Listed below is the winning cookie recipe that was made by Matthew Flowers from Shamrock.

Chocolate Crunch Cookies
1 1/2 cup sifted flour
1 1/2 tsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp. salt
1 1/2 cup pecans, chopped
1 cup chocolate chips
1/2 cup butter
6 TBSP. brown sugar, firmly packed
6 TBSP. granulated sugar
1 egg
1/4 tsp. vanilla
Preheat over to 375 degrees. Sift flour, baking powder and salt. Add nuts and chocolate chips. Cream butter, gradually beat in sugar and egg. Add vanilla and then flour mixture. Drop by teaspoonfuls 2 inches apart on greased cookie sheet. Bake in pre-heated oven for 11 minutes at 375 degrees.

SWCD Offers Pecan, Fruit, Ornamental Trees

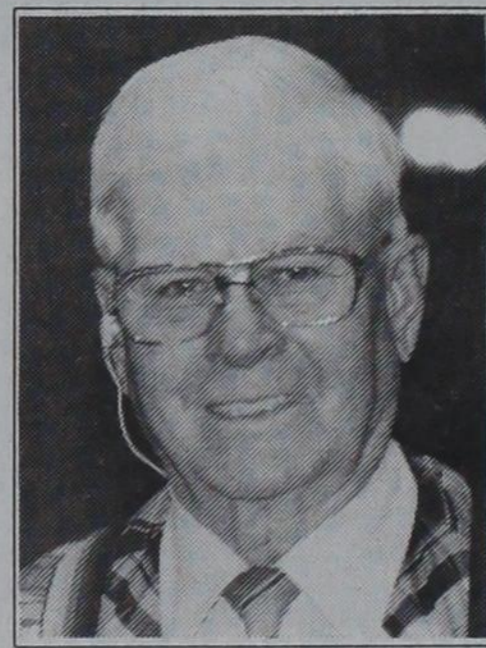
Wheeler County SWCD will be taking orders starting September 1st through October 31st for following types of pecan, fruit and ornamental shade trees:

Gordon Wayne Whitener, 92, died Thursday, August 30, 2001, at Canadian, Texas.

Funeral services were Sunday, September 2, 2001, at 2:00 p.m. in the First Baptist Church of Wheeler with Rev. Toby Henson, pastor, officiating. He was assisted by William Arthur Whitener, son, and Nancy Miller, daughter.

Burial was in the Wheeler Cemetery under the direction of Wright Funeral Home.

Mr. Whitener was born to Charles Arthur and Alta Jean Johnson Whitener on July 5, 1909, in Kelton, Texas. He graduated from Kelton in 1928, and then attended O.B.U. in Shawnee, Oklahoma. He taught school at Sandy Basin and Twitty, Texas. He married Bennie May Williams on June 10, 1934, in Wheeler, Texas. He became a farmer and cattle raiser. He received a Conservationist of the Year Award in 1965 by the Shamrock Lion's Club and the Outstanding Man in Agriculture in 1973 by the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce. Have a Happy Labor Day and don't labor!

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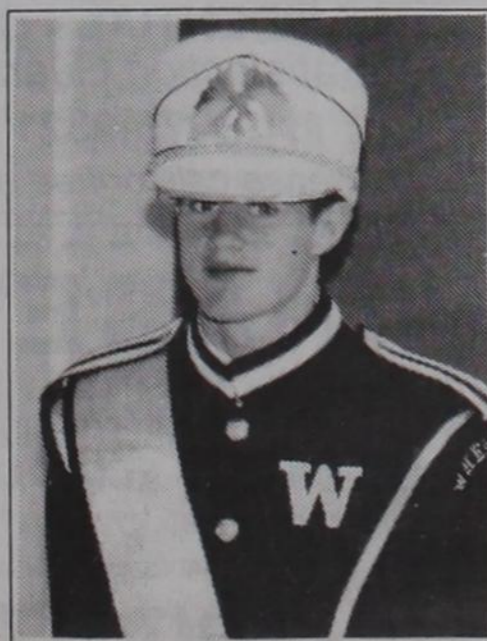

Extension Service To Host Conference

An area-wide child care conference and training session will be held from 9 a.m.-3:30 p.m. Sept. 29 at the Exposition Center in Perryton. This educational event, "Child Care Challenges," will provide training for workers in day care settings, mothers and parents. It is being co-sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in Hemphill, Ochiltree, Gray, Hansford and Lipscomb Counties. In addition to providing training for all interested individuals, certificates of training worth 5.0 credit hours will be provided to those who need annual in-service training to maintain current certification.

Registration will be at 9:00 a.m. The keynote address "Dealing with Difficult Children," will be delivered at 9:30 a.m. by Dr. Linda Ladd. Ladd is Associate Professor and Family Life Specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. This workshop will include information on children's behavior as related to mental health. Working with Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder and strong willed children can be a challenging but positive experience.

Cheri Sherley, Family Literacy Specialist with Region XVI Head Start, will speak on "The Literacy Connection" following the lunch break. She will address the fact that literacy encompasses both reading and writing. She will talk about the writing development of young children and how to foster that development in the childcare setting. She will also look at what makes a good book, how to choose good books and the types of literature young children should be regularly exposed to.

Four concurrent workshops will be offered during the afternoon session. A variety of topics will be featured including playing with baby, dealing with stress, sanitizing for safety, and celebrating with crafts.

"Playing with Baby" will feature Kathy Childress, Educational Consultant. She will teach care givers how to use play and toys for developing skills in children, age infants to toddlers, and not just to entertain.

Cynthia Shattles, Ochiltree County Extension Agent, will lead a discussion on "Dealing with Stress." Practical information on coping with stress personally, stress shown by children, and parent's stress that affects the care giver will be highlights of this session.

"Solutions for Healthy Child Care" will be featured in the third concurrent session. Angie Huff, Hemphill County Extension Agent, and Peggy Winegarner, Hansford County Extension Agent, will lead this session on indoor air quality, sanitizing for safety and prevention of illness.

Joan Gray, Gray County Extension Agent, and Sandra Mills, Lipscomb County Extension Agent, will involve participants in "Celebrating with Crafts" in the fourth concurrent session.

Highlighted will be simple and fun "hands-on" learning activities for several age groups with an emphasis on

holidays and traditions.

Each session will provide handouts for participants to take home.

Pre-registration is encouraged. A \$5 registration fee is to be sent to Sandra Mills, County Extension Agent - Family and Consumer Sciences, P.O. Box 119, Lipscomb, TX 79056 by Sept. 21st.

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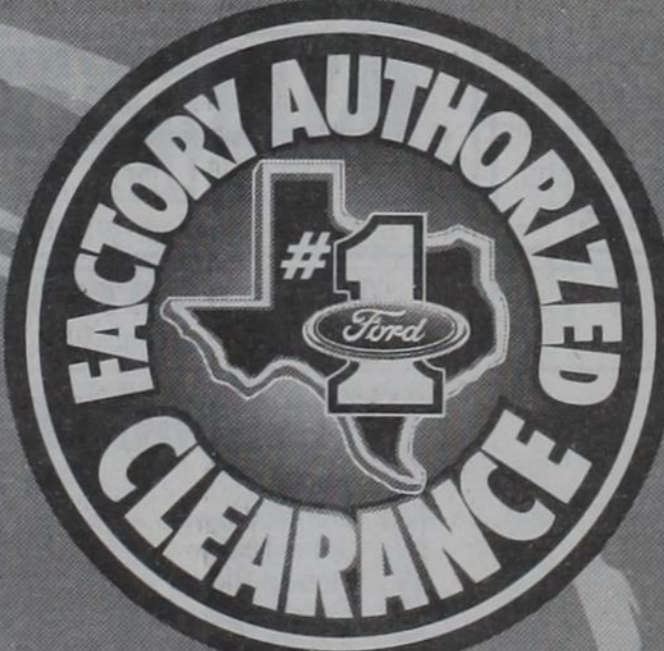

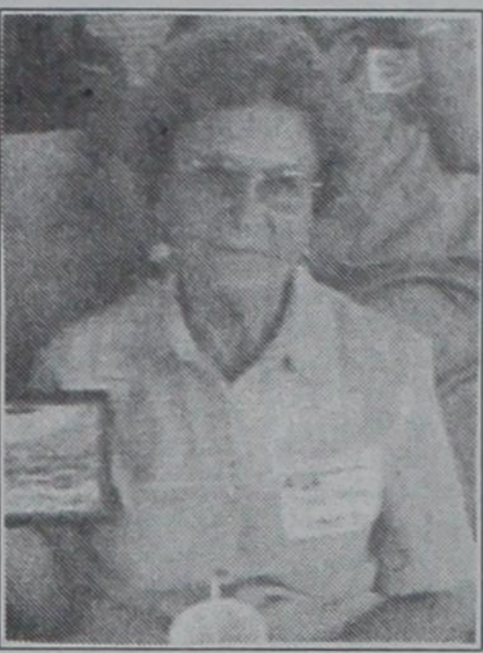
In addition, a special seniors citizens' event including prizes and refreshments is planned for the Amarillo National Center at 10 a.m.

Weed Control Necessary For All CRP Contracts

Most of our newly seeded grass plantings are lost to weed competition. CRP producers have a choice of chemical control or mechanical control on their CRP acreage. If CRP producers plant their legumes or forbs with their native grass mix, they are limited to mowing weeds. If producers hold off about planting their forbs or legumes until September, they can spray their weeds. Weed control is essential for getting a stand of grass.

It is your responsibility to control weeds on your CRP acreage. If producers refuse to control weeds on their CRP land, they could be fined or CRP contract could be terminated. Please call Calvin or Fred when you complete your weed control. Your local NRCS would like to urge all CRP participants to control their weeds by September 15th. Please leave a stubble height of 6 to 8 inches when shredding weeds. **Weeds must be controlled!**

NRCS Advises It Is Time To Plant CRP Covercrop

Producers, who are scheduled to plant a cover crop this coming fall, need to begin plowing their land. Producers will need to plant their covercrop into a smooth, firm and clean seedbed to establish a suitable cover crop. A cover crop is mandatory when planting a native grass mixture.

The primary purpose for planting a cover crop is to reduce soil loss, improve soil tilth, conserve soil moisture, increase water infiltration and provide protection for the small grass seedling. The cover crop is a small grain such as wheat or rye, which is allowed to grow until the heads reach the soft dough stage and then shredded to prevent seed production.

Native grass can be planted as early as December 1st and no later than June 1st. Plant a wheat or rye crop by October 15th at a rate of 50 lbs. per acre. Please plant grass as soon as possible. Plant a sorghum crop by July 10th at the rate of 4 to 8 lbs. per acre drilled and then shred or chemical control prior to seed production. Please leave stubble undisturbed until grass planting and then plant grass into the stubble. Cover crops must be killed prior to planting grass or as soon after the grass is planted.

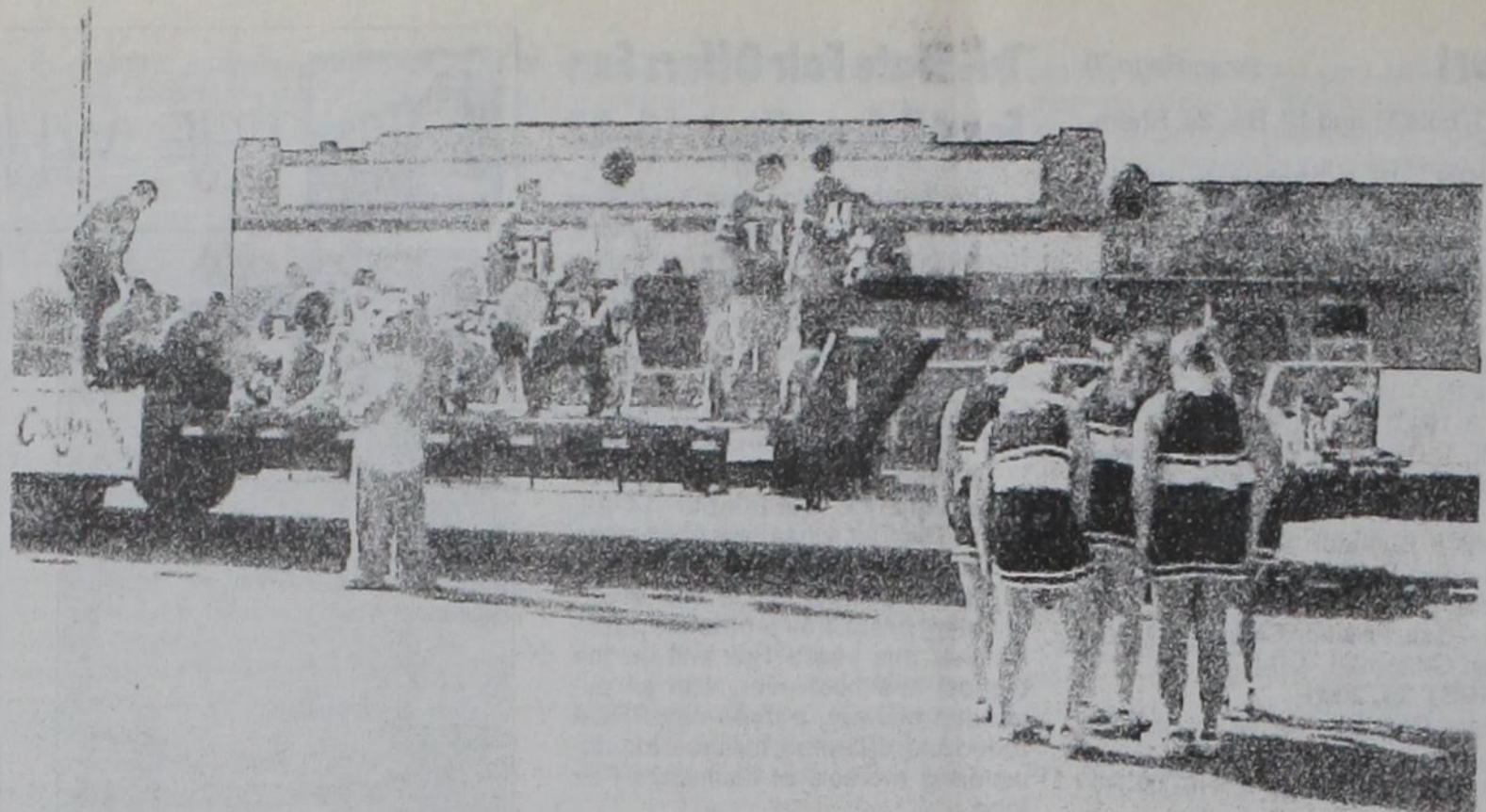

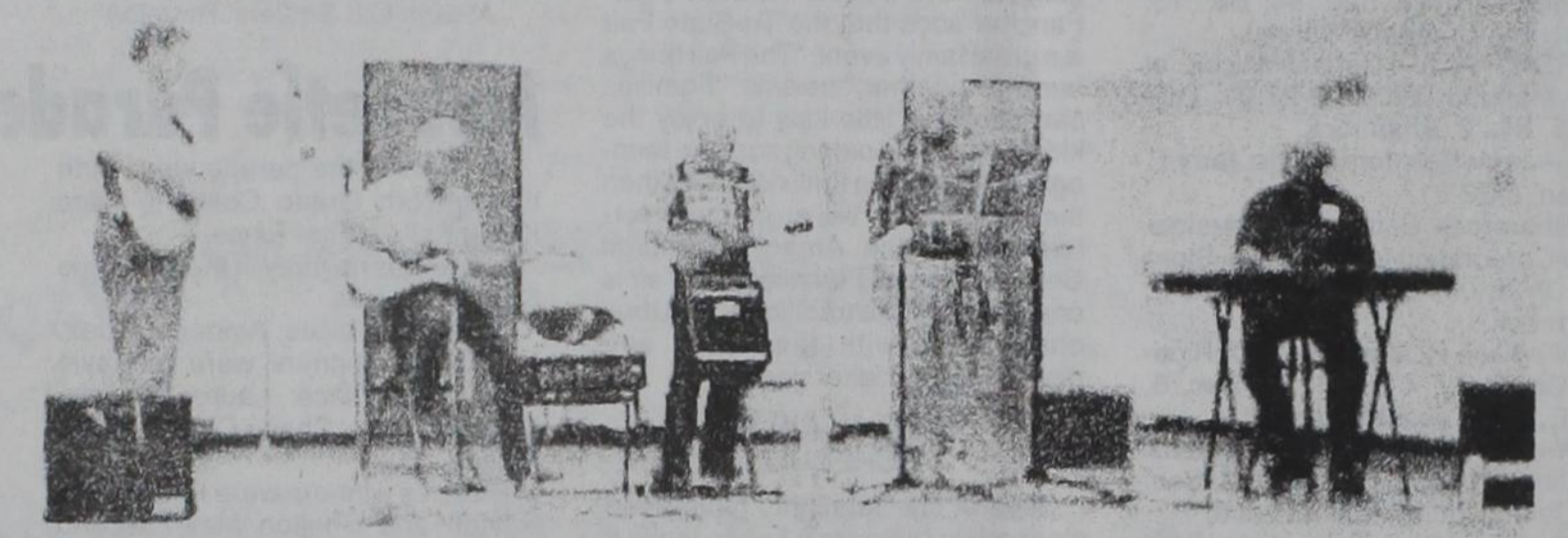
