Corcoran married the former Anna Belle Stracener in 1936 at Mobeetie, Texas. They have lived in the Mobeetie area the entire 60 years.





"The debate over medical ethics is raging again with Dr. "Jack the Dripper" Kevorkian crusading for physician-assisted suicides. His latest case is really stirring controversy. It turns out that the woman he assisted didn't have a life-threatening disease. According to the coroner, she was tired, overweight, and depressed. If that's the criteria for Dr. Death, look out, America."

"Kevorkian thinks of himself as "kind" and "humane" and he endorses the system of euthanasia employed by the Netherlands. I always have been opposed to Kevorkian's actions, but my opposition to him and his ideas has grown monumentally after hearing his response to religious critics: "Had Christ died in my van with people around him who loved him, it would be far more dignified. Not only is this horribly sacrilegious (Christ's death wasn't supposed to be dignified), it's stupid.'

"Kervorkian's practice often is characterized as the compassionate "putting to sleep" of someone in unbearable pain and torment with a terminal illness. However, while caring physicians will aid in controlling pain, they will not take a human ife. There is a difference between letting someone die by refusing extraordinary treatment and making someone die. Also, painkillers have been effective in treating terminally ill patients; it is possible for them to die with dignity without being killed. While some may argue that the patients' poor quality of life entitles them to death if they wish, they must realize that some of these patients aren't really competent enough to make that decision; they also need to realize that Kevorkian harmfully brings the medical community into the fray. If doctors are allowed to kill instead of heal, they will be violating every ethical standard ever developed in their profession, including the Hippocratic oath."

"The assisted-suicide agenda is especially vulnerable to a large number of "slippery slope" applications. For instance, if a patient is costing a lot money to be kept in a nursing home under medication, he would feel immense pressure to stop being a "burden" to his family. Hence, the "right" to die quickly evolves into the "duty" to die. If a person is not a productive member of society, then why should he or she go on living and put an added strain on everyone else? He should "do the right thing" and die quietly."


"The right to die also can turn into the right to kill, leaving the patient's family to make the decision to "pull the plug" or allowing parents to order their handicapped newborn to be "let go" (starved to death). This all falls under the logic of "quality of living." If someone is suffering or doesn't have a good quality of life, why not put them out of their misery as you would a dog or a horse? Our nation will tumble into a moral free-fall without the protection of human life."

"In-the Netherlands, where they have euthanasia laws, the sancity of human life is cheapened beyond recognition. According to the May AFA Journal, the government has admitted that 61 percent of euthanized patients die without consent and 45 percent of the patients' families aren't aware of the decision to end their loved one's lives."

"The April issue of Lone Star Citizen reported that infants are allowed to die because of minor disabilities. It also said people with emotional trauma are allowed to die at the hands of the physicians, and elderly citizens refuse to go into nursing homes out of fear of involuntary suicide. '

"It also said more than 60 percent of the doctors admitted to falsifying death certificates after euthanasia. It interesting to note that euthanasia was designed to give more control over how they die, but in Holland, it gives them much less control over their deaths."

"The same laws are what Kevorkian and his cohorts want for America, but this battles against everything our country has ever stood for, particularly equality for all citizens, including the elderly, sick, and disabled." **Bill Morrison, Minister Church of Christ** Wheeler, Texas





Seep Ponds Are Widely Used In County your land.

Seep Ponds are primary used for livestock water here in Wheeler County. In addition, seep ponds are used for fishing, wildlife, recreation, fire control, crop and to maintain and improve water quality.

Many of the ranchers seem to believe that a seep pond is cheaper to build than a windmill. Generally a seep pond will cost around \$500.00 to \$2000.00 dollars depending on the size. A windmill could cost around \$2500.00 to \$3500.00 dollars depending largely on the drilling depth. Most ranchers prefer a seep pond over a windmill. Some ranchers also feel like a seep pond increase the value of


Absentee voting is now under way. Absentee ballots can be requested from the county Extension offices from August 26 through September 17 and must be returned no later than September 27, 1996.

Eligible voters (producers, feeders or importers) must request ballots and vote where they live or where their business is headquartered.


In-person voting will take place in the county Extension office during regular business hours on October 1, 1996.

This budget reflects a ten percent across the board cut in expenditures of the proposed budget in all areas except salaries. A meals policy was also made a part of the budget which amends the current policy. Under this policy, meals will be paid for by the school for all co-curricular district level activities that exceed a distance of fifty miles. Meals will also be provided for all activities

above the effective tax rate. This rate will also allow for more state Foundation funds during the 1997-98 and 1998-99 school years because of an increased tax effort at the local level. Last year's rate was \$1.33.

In order to fund this budget, a tax rate of \$1.4365 per \$100 valuation was set. This rate is three percent

The adopted budget represents a deficit budget of \$312,875. This money will be spent from 1995-96 carryover funds. The total revenues for the 1996-97 budget are estimated at \$2,189,959.

Trooper L. B. Snider, Public Information Officer for the Texas Department of Public Safety, states "Many people will celebrate Labor Day weekend traveling to lakes, rodeos and other festive events." Basic, yet often overlooked safe driving procedures need to be engaged for holiday traveling. These basics are: #1-pretrip planning, #2-a drug free and alert driver, #3-adequate travel time and space development and #4-correct use of safety belts.

Pretrip planning consists of having the vehicle tuned and in safe condition. A time frame and route schedule should be made and shared with a family member or friends who can contact you if needed, especially for emergency messages. Snider also encourages motorists to have first aid and emergency road kits in vehicles at all times.

Drug tree includes alcoholic beverages, over the counter medications, prescribed medications and obviously illegal drugs such as marijuana, cocaine, etc. Medications, whether prescirbed or purchased over the counter which have warnings not to drive should definitely be followed. Drivers should allow time for occasional rest stops as needed, adds Snider.

Adequate travel time and space development deals with areas of congested traffic and developing safe following space. When the vehicle ahead of you passes a landmark such as a delineator post or a tree, it should take at least two (2) seconds before you reach the same location. Snider advises that drivers should work to minimize the time spent driving alongside other vehicles in the event they may need to move aside.

The Department of Public Safety has found that many people use safety belts incorrectly and expose themselves to greater injuries. Lap belts should be worn across the hips and the shoulder strap worn over the shoulder. The D.P.S. has found that numerous motorists wear the shoulder strap under the shoulder which diminishes the effectiveness of the shoulder strap. In cars with separate lap and shoulder straps, motorists need to use both to reduce the risk of being ejected through a door jarred open. Infant/child safety seats must be secured snug and preferrably in the back seat, especially if the vehicle has dual air bags. Trooper Snider adds that drivers of pickups with children under the age of 12 in the bed area have a maximum speed limit of 35 miles per hour. "Remember, these passengers have little or no means of securing themselves and become human projectiles with hard braking or in collisions. "Whether we travel by car, truck, boat or even horseback we need to have a travel plan, have the vehicle in proper working order and have ourselves physically and mentally prepared for peak performance needed for holiday travel," concludes Trooper Snider.

Speed Restrictions on Texas Highways

If you tow a trailer with a passenger car or a light truck, you should be aware of the following which is taken from the transportation code (traffic law book).

"Light truck" means a truck with a manufacturers rated carrying capacity of not more than 2,000 pounds, including a pickup truck, panel delivery truck, and carry-all truck. (This would cover 1 ton, 3/4 ton, 1/2, and smaller pickup trucks).

Unless a special hazard exists that requires a slower speed, the following is the speed limit:


60 miles per hour in daytime and 55 miles per hour in nighttime if the vehicle is a truck, other than a light truck, or if the vehicle is a truck-tractor, trailer, or semi-trailer, or a vehicle towing a trailer, semi-trailer, another motor vehicle, or a house trailer of an actual or registered gross weight lighter than 4,500 pounds and a length of 32 feet or shorter, excluding the tow bar.

45 miles per hour if the vehicle is towing a house trailer of an actual or registered gross weight heavier than 4,500 pounds or longer than 32 feet. excluding the tow bar

50 miles per hour if the vehicle is a school bus. (55 miles per hour on interstate highways.)

The important point to remember is that if you are towing a trailer, the speed limit is 60 MPH during daytime and 55 MPH during nighttime. This includes any size or type of trailer.

"Daytime" is the period from 30 minutes before sunrise to 30 minutes after sunset.
