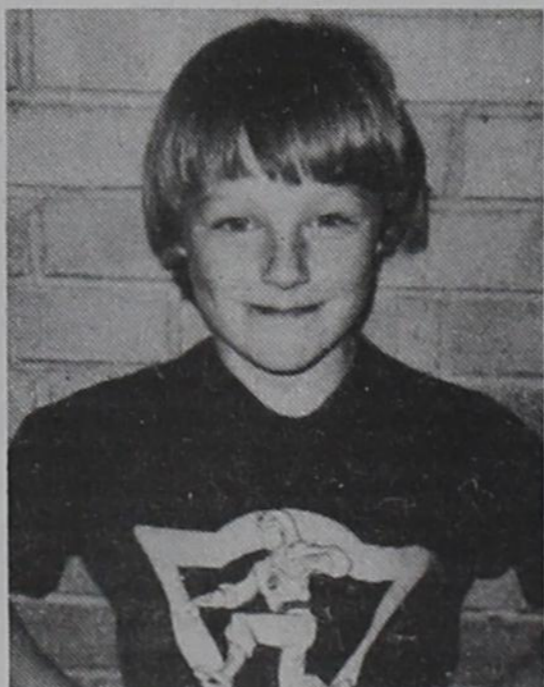
**LIBRARY NEWS**

**Extension Update**

**FAMILY PREPAREDNESS FOR DISASTERS**

Disaster can strike at anytime without warning. Most people don't think of a disaster until it is too late; then suddenly realize how unprepared they are for the massive changes in their lives.

The period after a disaster is often very difficult for families, at times as devastating as the disaster itself. Families which are prepared ahead of time can reduce the fear, confusion and losses that come with disaster. They can be ready to evaluate their homes, know what to expect in public shelters and how to provide basic first aid. For the next several weeks, the "Extension Update" will run a series of Disaster Preparedness articles to help your family prepare and cope with natural disaster.

One of the first steps toward preparedness is the creation of a Family Disaster Supply Kit. This will help the family get through the first few days after a disaster. Store the kit in a convenient place known to all family members. Store the items in airtight bags or containers. Include six basic items: Water, Food, First Aid Kit, Tools and Supplies, Clothing and Bedding, and Special Items. Replenish the kit twice a year.

The following are tips on storing the water:

\*\*Store water in clean plastic containers such as thoroughly washed and rinsed soft drink bottles with tight fitting screw on caps.

\*\*Store 1 gallon per day per family member (2 quarts for drinking, 2 quarts for food preparation, 1 sanitation). Children, nursing mothers and ill people will need more.

\*\*A three-day supply of water should be stored for every family member.

\*\*Replace water every 6 months. Tips for the other six Family Disaster Supply Kit items will follow next week. For a complete list, you may contact the Wheeler County Extension office at 806-826-5243.
