

Wheeler Council Conducts Business

Regular Meeting July 15, 2002
Mayor Wanda Herd called the regular meeting to order at 7:00 p.m.

Walter Simmons made the motion seconded by Barbra Koelzer to approve the minutes as written. The motion carried.

Jimmy Hill made motion seconded by Jay Randels to pay the bills as presented. The motion carried.

Frank Clymer reported on the activities of the city employees. Frank stated that Scott Honeyfield, city engineer, thought it would be more feasible to redo the existing well on the Rogers' Place and then drill only one new well. He stated G. W. James Construction did a very good job on seal coating the streets this summer.

Walter Simmons made the motion seconded by Bob McCain to adopt an Ordinance establishing a program response and recovery phases of comprehensive emergency management; acknowledging the office of emergency management director, authorizing the appointment of an emergency management coordinator, and providing for the duties and responsibilities of those offices. The motion carried unanimously.

Art Rhine had requested permission to graze roping calves on city land. He, and others, are trying to start a High School rodeo club or youth roping club. He had talked to Bob and Wanda and stated the club would take care of fencing the pasture and assume responsibility and liability regarding any circumstances that might arise. This item was tabled until additional information can be obtained.

Jimmy Hill made the motion seconded by Bob McCain to provide tax exempt status for organizations of primarily charitable or religious nature. The motion carried.

The possibility of electronic drafting the water bills that are usually drafted with paper drafts was discussed. It will be discussed at the next council meeting.

The "U-turn" matter on Main Street was mentioned. TxDOT was supposed to check into this matter and get back to Mayor Herd and the Council.

Jay Randels made the motion the meeting adjourn. Barbra Koelzer seconded the motion. The meeting was adjourned at 7:51 p.m.

Ilene Butler Wins Top Honors At Bake Show



Wheeler ISD Pre-Kindergarten
The Wheeler ISD will offer a Pre-Kindergarten program for the

2002-2003 school year. Enrollment in Pre-Kindergarten is determined by qualifying conditions which have to be verified by the administration after a parent or guardian has completed an application form for their child.

To qualify for Pre-Kindergarten, a child must be four (4) years old on or before September 1st of the current school year. In addition, one of the following conditions must be verified:

1. **Qualifying Condition:** Economic disadvantage, based on the W.S. Department of Agriculture's guidelines for free and reduced-price lunches. If a child qualifies for free or reduced lunches he qualifies for Pre-Kindergarten.
2. **Qualifying Condition:** English is not the native language of the child. (ESL) Parents will enter the name of the native language of the child using the Home Language Survey. If a child's native language is not English he qualifies for Pre-Kindergarten.

If you believe your child will qualify to attend Pre-Kindergarten and wish to submit an application on his behalf, please come to the Wheeler School Cafeteria Friday August 16, 2002 any time from 9:00-11:00 a.m. **You must bring with you a copy of your child's birth certificate.**

15 Students Needed For Ft. Elliott To Offer Pre-Kindergarten Program

2002 Property Tax Rates in CITY OF MOBEETIE

This notice concerns 2002 property tax rates for CITY OF MOBEETIE. It presents information about three tax rates. Last year's tax rate is the actual rate the taxing unit used to determine property taxes last year. This year's effective tax rate would impose the same total taxes as last year if you compare properties taxed in both years. This year's rollback tax rate is the highest tax rate the taxing unit can set before taxpayers can start tax rollback procedures. In each case these rates are found by dividing the total amount of taxes by the tax base (the total value of taxable property) with adjustments as required by state law. TxDOT Offers Organ Donor License Plates

TxDOT and local county tax assessor-collector's offices are featuring the Organ Donor specialty plate this month in an effort to raise public awareness of organ donation in Texas.

"The donation of organs is the greatest gift someone can give, it is the gift of life," said State Representative Pete P. Gallego.

The organ Donor license plate design features a green ribbon graphics on the left side of the plate against a light blue background with the words "Give life, be an organ donor" across the bottom of the plate. The Organ donor plate was first issued in Texas in April 2001.

The Organ Donor specialty plate is available for motorists who are organ donors, transplant recipients, family members and supporters of organ donations. The purchase of Organ Donor specialty plates include a \$25 annual fee, plus \$40 if personalized, in addition to regular registration fees. The \$25 annual fee is deposited into the State Highway Fund.

Motorists can get an application at their county tax office, on TxDOT's Web site at www.dot.state.tx.us, by calling the TxDOT Help Desk at (512) 465-7611, or by calling TxDOT's Fax-On-Demand forms line at (888) 232-7033.

TxDOT started its specialty license plate program in 1965. Today, TxDOT has more than 100 different plate designs, many of them benefiting a particular group or organization.

Sunflowers Subject Of Tex. Coop. Ext. Meeting

Farmers on the High Plains can learn more about sunflowers at an Aug. 12 crop workshop sponsored by Texas Cooperative Extension and the National Sunflower Association.

"Sunflowers are a good crop to grow in rotation with cotton, corn, grain sorghum and other crops. Many farmers also grow sunflowers as a late-season catch crop," said Calvin Trostle, Extension agronomist based at Texas A&M's Lubbock Research and Extension Center. "This workshop will take place at Texas A&M's Research and Extension Center north of Lubbock (1102 East FM 1294).

"Take exit 11 off of Interstate Highway 27 (FM 1294 exit), and proceed 1/2-mile east. The Center is a complex of buildings just south of FM 1294."

This free workshop is designed as a classroom and field training session for farmers, crop consultants, agribusiness and Extension personnel, and others who wish to attend.

Trainers-instructors for this workshop include: Dr. Larry Charlet, USDA entomologist, and Dr. Tom Gulya, USDA plant pathologist, both of Fargo, North Dakota; Max Dietrich, National Sunflower Association coordinator, Bismarck, North Dakota; and Trostle.

The workshop starts at 1 p.m. and should conclude around 5 p.m. Those who attend will qualify to earn 2.5 continuing education units (CEU's), Trostle added.
