Austin lawyer Claude Ducloux received the prestigious Professionalism Award for his many efforts to encourage the highest standards of ethical behavior and professional competence among his colleagues. Thomas Goranson of Dallas was presented the award for having written the best article to appear in continuing legal education course materials over the prior year. It was entitled "Speaking in Codes" and was included in the course books for the 2001 Advanced Family Law Course presented by the State Bar of Texas. 

Teams members will keep track of their miles and the team captain will phone them in each week. The map will be updated at the Extension office to track our progress across the Texas map. Fill out a registration form available at the Wheeler County Cooperative Extension Office, 2nd floor in the county

plan. If you can't find your conservation plan, please come by your local Natural Resources Conservation Service to request a copy. Farmers are required to comply with the Food Security Act Plan of 1985. Many of the farmers are doing an outstanding job of following their conservation plan. It's not fair to the farmers who comply with FSA plan and let the rest of the farmers do as they please. NRCS staff will investigate all FSA compliance complaints.

Most of the conservation plans address conservation cropping sequences, residue management, surface roughening and over-seeding wheat. These conservation practices must be met at all times to stay in compliance and to receive government payments.

In the last two weeks we have received a lot of strong winds out of the north which caused a lot of wind erosion on many of our cultivated fields. Most of our cropland fields have experienced some severe wind erosion problems. The conservation plan emphasizes surface roughening when severe soil blowing problems occur. If your cropland field has experienced some blowing during that time, surface roughening is needed now. Some tillage equipment that could be used for soil roughening is moldboard, lister-bedder, and chisel. If producers choose not to do any surface roughening on their cropland acreage, it will be turned over to the Farm Service Agency (FSA)>

Your local NRCS office urges all farmers to comply with their farm plan. For more information contact Calvin or Fred. Thank you.

## NRCS Will Conduct Random Spot Checks

Natural Resources Conservation Service will be conducting random spot-checks on a number of farms. Letters have already been mailed out to may farmers who are participating in government programs. Farmers, who didn't receive a letter, should also pay close attention to their farm plan. Most FSA plans should be fully implemented at this time. NRCS personnel will be looking closely at cropping sequences, crop residue, surface roughening and any other practices that were scheduled. If farmers are found out of compliance on their farmland, they will be notified immediately by the Natural Resources Conservation Service. Farmers who are out of compliance could lose government farm payments. Farmers that will not be able to put practices in, they should contact their local NRCS office. Wheeler FO personnel will do all we can to keep farmers in compliance and to remain in compliance.

NRCS will not be able to revise everyone's farm plans because of the large number of plans. NRCS is asking all farmers to try real hard to stay current with their farm plan. Farmers should work with their local Natural Resources Conservation Service and Farm Service Agency on their farm plan. ### Topper Receives 38 Year Sentence For Possession Of Controlled Substance

Paul David Topper Jr., age 37, of Wheeler, has been sentenced to 38 years confinement in the Texas Department of Corrections by a 7 woman, 5 man jury in large Steven R. Emmert's 31st Clarict Court in ender County. The trial, which be-

gan Monday, March 4, 2002, ended on Tuesday with the jury deliberating for approximately 2 hours before returning its verdict. Topper had been charged with Possession of a Controlled Substance (methamphetamine) with intent to manufacture within 1000 feet of a school zone by the Wheeler County Grand Jury.

Topper was arrested on July 20, 2000, following a raid on his residence by officers from the Wheeler County Sheriff's Department, members of the Panhandle Regional task force and officers of the elite Texas Department of Public Safety Drug Interdiction Task Force after Wheeler County Sheriff Jimmy Adams had received a tip from a confidential informant that Topnerwas manufacturing methampheramine at his resiher ce the Whaeler. During testimony by Strenff Adams, it was determined no sidence was 92 feet from he Vinceler School, a "drug free" une as designated by the Texas Legislature and which carries an enhanced punishment.

Being questioned by Assistant District Attorney David Holmes of Canadian, Shall! Adams testified that in the raid of the house the officers found not only a large quantity of finished methamphetamine, but also lithium, ether, hydrochloric acid anhydrous ammonia, Coleman lampfuel and pseudoephedrine tablets, all used in the minufacture of the dangerous

Defense counsel Cecil Biggers of Sc : wan quizzed Sheriff Adams, recommended some of the items seized, an to whether those items could be found in any law abiding residence. Chesif Adams countered that law abiding people do not strip the lithium out of batteries and certainly do not keep anhydrous ammonia, a highly dangerous substance, at their homes. Under direct examination by 31st Attorney Rick Roach, Lt. Joe Longway, of the DPS Methamphet-Interdiction Task Force in

Houston, testified regarding the profor manufacturing "Nazi" meth. 'a stated was the process beand at the Topper residence. "We have to wear "hazmat" suits, like saw during the Anthrax scare wan we get near these labs because of the poisonous and deadly nature of these chemicals, stated Longway. Some of the fumes from this process can kill a person in-

Longway further testified that these chemicals and this process are especially dangerous to young people noting the close proximately of the lab to the Wheeler school.

During closing argument, District Attorney Roach admonished the jury to let the punishment fit the crime. "Most of you indicated on voir dire that you believe in deterrence for this type of crime," Roach stated. "If you want deterrence, you must punish the defendant according to the crime.
